ATHLETIC MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE: The Mississippi State Athletic Media Relations Office is located in Room 202 of Humphrey Coliseum. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

CREDENTIALS: Requests for press/photo credentials should be faxed or mailed on official letterhead to the Mississippi State Athletic Media Relations Office (FAX 662-325-3654) at least 48 hours prior to the event. Since space is limited, accomodations are on a priority basis: daily newspapers, originating radio and television stats, national weekly or monthly publications, electronic media outlets, local and regional television crews. Priority is granted to members of the media who cover Mississippi State on a regular basis, and to visiting media members. At the MSU Soccer Field, media credentials will be available for pickup at the press tent. Only working media with proper credentials will be allowed access to the press

PHOTO REGULATIONS: Photo passes will be issued only to accredited photographers on assignment. Photographers may shoot from designated areas outside of the fences of the field and within the stadium. The Mississippi State Athletic Department adheres to NCAA photography policies and reserves all commercial and non-commercial rights to the use of film, videotape and still photographs of its athletic events and facilities.

MSU SOCCER FIELD: With its covered sideline press area and telephone line that allows for faxing and web site updates, as well as radio/television broadcasting capabilities, the MSU Soccer Field is an oncampus facility located on the corner of Collegeview Drive and University Drive. With a seating capacity of 500, the press box telephone number is (662) 325-0905

PARKING: The MSU Soccer Field is an on-campus facility located on Collegeview Drive and University Drive. The parking lot located between the MSU Softball Field and the A.J. Pitts Tennis Centre is reserved for game officials and staff. Parking for the media and general public is located directly behind the grandstand area of the MSU Soccer Field. The parking lot located directly behind McArthur Hall is reserved for players, officials and game staff.

SERVICES: The Mississippi State Athletic Media Relations Office will provide a complete box score and play-by-play of each game. Programs containing rosters and game notes on each team will also be provided to the working media. An automatic facsimile machine is available in the Mississippi State Athletic Media Relations offices in the Bryan Building and the Humphrey Coliseum.

TELEPHONES: Telephone service is available in the press box area (2 lines). The MSU Soccer Field press box telephone number is (662) 325-0905. Mississippi State freely provides telephone services to working media. However, any special requests must be made in advance through the Mississippi State Athletic Media Relations Office at (662) 325-7556. These requests should be submitted at least two weeks in advance to the media relations office on official letterhead.

INTERVIEW POLICY: The Mississippi State Soccer team is scheduled to practice between 3:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. daily during the 2006 season. All practices are open to the general public. MSU SOCCER FIELD

ome to the Mississippi State women's soccer team since 1995, the Mississippi State Soccer Field gives the Bulldogs one of the finest playing surfaces in the Southeast.

Located on the northside of the Mississippi State University campus, the Mississippi State Soccer Field is situated in the heart of Mississippi State's impressive physical plant. It joins W.O. Spencer Stadium (track and field), Dudy-Noble Field/Polk Dement Stadium (baseball), the MSU Softball Field and the A.J. Pitts Tennis Centre to give Mississippi State one of the finest Olympic sport venues in collegiate athletics.

The facility features a main grandstand area which will accomodate more than 500 people with opportunities for expansion in the future. Also included is a press tent complete with phone lines and a public address system, an electronic scoreboard and covered dugouts for participating teams. The Mississippi State Soccer Field is also equipped with a video tower to provide capabilities for the recording of games.

Hailed as one of the top playing surfaces in the Southeastern Conference, the field stretches 114 yards long and 72 yards wide. The regulation NCAA Championship field features Mississippi Pride grass developed by researchers on the Mississippi State campus - making it home to one of the finest playing surfaces in the country. A grounds crew, supervised by groundskeeper Bart Prather, is responsible for the field maintenance of the

Mississippi State Soccer Field.

To reflect the strong commitment to constant improvement on the field, the Mississippi State locker facilities have undergone a drastic renovation over the course of the past three years. Custom-made wooden lockers complete with spacious storage areas, along with a 52" color television and brand new carpets, have been installed to give the facility a championship feel.

Added just after the conclusion of the 2002 campaign, the MSU Soccer Field is now equipped for evening competition, giving the facility an added amenity that can only translate into better atmospheres.

In its ten seasons at the MSU Soccer Field, the Mississippi State women's program has posted a 52-47-3 (.525) overall record and, in 1996, tallied a program-best 12-2 record at home, including a 9-0

mark against non-conference foes. Mississippi State has also shut out its opponent 31 times in front of its home fans. The Bulldogs recorded a 4-3-2 mark at home in 2005.

The program's improvement can be felt with the size of the home crowds as well. In 2004, Mississippi State established a new program high for average and total attendance as a program-high 4,411 fans made their way to 10 Bulldog home dates (441 avg.). Of the top 10 MSU Soccer Field attendance marks, seven were set over the course of the past four seasons, including a standing-room-only crowd of 743 that witnessed MSU's double overtime victory over Auburn on regional television in 2001.





Mississippi State will play host to nine matches during the 2006 campaign, including six Southeastern Conference matchups - one against defending SEC Western Division champion Ole Miss. The Bulldogs will also play host to a very attractive non-conference schedule, including meetings with Memphis, Southern Miss and SMU. The final 2006 home game will take place on October 27 when the Maroon and White take on Ole Miss in the 2006 regular season finale for both squads.



Youth and Experience

Team looks to its bevy of freshmen and sophomores to improve on last year's record

eam chemistry is something that every team strives to achieve. It doesn't matter how talented the players are, without chemistry, the chances of being successful greatly decrease. One person playing for herself can bring down the collective team goal.

The 2006 version of the Mississippi State soccer team epitomizes team chemisty. But along with chemistry, this team is youthful, as 18 of the 25 players are either freshman of sophomores. And that youthfulness is what has head coach Neil MacDonald

"First of all, we're very young," said MacDonald. "The squad is heavily laden with freshmen and sophomores, and we're developing. We have a lot of potential in the group. We've got square pegs for square holes. We have good players who can play starting roles for us. We've got leadership where we need it; players who will talk and organize. So far we've been really happy with the development and what we're seeing."

Behind 18 freshmen and sophomores, Mississippi State will field a squad of youthful exuberance, with leadership of the squad placed primarily in the hands of a two seniors. Despite the young group, State returns seven starters and 17 letterwinners from last year's squad. The mixture of youth and experience will be will be a key factor as the Bulldogs look to return to the SEC Tournament after missing out last

As always with a young team, Macdonald understands that the trials it could face could be apparent early on. However, he is fully aware that despite those trials, the team needs to be challenged, especially

withthe level of talent and potential that surrounds this years squad.

"There's a steep learning curve with a lot of these players, but there's just a lot of potential in this group. They're listening; taking in the information. We've got a ways to go, but I think this is the first time I really feel we've got a squad of players that we can really mold and turn into a team. They have great attitudes and a high work rate. They never stop running; never stop fighting for the ball. I think that in itself is a huge step forward for us."

In the annual preseason poll of the conference coaches, the Maroon and White were picked to finish sixth in the SEC's Western Division. However, as the season progresses, MSU is ready to defy the naysayers for a second time in 2005. For the second consecutive season, each team in the always tough SEC will face an 11-game league schedule, with six of those contests coming at the friendly confines of the MSU Soccer Field

Mississippi State opens the 2006 campaign with four straight road matches. It is the longest season opening road trip for the Bulldogs ever. MSU then returns home for seven consecutive matches, including a four-match swing to open its SEC slate. State then returns to the road for five games before closing out the season at home.

