THE BOB HARTLEY MEMORIAL FELLOWSHIP

Providing training opportunities for young SIDs



Bob Hartley

For more than half a century Robert M. "Bob" Hartley dedicated his life's work to promoting Mississippi State University athletics. From his hiring as the school's first sports publicity director in August 1946 to his initial "retirement" as assistant athletic director for communications in June 1985, through his later years as an invaluable consultant for the Mississippi State University Department of Athletics, the man we called "Hart" gave special meaning to the words "loyalty" and "devotion to duty."

Mr. Bob's labors of love with MSU have not gone unrecognized. He has taken his place among college athletics' greats as a member of both the university's and the state's sports halls of fame and the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Hall of Fame.

His willingness to generously give of his talent, his time and his friendship serves as an inspiration to the countless lives he touched and to those that aspire to follow in his footsteps.

In that respect, the Bob Hartley Memorial Fellowship was created by the MSU Department of Athletics to provide hands-on training opportunities for young media relations practitioners.

Tony Schmidt was selected as the fifth recipient of the Bob Hartley Memorial Fellowship for the 2005-06 academic year and is continuing in that position in 2006-07. A native of Starkville, Miss., Schmidt earned his bachelor's degree at Mississippi State in interdisciplinary studies in 2005, with an emphasis in public relations and sports communication. He worked as a student assistant in the MSU athletic media relations office for four years, serving as the contact for the MSU men's golf team in both 2003-04 and 2004-05.

Schmidt is currently pursuing a master's degree in sports administration at Mississippi State.

Mississippi State reached several significant milestones a year ago as the Volleyball Bulldogs advanced a few rungs on the ladder of volleyball respectability in 2005.

- a 15-12 record, the program's first winning campaign since 2000 and its third in the past 15 seasons
- a school-record six wins in rugged Southeastern Conference play and a program-best seventh-place finish in the 11-team SEC Volleyball Tournament since the postseason event became an eight-team tournament in 1998
- a No. 66 in-season national computer ranking (RichKern.com), the highest such national ranking ever in 31 seasons of Mississippi State volleyball

Armed with a team that features a blend of battle-tested veterans and talented but eager newcomers, third-year Mississippi State volleyball coach Tina Seals and the Bulldogs are primed for even greater heights in 2006.

"As a team we were able to achieve a good many of our goals last year," said Seals. "I was particularly proud of the way we played down the stretch, winning four of our last six matches to set the Mississippi State record for SEC wins and earning a berth in the Southeastern Conference Tournament. That was important step for our program to take."

The next step in the progression would be to challenge for a school-first berth in the 64-team field of the NCAA Volleyball Tournament.

"We want to move to the upper half of the Southeastern Conference," continued Seals. "With the strength of the SEC, an upper division finish would also mean we're in contention for NCAA postseason competition. That's quite a lofty goal, especially when you consider how far we've come in a relatively short period of time."

In 2006 Mississippi State returns four starting regulars and two other letter-winners from last year's 15-12 edition. Just one of the returnees is a senior --- Hungarian-born outside hitter Orshi Kriegel. Three of the returning veterans --- opposite hitter Jamie Joyner, libero Megan Lukasek, and middle blocker Erin Seago, are

third-year members of the Mississippi State team and part of a 2003-04 MSU recruiting class that was ranked among the nation's top 50.

Also returning are junior setter Eva Kriegel of Jaszbereny, Hungary, and sophomore outside hitter Cristina Jucan from Cluj, Romania.

The MSU coaching staff has added six newcomers for 2006 --- a trio of signees from the high school ranks (middle blocker Stefanie

Joyner, St. Louis, Mo., setter Emily Tooker from Gladstone, Australia, and middle hitter Ioana Demian from Baia Mare, Romania), a mid-year transfer (junior middle blocker Lauren Kowal from Chesterfield, Mo., via Xavier University) and a pair of non-scholarship walk-on players (setter Dorey Gray from Indian Harbour Beach, Fla., and libero Jennifer Hauskey from Springdale, Ark.).

"We had a productive off-season training program in the spring, so we'll enter the new season with veteran players that are well-acclimated to our playing system," said Seals. "As it is every

year, one of the biggest challenges we face is getting the new players plugged into a new system and comfortable with their new surroundings, teammates and coaches as quickly as possible."