MState will begin conference play hosting two preseason ranked teams. They face Georgia before playing three-time defending SEC Champion Tennessee. The Bulldogs close the homestand with

State will embark on a four-game road trip, beginning with Alabama on October 6, while the back half of the road trip sees Mississippi State face nationally ranked Florida. A rare home-and-away weekend will feature a road game at Kentucky and a home game with Vanderbilt, with MSU closing out regular season play at home on October 27 in the Magnolia Cup with cross-state nemesis Ole Miss.

Once again, State will play a difficult non-conference schedule. Opening weekend matchups against Sam Houston State, as well as defending Conference USA Champion Rice will set the tone of competition early, with trips to Charlotte and Gardner-Webb closing out the road trip. MState will return home to close out its non-conference campain, with tough matches against Memphis, Southern Miss and 2005 NCAA participant SMU.

"We set up a very difficult schedule because we believe we have a lot of potential," said Macdonald. The only way we're gonna get any better is if we play top class competition."

FORWARDS

The Bulldogs take a tremendous blow with the loss of leading scorer Betty Ann Casey to graduation. Casey had almost half of State's points last year.



Sophomore Bethany Frazier will be looked to play a big role in both the offensive and defensive zones.

"The strikers-we've never played with a three-front before. They're learning that. There are players who can play in the wide position. There are players who can stay in the middle and hold the ball up. We can play to their speed or we can use the opportunity at times to use Treena Ferguson and Jessica Davis as target strikers to play off of. So there's a lot of potential in the group."

MIDFIELDERS

Graduation put a dent in the Mississippi State midfield corp as central midfielders Meghan Odom and Heather Amman played their final season in Maroon and White. However, some returning veterans, as well as incoming freshman should have a big impact on the center circle.

Among the most glaring returns is senior **Sara Moore**. Moore has tallied six career goals during her three-year career, five of which were game-winning goals. MSU is 6-0 in games in which the Moore finds the back of the net. Junior **Kevyn Shelledy** returns to the central midfield, where she will anchor the center line and be looked upon to create chances for the forwards.

Mariclaire Fancher will be expected to be one of the leaders of the midfield. Her work ethic and desire to do whatever the team needs has proved that she is the heart and soul of the team.

Depending on the formation and opponent, sophomore Meredith Jacobson will split time between the midfield and the defense. Jacobson is coming of an ACL injury, but she will be depended heavily once she's back to 100%. Sophomore Bethany Frazier will play a huge role both in the Mississippi State offensive and defensive statistics. Frazier has the ability to have a major impact on both ends of the field, and she will counted on to provide a spark on offense as well as preventing goals. She was one of three freshmen to see playing time in all 19 games last year.

Although she'll probably see most of her time in the defense, junior **Jennifer Turpin** could be an option in the midfield. Turpin has been hampered by injuries, but if she comes back healthy, she could play a major role.

Expected to see playing time at the beginning of last season, sophomore **Marlyce Stein** as the leading returning scorer. Stein was one of three freshmen to play in all 19 games last season.

Depth will likely play a huge factor on the outside as youth will be abundant. Freshman **Ashley Hood** and **Andrea Harrison** could expect to see some time in the midfield as well.

"This is an area where we've got a lot of technical ability. We've got some players who can move the ball around. What we've lacked in the past is mobility; being able to play 18-to-18 and to do it quickly. This year we've got a good balance of that. Hannah Tyler's is gonna really add a tremendous amount of pace, athleticism and passion to the center. Mariclaire Fancher is another simple, straightforward player. She can make a big difference from the midfield perspective."

DEFENDERS

The biggest return to this year's squad will be seen on the defense, where last year's starting back four return this season.

Moore, Frazier and Jacobson will see the bulk of their time spent in the defensive zone, but they all have a knack for scoring and an offensive awareness, so they will be seen jumping into the offensive territory often.

Junior Jessica Davis will return to her central defender role. She will be looked on to be one of he leaders of the defense. Sophomores Mary Kate Ayers and Anna Goblirsch will initially serve in back-up roles at the start of the season, but both will provide intense pressure for time in those positions. Newcomers Heather Buttrey and Katie Lynn Harden will most likely see playing time right away, as both have really impressed during the preseason. Sophomores Caitlin Gallagher and Courtney Benefield will push for playing

"Our back four, I think, is exceptional. When we're fully fit, and we have (Meredith) Jacobson, Sara Moore and Bethany Frazier out there, those are three of the best player out there in the conference. They are the type of player that nobody ever notices because they do such a good job, but they're simple, straight forward players, and they're very effective. So our back line is excellent. And we return basically our back four from last year. You throw Mary Kate (Ayers) in there as well, and we're strengthened in that position. We've got Anna Goblirsch and we've got Heather Buttrey who can step in and do a job for us."

imply stated, and loosely defined, a coach is a person who teaches and directs another person via encouragement and advice. However, as in all of his every day activies, coaching has become a form of commitment for second year Mississippi State head coach Neil Macdonald.

With success having followed him every step of the way from his humble beginnings in the soccer world, to his time in Starkville, Macdonald knows you won't get anywhere in life without focus and hard work.

Take last year for example. Just days before the Bulldogs would report for preseason camp and weeks before the 2004 opener at home with Middle Tennessee, Macdonald was named just the third head coach in the history of the MSU soccer program. The transition stage would be short-lived, if lived at all, but Macdonald was more than prepared to take on the task full circle.

"The big thing was that I knew the girls. That made the transition easy," he said. "They were used to hearing from me as a coach. I was involved heavily in the coaching aspect of things, particularly with the defensive end, so I thought it was a fairly smooth transition."

Whatever it was, it worked, Macdonald became the most successful rookie coach in MSU history, helping the Maroon and White to its most wins since 2001 while securing a record-tying five league victories en route to State's second SEC Tournament berth. Success, particularly down the stretch, had the Bulldogs set up for an invitation to the NCAA Tournament at season's end as well.

Having posted winning seasons in all seven seasons of his coaching career, last season still taught the enthusiastic mentor a thing or two. Success or not, he is fully aware of the task at hand.

"For us to build a consistently successful program, it's going to take time," Macdonald said. "We are in the early stages of that. We just have to be patient and, if we approach things in an organized and professional manner as a staff, we can get the best out of the girls that we have and build a strong foundation for a bright future."

Like all Scottish youngsters around his age growing up, Neil Macdonald often found himself in the streets of his Inverness neighborhood refining his soccer skills on the blacktop, rather than on the grass of a freshly mowed pitch. To him, as well as his friends, it was perceived as normalcy to set up makeshift goals out of trash cans and jackets just to play the game they developed a strong love for early on in life.

There was always time for soccer too, whether it be 15 minutes at breaktime or even an hour before school started, finding foes and teammates was never a challenge. The challenge lied in finding enough daylight to play an entire game.

'I really didn't get into organized soccer until primary school, but I started playing at a very young age," said the first year Mississippi State head coach. "I really didn't get exposed to the professional side of the game until I was about 12. We

would all get to school an hour before class started and play on the playground and, when we got home, we would all change out of our school clothes and go and play out on the street until it got dark.

"That was all we did. Your whole focus was trying to become a professional soccer player.

So, as Macdonald foraged his way through primary and secondary school, his skills could not do anything but develop. It did not take long before he was dominating his chums on the field, often times catching the eyes of professional scouts looking for young talent, or from coaches abroad looking to find talent for their collegiate programs in the United States.

At the still tender age of 18, Macdonald attended a coaching school in nearby Edinburgh where he would find him-

self playing on the other side of the ball from future college teammates and longtime friends Neil McGuire and Kevin Moreland. Following his experience there, it was then that Macdonald got the call that would, inevitably, change his life.

"My goal was always to play professionally in Scotland," Macdonald said. "When I realized that was not going to happen, I then started to look at other options. After I attended the coaching school, I got a phone call asking if I wanted to come over and play at Augusta State with a full scholarship."

So, in 1996, with his parents' blessing and his friends helping him to adjust, Macdonald made the transition to the United States, making a name for himself as a standout athlete with the academic institution in southern Georgia. Having turned heads with both his tactical and technical skills from those who attended practices, Macdonald also impressed his coaches as well in his first preseason.

'Neil had exceptional fundamental skills and was a phenomenal player," said Lowell Barnhart, who coached the Scotsman through his first three years in Augusta. "Even the American players were amazed with his skills. He had excellent distribution skills and was cool in every situation. He was a very dependable and consistent player as well which was a direct reflection of his character."

Said Ron Keller, Macdonald's coach during his senior season in 1997, "You could see the leadership qualities in him every day. He had already been coaching a club team before I got there, so he had those leadership skills already. I think we had about seven veterans and 20 freshmen in my first season there, and Neil was instrumental in helping Augusta State make the turnaround that it did that year and the years following. I always knew he would end up being a pretty good coach."

Macdonald saw action in every game of his



rookie campaign and would go on to play a number of different positions at Augusta State, but typically made most of his playing appearances in the center midfield role.

A four-year starter for the Jaguars, Macdonald captained the team during his junior and senior seasons and was also a recipient of a handful of team awards, as well as one conference player of the week accolade. He played and started all but one game during his illustrious career in Augusta and left the distinguished academic institution as the career record holder in games played and games started.

"My first year, I spent a lot of time battling homesickness," Macdonald said. "It was a totally different culture and a whole new way of life. From a soccer perspective, the game was much slower and less physical so the transition was pretty easy for me.

"Playing at Augusta State was an unbelievable experience for me or for any young man or woman. It totally changes your life. To have the opportunity to get your education paid for while you play sports is amazing to me. I certainly didn't have that opportunity in Scotland."

Following his graduation from Augusta State in 1997, Macdonald had set his sights on graduate school at Augusta State with the full intention of becoming a future history teacher. However, with McGuire in need of an assistant coach at his new job at lowa Central Community College, Macdonald, once again, got a phone call that would set his path in a new direction. It was the years following he would find himself in the coaching world, trading the classroom for the soccer field.

During the duo's initial campaign in Fort Dodge, lowa, as coaches of both the men's and women's teams, the ICCC women finished the season as regional champions with a 9-3-1 clip and featured the nation's leading scorer at that level. The men's team won the regional championship as well en route to concluding the season with a 15-4-1 record and a No. 14 national ranking.

Following a 1998 campaign that saw both the Tritons and Lady Tritons march to regional and national rankings, McGuire would depart the campus of ICCC for an assistant coaching job at Iowa

State, thereby handing over his position as head coach to Macdonald who took the reigns of the program at full speed.

Over the course of the next five seasons, he would skipper the men's team to five regional championships, four times reaching the Sweet 16 of the National Junior College Association of America (NJCAA) national tournament, including his final season in 2002 when the squad advanced through to the Final Four.

His accomplishments and rigor as a coach and mentor were equally noted on the women's side as well where he led the Lady Tritons to five consecutive regional championships, including an appearance in the Elite Eight in 2002.

During his five-year tenure in Fort Dodge, Macdonald collected an impressive 149-34-5 coaching record. At the conclusion of the 2002 campaigns, he was honored with NJCAA Region Coach of the Year accolades, along with being named one of three finalists for NSCAA National Coach of the Year honors. He was also lauded with Who's Who of America's Teachers as well.

"I was very fortunate that, when I was at Augusta State, I was coaching club soccer and I got to meet a guy named Colin Clark who had played for Arsenal and Oxford United in the English professional league," Macdonald said. "He taught me basically everything I know about the game from a coaching standpoint. He taught me how to break down my own game and how to use it to teach young kids. It was a matter of, as a player, you have to look after yourself and, as a coach, you have to look after everybody.

"He was definitely the one that got me interested in coaching and he was also the one that told me that I could have a future in it."

With the background of assistant and head coaching jobs at lowa Central, along with a professional coaching stint with the W-League's Memphis Mercury, Macdonald was offered and accepted his first Division I coaching job as a volunteer assistant at Mississippi State in 2003 where he was reunited with McGuire who, three years earlier, had attained his first tenure as a Division I head coach at the Northeast Mississippi school.

Working primarily on the defensive unit during his initial Spring season in Starkville, Macdonald was instrumental in helping to progressively enhance an already experienced defensive club. Prior to the Fall season in 2003, Macdonald was elevated to assistant coach where his primary duties included assuming day-to-day coaching duties with the defense, as well as recruiting. With his experience as a coach, the Bulldogs turned in a school record goals against average and yielded just 0.86 goals per game en route to a 9-8-3 record - one that included a pair of victories over nationally ranked squads, including No. 6 Florida. The victories were the first for an MSU team over a top 25 squad in school history.

"There was, obviously, a step up in the physical aspects of the game when I moved from coaching junior college soccer to coaching Division I soccer," Macdonald said. "The pace of the game was better and I began to deal with better athletes. After working with professional athletes in the W-League, I had a good idea of what the top level was and where the lower level was so it was just a matter of finding a middle ground."

Following a season that saw the Maroon and White attain their fourth winning season in school history, Macdonald would get the opportunity of a lifetime when McGuire departed Starkville toward the end of July to become an assistant coach at Texas. On July 29, 2004, just days before he would welcome a squad of 21 players back to campus, he was named Mississippi State's third head coach.

"Coaching has always been something that has just fell into my lap," Macdonald said. "People have always told me that I would have a future in it. I have a I w a v s

been very fortunate to be in the right place at the right time. I've always had very good opportunities presented to me."

Macdonald will begin his eighth season as a collegiate coach this year, having been successful at each step of his progression up the ladder rungs of the coaching world. Over the years, he has developed his coaching philosophies and tailored it to his work ethic and responsibilities.

Attitude and determination to succeed should always be number one when it comes to playing the game.

game.

"There is a great quote that 'Games are won in the noise and excitement of the playing field, but championships are won quietly and without applause on the training ground.' and that, for me, sums up my philosophy on the game," he said. "I am a great believer in simply outworking other people and other teams. You can have all the talent in the world, but if you have no heart or commitment, you are always going to be average. My ideal player is one that is always busy, and passionate about the game."

Commitment to the cause has been something that has translated into his recruiting philosophy as well.

"I look for character first of all," said Macdonald of the three things he looks for in a prospective student-athlete. "Because we are in the Southeastern Conference, you have to look at athleticism and pace as an incredibly important factor. Ideally, you'd like to have a technically sound player that has a good grasp of what the fundamentals of the game are. That makes things a lot easier."

Over the years, Macdonald has seen his share of life-changing experiences, but nothing comes close to what he experienced before the his tenure as MState's head coach even began. Having met his wife Jamie, an assistant professor in the Graphic Design program at Mississippi State, when both were athletes at Augusta State, the couple celebrated the birth of their first child, Colin Ross, in May, 2004. The couple also celebrated their sixth wedding anniversary on August 26.

Born May 16, 1972, in Banff, Scotland, Macdonald currently holds his coaching license from the Scotlish Football Association.

"In addition to his oustanding qualities as a mentor and friend, Neil is so easy to talk to and his door is always open to whatever we need as players," said former MSU defender Morgan McDonald (2001-04), who captained the Bulldogs her last two seasons in Starkville. "He has his serious side, but he always keeps practice fun with his sense of humor. I learned so much from him in the two years I played under him because he is such an amazing coach with great patience and treats every player as if they were part of his family."

B eginning her seventh year as a collegiate soccer coach, Ja'net Ezparza enters her fourth season at MSU, as well as her fourth working alongside Neil Macdonald, officially joining the Mississippi State staff on July 28, 2003.

Esparza's duties include, but are not limited to,

Esparza's duties include, but are not limited to, on-field instruction, day-to-day operations and recruiting. Esparza is also the coordinator of all Mississippi State Soccer Camps. She brings with her volumes of expertise in the areas of offensive coaching, student-athlete recruiting and program administration, as well as solid experience as a player.

"I feel that I am incredibly lucky to have Ja'net here at Mississippi State," Macdonald said. "She has an incredibly warm personality and is equally adored and respected by both the players and staff. She has the ability to create that family atmosphere that is important to any program and also makes very good observations about the game as well from a coaching standpoint. Because she has obviously played at a very high level of soccer, she has the abilities to translate that experience into her coaching. She is so valuable to this program and keeps it running at a high level each and every day."

Noted by UTEP as possibly the greatest women's

soccer player in school history, Esparza holds virtually every offensive record at the institution, including shots (169), goals (25), points (64) and game-winning goals (9). She was a four-time member of the WAC all-conference squad, three times selected to the first squad. and was twice selected to the league's academic honor roll. She was also the recipient of a handful of team awards as well, taking home Top Gun honors (team's leading scorer) as a sophomore, junior and senior.

In 1996, she was named WAC Freshman of the Year and, following the 1999 season, received the Arthur Ashe Jr. Scholar Athlete award. Her team's combined record over her final two seasons in El Paso was an impressive 21-14-4.

Following her playing career with the Miners, Esparza joined on to the UTEP coaching staff as a graduate assistant prior to the 2000 season, then became a full time staff

member for the 2001 campaign. Prior to the 2002 campaign, she earned a stint as an assistant coach with Birmingham Southern and helped lead the Panthers' first year Division I program to a respectable 5-11-2 record.

Over the course of the past two years, she has



eginning his seventh year as a collegiate soccer coach, Andy Manners enters his second season at MSU, but his fourth working alongside head coach Neil Macdonald, officially joining the Mississippi State staff on January 10, 2005. Manners' duties include, but are not limited to,

on-field instruction, day-to-day operations and recruiting. He is also in charge of scouting, purchasing and compliance.

"Andy is going to bring an awful lot to the table for us," Macdonald said. "He is a very intelligent person and he knows the game of soccer inside-out. He is a very good on-the-field coach and I don't know if I have ever worked with anyone better than he is. He is the type of guy that expects excellence from his players and will demand greatness from them everyday."

Manners comes to Starkville following a very suc-

cessful coaching career in Fort Dodge, lowa, where he was charged with the head coaching duties of both the Triton and Lady Triton soccer teams. As head coach of the nationally ranked ICCC programs the past two seasons, Manners collected a 33-6-3 record as head coach of the men's team and a 26-9-3 clip as skipper of the Lady Tritons.

Having secured the Region XI championship for the second straight season under Manners' guidance, the ICCC men concluded the 2004 campaign with a 15-4-3 record that was stopped short on a heartbreaking overtime loss to South Suburban CC in the district tournament. The Lady Tritons finished their season with a standout 13-5-1, but were stopped just shy of their seventh consecutive Region XI championship with a loss to Iowa Western in the region finals.
While in Fort Dodge,

Manners mentored three females and one male to NJCAA all-American accolades, while his tutelage also led to eight allregion accolades (five women) for his athletes.

Prior to his appointment as ICCC head coach, Manners served two stints (1999, 2001-02) as an assistant in Fort Dodge under Macdonald

where the duo led both squads to a pair of NJCAA national tournament berths.

"Neil and I worked alongside one another for three years in lowa and were very successful so I am excited for the opportunity to work with him again," Manners said. "He is an excellent coach and leader and he communicates well with his players at any level. I am looking forward to learning a lot from him, especially at the Division I level."

Manners played in 80 games (79 starts) during his career at George Mason (1994-97) and scored 35 points on 12 goals and 11 assists from his central defender position. While in Fairfax, Va., he helped lead the Patriots to a combined 44-32-

10 record, including a trip to the 1996 NCAA Tournament. A first team all-Colonial Association and second team all-Virginia honoree as a junior, Manners was also a three-time recipi-ent of CAA Scholar-Athlete laurels as well. In addition to his playing career at George Mason, Manners has also played professional soccer in England for both Watford and Sunderland.

Manners earned his Bachelor's of Science Degree in Health, Fitness and Recreation Resources from George Mason in 1998 before taking break from coaching in 2000 to earn his Master's Degree in Education from Augusta State in 2002.

A native of Sunderland England, Manners currently holds his 'B' coaching license from the United States Soccer Federation, an English 'C' coaching certificate and a NSCAA level 2 goalkeep-ing diploma. He is cur-

eginning her third year as a member of the B Mississippi State athletic training staff, Jennifer Layton begins her third season with the Mississippi State Soccer team as well. 

he Southeastern Conference, with its storied 74-year history of athletic achievements and academic excellence, has built perhaps the greatest tradition of intercollegiate competition of any league in the country since its inception in

The 2005-06 academic year was another season to remember for the SEC as conference teams captured six national titles and six national runner-up finishes. Since 1990, the SEC has won 113 national team championships for an average of more than six per year.

Arkansas won the conference's first NCAA title of the year in men's indoor track & field. Auburn won both the men and women's swimming & diving titles and Florida won the NCAA men's basketball championship. Georgia won the NCAA title in women's gymnastics and Auburn earned the women's outdoor track and field championship. Florida finished first among Southeastern Conference schools and fourth overall in the Sears

Trophy final standings. Overall, the SEC finished in the top two in 10 of its 20 sponsored sports and in the top five in 16 of the 20 sports. Six SEC teams participated in football postseason bowls with Alabama, Florida and LSU winning the Cotton, Outback and Peach Bowls, respectively. Six men's basketball teams were invited to the NCAA Tournament with Florida winning its first NCAA Men's Basketball Championship and LSU advancing to the Men's Final Four. Six women's basketball teams were also invited to the NCAA Tournament with LSU advancing to the Women's Final Four. An NCAA-high eight teams advanced to postseason play in baseball with Georgia advancing to the College World Series. With 159 teams advancing to NCAA postseason competition, the SEC continued to solidify its place as the nation's premier conference.

In addition to the six team championships, 71 SEC student-athletes garnered individual national

Conference has continued its rise as one of the top conferences in women's soccer.

The 2005 women's soccer season reaffirmed the SEC's prominence in the country. Four teams, including Florida, Ole Miss, Tennessee and Vanderbilt appeared in the 2005 NCAA Tournament, marking the 39th appearance by SEC teams in the NCAA Tournament. Tennessee lost in the second round to lead all SEC squads and Tennessee won the SEC Tournament. The Lady Vols were also the SEC Champion after posting a 10-1 regular-season mark. Auburn's Rhonda Brooks was named MVP of the SEC Tournament. Tennessee's Angela Kelly and Vanderbilt's Ronnie Hill shared SEC Coach of the Year honors. Georgia's Ali Williams was named SEC Offensive Player of the Year. Vanderbilt's Tyler Griffin was named SEC Defensive Player of the Year. Libby Probst of Alabama earned the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year award and Jennifer Hance of Ole Miss was the SEC Freshman of the Year.

SEC women's soccer will begin its 14th season in 2006 deeply rooted in the national scene of collegiate soccer. Since the SEC initiated women's soccer as a varsity sport in 1993, the sport's popularity has grown through the country and especially in the Southeast. A definitive point in the SEC's

women's soccer success came in 1995 when FOX Sports South broadcasted the SEC Tournament Championship match between Alabama and Kentucky on a tape-delayed basis, signifying the first appearance of an SEC women's soccer match on television.

Southeastern Conference women's soccer continued to grow over the next couple of years as the conference made a name for itself nationally. In 1998, the SEC had its breakout season with Florida winning the conference's first NCAA title in women's soccer in just the program's fourth year of existence. The league led the nation with six NCAA Tournament teams that year, an accomplishment which firmly inserted the SEC as one the major conferences in women's soccer. The SEC also made bigger strides in its television coverage with three regular season matches and the SEC Tournament championship match shown live on the SEC-TV package

In 2005, SEC-TV's women's soccer coverage was four regular-season matches, in addition to the SEC Tournament championship match. That incremental growth combined with increasing exposure on the national and regional scene has SEC women's soccer looking to blossom to new heights in the year 2006 and beyond.




HISSISSIPPI State EXCEILER EXCEILE

JERIOUS NORWOOD concluded his football career in 2005 as the school's single-game and career rushing leader. He was named winner of the Conerly Trophy as the state's top college football player, was selected to play in the Senior Bowl, and was taken by the Atlanta Falcons in the NFL Draft.



With a seating capacity of more than 7,000 and more space in the world-famous outfield, Sports Illustrated magazine named the park, the "Best Place To Watch College Baseball" in a 1997 issue.

NEWELL GRISSOM BUILDING:

The 12,000-square foot, hardwood-floored Newell-Grissom Building serves as the home for Mississippi State's volleyball program and serves as a practice facility for both of the school's basketball programs. A state-ofthe-art heating and air conditioning system was installed in 2004.

MSU has the largest enrollment in the state of Mississippi. Founded as a landgrant institution, its grass, flowers and trees are as prevalent as buildings, sidewalks and parking lots. Large enough to sport diversity in all areas, the university still maintains a warm, friendly atmosphere.

Ruby Hall, a residence hall with the largest single room size in university history, opened this past August. A co-residential, 160,000-square foot, three-story freshman hall, Ruby is located at the north end of campus, in convenient proximity to the Colvard Union, the Perry Cafeteria, Mitchell Memorial Library, the Sanderson Center and all athletic facilities. Ruby Hall offers students the latest in technology, including Ethernet access, full wireless internet coverage, a refrigerator and microwave, and free cable with HBO in each room. MSU freshman football players are housed in Ruby Hall.

The Colvard Union is a popular meeting place for MSU students. Whether working on a group project, enjoying the food court, or simply relaxing, the student union is one of the campus' main meeting places,

The Chapel of Memories and Carillon Tower were built with bricks from Old Main Dormltory, the largest residence hall in the country when constructed, later destroyed by fire In 1959. The Chapel of Memories, which hosts numerous weddings each year, is one of the most-recognized landmarks on campus,

The Drill Field, located squarely in the center of campus, shows the expanse of greenery for which the campus is famous.

The People's Universit The \$19 million, 150,000square foot Sanderson Center recreation complex opened to students in 1996. The state-ofthe art facility offers recreational opportunities in aquatics, fitness and aerobics, strength and conditioning, and intramural sports. When built in the 1920s, Perry Cafeteria was the largest dining hall in the country. The 300-foot long, Gothic style interior is one of the most beautiful buildings on the campus. It has accommodations for 600 students, faculty and staff and serves as the dining hall for MSU athletes. Located Immediately adjacent to the campus, the Cotton District is one of the most sought-after residential locations for the student body. In addition to New Orleans-style condominiums and apartments, restaurants and night clubs dot the neighborhood.

OUR MISSION

The university's fundamental purpose is to develop knowledgeable and skilled people who engage in the pursuit of intellectual truth, help constitute an informed electorate, and contribute to economic growth and prosperity. Mississippi State is committed to performing basic research to expand the bounds of knowledge, to using applied research to translate knowledge into practice, to providing service to institutions and organizations, and to providing education to its students.

Founded in 1878 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Mississippi, the land-grant institution became Mississippi State College in 1932. In 1958, it became Mississippi State University. The University has grown from its first class of 354 students in the fall of 1880 to more than 16,600 in the Fall of 2002. Today, more than 1,000 faculty members teach students from every county in Mississippi and every state in the United States, as well as international students from about 70 countries. More than 75 percent of our students hail from the Magnolia State, 20 percent are African-American and 54 percent are male. The student-faculty ratio is 17to-1 and approximately 85 percent of our faculty hold terminal dearees.

STATE OF MIND

Whether you are certain of your major, or are still weighing your options, we have what you need at State. Mississippi State offers around 80 majors through our eight colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences; Art and Design; Arts and Sciences; Business and Industry; Education; Bagley Engineering; Forest Resources; and Veterinary

Student-led tutoring and learning skills classes are offered by The Learning Center and can ease your transition to university life. In addition, faculty and staff members volunteer their time as mentors through the Division of Student Affairs, giving freshmen an automatic within the university.

Classes in the University Honors Program typically number no more than 20 students and are taught by some of the university's top professors. The small classes allow you to receive individualized nstruction and challenge you to explore your potential.

Mississippi State offers an exciting way to enhance your education through Learning Communities. These "communities" consist of faculty and students who share a common academic or cultural

Linking such subjects as creative writing and art history. the interactive learning experiences are designed to foster critical thinking and writing. The Career Center, along with academic advising and classroom participation, will help you choose the right path.

The Career Center is especially valuable around graduation

time, but the center helps with any type job search, including parttime and summer employment while you're still in school, as well as providing tools to determine your career strengths. It also houses the Cooperative Education Program that lets you alternate a semester of school with a semester of work at companies such as U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Dow Chemical, Georgia Pacific and Lane

Maybe you've always dreamed of spending time in anothculture. MSU participates in the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad, a regional consortium of universities that provide courses in English-speaking countries abroad. Mississippi State also subscribes to semester-long and summer study abroad opportunities through International Studies Abroad. In addition, the university is a member of the National Student Exchange (NSE) program, a consortium of more than 175 colleges and universities in the United States and Canada. The NSE allows eligible students to attend a college or university in another state for up to one calendar year without having to pay out-of-state tuition.

Of course, there are different ways of learning and for those who like the thrill of discovery, we offer a multitude of research opportunities, both in and out of a lab.

Envision yourself as a cyber sleuth, tracking down Internet outlaws who take advantage of the information available on the Web? Mississippi State's Center for Computer Security Research is certified by the National Security Agency. The center offers the computer-savvy a chance to take a "byte" out of crime through its scholarship-for service program. A scientist in the College of Veterinary Medicine is studying poultry for ways to better diagnose and treat people who are suffering from cancer. The investigator began the project as a student.

cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and field and volleyball. Our seven men's sports are baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, tennis, track and field and football. And, of course, our facilities for watching SEC sporting events are first class. Dudy Noble Field, Polk-Dement Stadium has long been regarded as one of the best campus venues for college baseball in America.

Dudy Noble can seat nearly 7,500 diehard baseball fans in skyboxes, chairback seats and bleachers, but when you add in the famous "Left Field Lounge," it's standing room only. In fact, MSU claimed the NCAA record for the largest campus baseball crowd ever when 14,991 crowded into the facility for a 1989 doubleheader with the University of Florida. That record is still unbroken.

Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field, home of the football Bulldogs, recently underwent a \$30 million expansion and renovation to add skyboxes and additional seating. But, don't worry; there's still plenty of room left around the stadium for tailgating.

And what's Winter without watching basketball at Humphrey Coliseum? Students line up the night before tickets go on sale to get their discounted seats in "The Hump" so they can cheer the Bulldogs to another anticipated SEC championship crown. The men's program has earned back-to-back Western Division crowns, an SEC Tournament victory and an outright SEC championship title since 2001. And, the women's team has had two players selected Nos. 1 and 2 in the Women's National Basketball Association draft in the past three years.

Our other programs have seen success as well. Men's tennis consistently has been ranked in the top 20 nationally and head coach Sylvain Guichard shared the 2005 SEC Coach of the Year title with mentor and former MSU tennis coach Andy Jackson of Florida. For the past few years, the track and field program has finished the season ranked nationally and one runner recently won the university's first indoor national championship.

Maybe you would rather experience that thrill of victory for yourself. For you, there are club sports and intramurals, such as flag football, basketball and softball; Rugby; cricket; soccer; lacrosse; paintball; rock climbing; fencing; martial arts; scuba diving; cycling; and hiking.

Our beautiful recreation facility, the Joe Frank Sanders Center, provides six courts for basketball, volleyball and badminton, an indoor pool, and eight racquetball courts. And for those who enjoy working out for fitness, the center offers an indoor running track, a 26-foot climbing wall, three aerobic studios, and a 10,000-square foot strength and aerobic conditioning room.

Mississippi State's residence halls are a lot more than just a place to sleep - they're part of the thriving "city" of campus. In most cases, you're a quick walk away from classrooms, meeting places and dining facilities.

Everybody likes to eat and we give you a lot of great choices from the food court in the Colvard Union to the home cooking in the historic Perry Cafeteria; Gooch's Deli, featuring Stone Willy's Pizza, in the One-Stop convenience store; and famous MSU ice cream, baked goods and Starbucks coffee in the State Fountain Bakery.

You'll also be able to grab a snack at McArthur Court in McArthur Hall and Food

for Thought in Mitchell Memorial Library. And, if you're over at the Wise Center, which houses our College of Veterinary Medicine, you'll love eating at the Pegasus Dining Room.

Of course, living in our residence halls keeps you close to the snacks - and the action. But, our halls aren't like your parents' old "dorm" rooms. All rooms offer Internet access, as well as cable TV and local telephone service with call waiting, voice mail and caller I.D. capability. Each room is also equipped with a refrigerator/freezer/microwave combination unit.

Even more exciting is our newest residence hall - Ruby Hall which opened for freshmen in Fall, 2005. The 400-bed facility is the first on campus to offer private baths and is fully furnished. The second phase of construction calls for another new residence hall - this one housing 800 students - to be constructed soon.

And it's not all about convenience. We also strive to keep our residence halls safe. Each hall has controlled card-reader access, fire extinguishers and a fire security system. Each room, in turn, is

equipped with a smoke detector and deadbolt lock.

The MSU Police Department and staff members from the Department of Housing and Residence Life operate as partners and are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In addition, MSU police programs such as Cops-on-Bikes, Residence Hall Adopt-a-Cop, Operation Identification, community policing, and library patrol help ensure your safety.

There's also a shuttle system that operates throughout campus, including our new night shuttle route. Every Thursday-Saturday night, a shuttle will carry you off campus to various Starkville businesses for a little weekend fun.

There's no fun to be found if you're sick, though. The John C. Longest Student Health Center s convenient when you're under the weather. Fully accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, the center is fully staffed with physicians and nurses and there's no charge to students for office visits. A pharmacy is located on-site to provide additional convenience.

Robert H. Foglesong is the 18th president fo Mississippi State University, a land-grant

university committed to excellence in learning, research and service. His vision is for MSU to become the most respected land-grant school in the Southeast. As president, he is responsible for planning, budgeting, and executionfor the largest university in the state of Mississippi. He is also the president and executive director of the Appalachian Leadership and Education Foundation, a nonprofit organization operating to identify our next generation of leaders in Appalachia and mento/financially support their journey toward academic, leadership, and character excellence. He's a direcor of Massey Energy, of of the largest producers of coal in the nation, and a director of the Michael Baker Corp., an international energy and engineering firm. He also has been designated by President George W. Bush to co-chair the United State-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs.

Previously, he was nominated by the President,

Previously, he was nominated by the President, confirmed by the U.S. Senate, and served as a four-star general in the United States Air Force. He had responsibility for policy recommendations and implementation of policy relative to personnel, operations, infrastructure and intra/inter governmental affairs for an organization of 358,000 uniformed members and 158,000 civilian employees. He was responsible for planing/programming for future strategies involving an annual budget of \$90 billion (equivilant to the position of chief operating oficer for a company ranked No. 9 on the Fortune 500 list). His jobs required almost daily interface with members of Congress, the White House, and many governmental interagency offices.

Foglesong spent a significant amount of the past decade as a national security advisor at Cabinet and Presidential levels. In this capacity, he had opportunities to travel extensively with the most senior members of the government and directly engage with the most senior civilian and military levels of foreign governments around the globe.

Foglesong has spent 33 years in public service with a clear understanding of the role leadership plays in establishing a sense of integrity/ethics, encouraging service above self, and fost. He has received numerous awards for his demonstrated leadership. In addition, he has continued his education by attending professional military education schools, as well as advanced civilian education forums. He is a member of several professional aviation organizations and a membe of the Council on Foreign Relations. His 57 publications cover a range of subjects including technical and leadershp topics. A graduate of West Virginia University (bachelor's, master's and doctorate), he was a member and president of Tau Beta Pi, the national engineering honorary, as well as numerous other academic honoraries.

He has accumulated 30 military awards for leadership and technical skills. He holds an honorary Doctorate of Strategic Intelligence. He is married to Mary Thrasher Foglesong. They have two sons--David, married to Laura, and father of two sons (Robert and David), and Mark. David is in the United State Air Force, as is Laura. Mark is in the television business. Foglesong's hobies include running marathons, collecting slide rules, collecting potato mashers and public speaking.

reating an atmosphere for student-athlete achievement on the playing field and in the classroom, providing the means for a healthy financial bottom line, and keeping personnel achieving at a productive best are just some of the requirements of the collegiate director of athletics. On all accounts, Mississippi State University's Larry Templeton is a resounding success.

Mississippi State competes for championships in every sport program while its athletes continue to excel in the classroom. The department has operated in the black while expanding its varsity athletic sport program and drastically improving its facilities.

Templeton has overseen all that and more as the head of the program. He is the third-longest-tenured AD in MSU history and the longest in the Southeastern Conference with 19 seasons under his belt, and the university's athletic program has reached heights never before achieved under his guidance.

During the 2004-05 school year, team and individual athletic accomplishments continued to reach new heights. Men's and women's basketball qualified for postseason competition in 2004-05, a fourth-straight NCAA appearance by the men and the seventh postseason showing in eight years for the women. Baseball won the SEC Tournament title in 2005, marking the sport's second conference title since 2001. Softball remained an NCAA Tournament fixture, qualifying for its fifth NCAA Regional appearance in six years, while the men's tennis program earned its 14th consecutive NCAA Tournament bid.

But State's student-athletes are not just succeeding on the playing field. MSU's men's and women's athletes recorded the highest combined grade point average during the 2004-05 academic year in the 15 years in which student-athlete grades were tracked. In 12 of the last 14 years, the Bulldog football team has been one of just a handful of schools cited by the American Football Coaches Association for having a graduation rate exceeding 70 percent. MSU is the only school in the SEC to make that list with that much frequency. In Spring, 2005, 141 of the 269 scholarship student-athletes at Mississippi State (52 percent) earned a grade point average of 3.00 or higher. Seventy-five scholarship student-athletes made either the Dean's List (3.5 GPA) or the President's Scholar List (3.8 GPA).

MSU has produced the Southeastern Conference's Male and Female Scholar-Athlete of the

MSU has produced the Southeastern Conference's Male and Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year three times each during Templeton's tenure. State is second among league schools in number of Academic All-SEC selections in the sports in which MSU competes.

Templeton oversaw Mississippi State's move to come into compliance with the SEC's

Templeton oversaw Mississippi State's move to come into compliance with the SEC's Gender Equity plan, adding women's soccer and softball to the school's varsity sport menu. The first season of soccer was in 1995, while softball began competition in 1997. Since that time, the soccer team has won the SEC Western Division title (2001) and the softball team has never had a losing season and has qualified for NCAA postseason play five of the last seven years.

a losing season and has qualified for INCAA postseason play five of the last seven years.

And for the 18th year in a row this past year, the MSU athletic program joined just a small group of NCAA Division I schools nation-wide to finish in the black financially at year's end. Both the local and national media have noticed the work done by Templeton at MSU. The State men's program was ranked second-best in the SEC in a 1996 New York Times poll. And Templeton was chosen 1998 Sports Person of the Year in the state of Mississippi by the Jackson Clarion-locator.

Templeton's work also stretches far from the Starkville campus. He serves as chairman of the SEC's athletic directors and is serving a second team on the NCAA Baseball Committee. He is a former member of the NCAA Championship Committee and the NCAA Bowl Certification

Templeton is married to the former Linda Jo Nichols. They have a son, Brian, who received his second degree (landscape architecture) at Mississippi State in May 2002. A second son, Stephen, received his doctorate from Mississippi State in August 2002, and a daughter, Nici, is an attorney in Columbia, S.C.

Mississippi State Director of Athletics Larry Templeton has named Ann Carr the school's Senior Woman Administrator.

A veteran of 12 years in athletic administration at MSU and a former Lady Bulldog athlete, Carr succeeds Samye Johnson, who retired as the university's SWA this past June.

Carr is in her second stint within the State athletic department. She assumes her new role following seven years as Assistant Athletic Director for Student Life. In that position, she worked with the personal development of MSU's student-athletes in addition to continuing her prior responsibilities as academic counselor for the Bulldog football team. Carr serves as the director of the department's Life Skills program, which includes

the support systems and career programs for all MSU student-athletes, and its CHAMPS program (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success).

As SWA, Carr will oversee the operation and supervision of MSU's women's sport program.

Hired in 1993 as an assistant director in the athletic academic office, she returned full-time to MState in 1999 following a one-year stay in a similar capacity at the University of Southern Mississippi.

A native of Brookhaven, Miss., Carr was a four-year letter winner on the Mississippi State women's basketball team (1986-90). A 1990 graduate of State, she later earned her master's degree in counseling from the institution in 1992.

When Carr finished her women's basketball playing career in 1990, she ranked first on the career leaders list in free-throw percentage, shooting 75.8 percent over a four-year span. She also ranked 12th on the career points list, having scored 762 points in her tenure, averaging 8.3 points per contest. In rebounding, Carr brought down 597 boards (6.5 per game) to finish her career sixth on the all-time list in rebounds and rebounding average. She also finished her career holding the individual record in most three-point field goals made (five) in a single game.

ATHLETIC ACADEMICS

he MSU Athletic Academic Office is committed to preparing Mississippi State University student-athletes for life after college. In order to accomplish this mission, the Athletic Academic Office will provide quality programs and services to facilitate graduation and promote the overall development of our student-athletes. The student services provided by the Athletic Academic Office are designed to promote the personal, educational and career development of the student-athletes. The Athletic Academic staff is committed to empowering student-athletes to develop independence, self-reliance, personal values, lead-

ership skills, and responsibility for their own lives. The primary purpose of the Athletic Academic Office is to provide quality academic assistance to MSU student-athletes during their tenure at the university and beyond. Assisting student-athletes in the successful completion of their degrees is our main concern. In order to accomplish this mission, the Athletic Academic office has developed programs and activities in areas such as CHAMPS/Life Skills, Orientation, Academic Advisement, Academic Mentoring, Tutorial Services, Development, Study Skills, Career Exploration and Development and Life Management

ADVISEMENT

The Athletic Academic Office assigns counselors program participants' sport. Academic Counselors assist student-athletes with class advising, tutoring, mentoring with career development, and selected petition processes. Counselors also serve as a resource for students in personal development areas including management of test anxieties, personal counseling and developing time management skills. Athletic Academic Counselors assist student-athletes throughout their educational experience at Mississippi State University and are available on both a walk-in basis and through scheduled appointments. All student-athletes are encouraged to utilize the Athletic Academic Counselor services.

In just eight seasons, the Mississippi State Women's Soccer program has established itself not only on the field, but also in the classroom. The Bulldog soccer team continued a lasting tradition for itself in 2002 as a school record 13 players were named to the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll. The number also brought the total number of Mississippi State athletes that have been honored to 62 in the seven seasons that any SEC soccer player has been eligible for the award.

The Bulldog soccer team has played a vital role in helping the overall athletics program at Mississippi State garner national recognition for its high marks in the classroom and in the athletic arena. Each year, Mississippi State University produces a lion's share of Academic All-Southeastern Conference classroom

The goal now is to increase this level of academic success. This is a daunting task for athletes competing with a full load of classes and a full schedule of opponents and practices. However, Bulldog athletes continue to prove that they are up to the challenge as, each year, its number of academic all-SEC honor roll members increase.

The secret behind the academic success for Bulldog athletes is Mississippi State's athletic academic counselors, headed by Assistant Athletic Directors Ray Berryhill and Ann Carr, along with academic counselors Lynda Moore and Dow Thomas. Joining this group are two graduate assistants and 40 part-time tutors who work in Hathorne Hall.

The Athletics Academic staff works as a liaison between the Athletics Department, undergraduate divisions and the administrative office of Mississippi State University. The staff offers career advice and counseling, makes sure all athletes are maintaining satisfactory progress toward their degrees and monitors

ASSESSMENT

The Athletic Academic Office provides educational skills assessment for all incoming student-athletes. The assessment process is designed to provide the student-athletes and counselors with knowledge of student-athlete's strengths and weaknesses in such contain areas as reading, writing, and mathematics. With this information, Athletic Academic Counselors can determine if student-athletes possess the necessary skills to succeed in standard entry-level courses at MSU. Scores below the established minimum do not disqualify a student-athlete from continuing and achieving scholastic success at MSU. It may however, indicate a need for additional testing, enrollment in developmental courses and/or the use of the various academic services provided on campus for the student's ultimate collegiate success. The focus of the assessment process is to ensure that all student-athletes have available all appropriate academic support services to have a successful academic experience

SUPERVISED STUDY

Supervised study is a monitored study program designed to provide student-athletes with organized study/tutoring time in flexible environment conducive to successful learning. Study sessions are required for all first semester freshmen, transfer student-athletes and any student-athlete whom the appropriate coaching staff and the Athletic Academic Office staff believe would benefit from the experience. Study sessions are to provide a more structured environment to assist student-athletes in their transition from high school to college. Any study area or learning center is available for use during these times. The hours required by the student's adviser will be totaled at the end of each week. The ultimate goal of supervised study is to assist student-athletes in developing their intellectual and academic potential and to familiarize the student with all services offered by the academic center.

TUTORING

Tutors are provided for student-athletes in all subject areas. They are available on a one-to-one basis and in small group sessions. The Athletic Academic staff may recommend tutors for you, or you can request one for yourself. Tutoring services are usually arranged on an appointment basis. Student-athletes are expected to keep all tutoring appointments they schedule.

MEASURING SUCCESS

Over the past eight academic seasons, MSU trails just Florida in the number of its student-athletes which receive academic all-conference accolades. In the measure of the sport of soccer alone, Mississippi State has produced a lion's share of academic all-SEC honorees since the sport's inception in 1995. The Bulldogs have decorated 43 different MSU soccer athletes with the honor in the nine seasons that any MSU player has been eligible for the award. A total of 26 of those athletes have earned the laurel on more than one occa-

THE BULLDOG STORY

ississippi State University athletic teams are called Bulldogs, a name earned and maintained over the decades by the tough, tenacious play of student-athletes wearing the Maroon and White. The official school mascot is an American Kennel Club registered English Bulldog, given the inherited title of 'Bully.'

inherited title of Bully.

As with most universities, Mississippi State
University teams answered to different nicknames
through the years. The first squads representing
Mississippi A&M College were proud to be called
Aggies. When the
school officially

a proud to be called Aggies. When the school officially became Mississippi State College in 1932, the nickname Maroons, for MSU's uniform color, gained prominence. Bulldogs became the official title for State teams in 1961, not long after State College was granted university status.

Yet references to school teams and athletes as Bulldogs actually go back to early in the century, and this nickname was used almost interchangeably with both Aggies and Maroons, since at least 1905.

On November 30

On November 30 of that year, the A&M football team shut out their archrivals from the University of Mississippi 11-0 in Jackson, Miss. The campus newspaper, The Reflector, reported: "After the game, filled with that emotion that accompanies every great victory, there was nothing left for the cadets to do but to complete the great victory by showing sympathy for the dead athletic spirit of the University, by having a military funeral parade.

"A coffin was secured, decorated with University colors and a bulldog pup placed on top. It was then placed on the shoulders of a dozen cadets, and the procession started down Capitol Street, preceded by the brass band playing a very pathetic funeral march."

Other newspaper reports of the victory commented on the 'bulldog' style of play by the A&M eleven, and the Bulldog was soon publicly

accepted as a school athletic symbol. Accounts of a 1926 pep rally in Meridian, Miss., had another bulldog

Josephany in Meridian, Miss., had another buildog parading with students.

Use as an official game mascot began in 1935 when coach Major Ralph Sasse, on 'orders' from his team, went to Memphis, Tenn., to select a bulldog. Ptolemy, a gift of the Edgar Webster family, was chosen and the Bulldogs promptly defeated Alabama 20-7

A litter-mate of Ptolemy became the first mascot called 'Bully' shortly after Sasse's team beat mighty Army 13-7 at West Point that same year - perhaps the greatest victory in MSU football history. But Bully I

earned other fame the hard way, in 1939 when a campus bus cut short his career.

Days of campus mourning followed, as Bully lay in state in a glass coffin. A half-mile funeral procession accompanied by the Famous Maroon Band and three ROTC battalions went to Scott Field where Bully was buried under the bench at the 50-yard line. Even *Life* magazine covered the event. Other Bullys have since been buried by campus dorms, fraternity houses, and also at the football stadium.

For years Bully was a target for kidnappers, the last incident occurring prior to the 1974 State-Ole

Miss game. The Bulldog team won anyway, 31-13. While early Bullys once roamed campus freely or lived in fraternities, today the official university mascot is housed at the School of Veterinary Medicine when not on duty at State home football games. For all their fierce appearance and reputation, today's mascot bulldogs are good-natured, friendly animals and favorites with children.

A student wearing a Bulldog suit, also answering to Bully, is part of the cheerleading team and assists in stirring up State spirit at games and pep rallies.

Final Tribute Paid To Bully

November 22, 1939

Bully, beloved English Bulldog mascot of Mississippi State Athletic teams, was buried beneath the gridiron turf of Scott Field on Tuesday's cold and cloudy afternoon as more than 2,500 students and citizens of Starkville and State College joined in singing "Tention Maroon and White," State's fighting song.

Seldom, if ever, has a dog ever been given such an elaborate burial. Killed when run over by a bus Sunday afternoon (Nov. 19), Bully was embalmed and his body lay in state in a campus building (Lee Hall) until noon today. The glasstop casket was surrounded by more than a dozen wreaths of beautiful flowers.

The entire cadet corps, three battalions strong, the Maroon band of 86 pieces, the football squad, every student and many visitors took part in the half-mile procession and paid Bully a final tribute as he was buried beneath the State players' bench on Scott Field.

players' bench on Scott Field.

The Colonel Club, student service organization, bore the Maroon and White-covered casket to the burial place. John Beard, student president, placed a wreath on the grave as Sam Wilhite read the late Senator Vest's "An Eulogy to a Dog." The big crowd gave the now famous 'Bully Growl' and, after members of the football team had dropped flowers on the grave, the procession headed back to the campus chanting "Beat Ole Miss."



MSU TRADITIONS

MAROON & WHITE

he most unique and certainly the most resounding symbol of Mississippi State University tradition is the cowbell. Despite decades of attempts by opponents and authorities to banish it from scenes of competition, diehard State fans still celebrate Bulldog victories loudly and proudly with the distinctive sound of ringing cowbells.

The precise origin of the cowbell as a fixture of MSU sports tradition remains unclear to this day. The best records have cowbells gradually introduced to the MSU sports scene in the late 1930s and early 1940s, coinciding with the 'golden age' of MSU football success prior to World War II.

The most popular legend is that during a home football game between State and archival Mississippi, a jersey cow wandered onto the playing field. Mississippi State soundly whipped the Rebels that Saturday, and State College students immediately adopted the cow as a good luck charm. Students are said to have continued bringing a cow to football games for a while, until the practice was eventually discontinued in favor of bringing just the cow's bell.

Whatever the origin, it is certain that by the 1950s cowbells were common at MSU games, and by the 1960s were established as the special symbol of Mississippi State. Ironically, the cowbell's popularity grew most rapidly during the long years when State football teams were rarely successful. Flaunting this anachronism from the 'aggie' days was a proud response by students and alumm to outsider scorn of the university's

'cow college' history.

In the 1960s two MSU professors, Earl W. Terrell and Ralph L. Reeves obliged some students by welding handles on the bells so they could be rung with much more convenience and authority. By 1963 the demand for these longhandled cowbells could not be filled by home workshops alone so, at the suggestion of Reeves, the Student Association bought bells in bulk and the Industrial Education Club agreed to weld on handles. In 1964, the MSU Bookstore began marketing these cowbells with a portion of profits returning to those organizations.

Today many styles of cowbells are available

Today many styles of cowbells are available on campus and around Starkville, with the top-of-the-line being a heavy chrome-plated model with a full Bulldog figurine handle. But experts insist the best and loudest results are produced by a classic long-handled, bicycle-grip bell made of thinner and tightly-welded shells.

Cowbells decorate offices and homes of Mississippi State alumni, and are passed down through generations of Bulldog fans. But they are not heard at Southeastern Conference games—not legally, at least—since the 1974 adoption of a conference rule against 'artificial noisemakers' at football and basketball games. On a 9-1 vote, SEC schools ruled cowbells a disruption and banned them.

This has done little harm to the cowbell's popularity, however, or to prevent cowbells from being heard outside stadiums in which the Bulldogs are playing. They can still be heard at non-conference football contests, as well as other sporting events on campus. And bold Bulldog fans still risk confiscation for the privilege of keeping a unique Mississippi State tradition alive and ringing at SEC affairs.

aroon and White are the distinctive colors of Mississippi State athletic teams, dating back over a century to the very first football game ever played by the school's student-athletes.

On November 15, 1895, the first Mississippi A&M football team was preparing for a road trip to Jackson, Tenn., to play Southern Baptist University (now Union University) the following day. Since every college was supposed to have its own uniform colors, the A&M student body requested that the school's team select a suitable combination.

Considering this choice to be an honor, the inaugural State team gave the privilege to team captain W.M. Matthews. Reports say Matthews chose Maroon and White without hesitation.

In the 101 years since, every Mississippi State athlete has donned the Maroon and White in some sort of combination. Often a shade of gray has been added to the scheme, such as for the numerals.

Briefly in the 1980s, the men's and women's basketball teams wore all-gray uniforms with maroon and white trim, while football has at times sported silver game pants, and baseball will often wear all-gray road outfits.

Only once has an MSU team appeared in any other color combination. In 1938, football coach Spike Nelson secretly had cardinal and gold uniforms made for State, a selection that did not sit well with the team or the college at the first game. Neither the uniforms nor Nelson were back for the next season.