SISTER ACT TIMES TWO

The 2006 Mississippi State volleyball roster includes two sets of sisters. The Kriegel sisters --- senior outside hitter Orshi and junior setter Eva hail from Jaszbereny, Hungary. Junior opposite hitter Jamie Joyner is reunited on the same team this fall with her sister Stefanie. The Joyners are from St. Louis, Mo.

WHAT'S NEW FOR 2006?

In 2005 an air conditioning system was added to the Newell-Grissom Building, home of the Volleyball Bulldogs. This year fans will have find a much more comfortable seating arrangement for watching Mississippi State's home matches.

Nearly 600 maroon chairback seats were installed in the east side stands at Newell-Grissom, replacing the wooden bench style seating. A "Best Seat In The House" sales campaign through Mississippi State's Bulldog Club (662-325-3074) is under way to help finance the project.

"It enhances the aesthetics of the Newell-Grissom Building and provides a more comfortable seating option for our fans," said Tina Seals. "We hope to be able to extend this chairback seating project on to the west side in the future."

SEC ENDS TOURNEY, EXPANDS LEAGUE SCHEDULE

The road to the NCAA Tournament will not pass through an SEC Tournament in 2006. League

volleyball coaches and administrators voted to discontinue the eight-team postseason event, opting instead to add four matches and two weekends of competition to the SEC schedule. Each team will now play matches at home and on road against each of the other 10 league volleyball teams, creating a 20-match conference schedule that will span 10 weeks. The SEC's regular season champion will now receive the league's automatic qualifying berth in December's NCAA Tournament.

Here's a position-by-position summary at the 2006 Volleyball Bulldogs:

Setter --- In her first season last fall, Eva Kriegel worked her way into a starting role as State's setter, leading the Bulldogs with 598 assists. But the younger sister of offensive star Orshi Kriegel proved to be an invaluable asset in other areas. The left-handed hitting Kriegel ranked fourth on the team in kills (201) and digs (241) and became the first MSU volleyball player to register multiple "triple-doubles" in a season with four. Two first-year Bulldogs will serve as her backups --- 6-1 freshman Emily Tooker, the first Australian (Gladstone, Aus.) to sign with MSU in volleyball, and Dorey Gray, a promising 5-11 high school standout from Indian Harbour Beach, Fla., who joined the team as a walk-on.

Outside Hitter --- There's little doubt that Bulldog standout Orshi Kriegel, a third-year senior player from Jaszbereny, Hungary, is State's "go-to" player in 2006. It's a leadership role on offense that she inherited from departed four-year MSU standout Rachel Cooper. Kriegel totaled 319 and 13 "double-doubles" last fall working in tandem with Cooper. Sophomore Crista Jucan from Cluj, Romania, is MSU's other rostered outside hitter. Jucan made great gains during State's spring training session after being used primarily in a reserve role as a freshman in 2005 and can be expected to play a much bigger role in 2006. Freshman Ioana Demian, another Romanian, is also in the mix.

Opposite Hitter --- Left-handed hitting junior Jamie Joyner of St. Louis, Mo., is poised for a breakout year as MSU's opposite hitter. She was one of MSU's more efficient offensive players as a sophomore last fall, totaling 219 kills and a .221 hitting percentage, second-highest on the team. She also was a force at the net, ranking third on the team and second among MSU's '06 returnees with 51 total blocks.

Middle Blocker --- Junior Erin Seago of Rockford, Ill., ranked second on the team with 78 total blocks last year, including 12 solo stops. She was also a productive offensive performer at the net, tallying 164 kills and a team-leading .319 hitting percentage. Seago is joined at the net by a pair of newcomers --- junior Lauren Kowal of Chesterfield, Mo., and a transfer from Xavier University in Ohio, and freshman signee Stefanie Joyner of St. Louis, Mo. Kowal played two seasons at Xavier before transferring to State in time to benefit from MSU's off-season practices. Joyner is the talented younger sister of MSU junior opposite hitter Jamie Joyner.

Libero --- Junior Megan Lukasek of St. Louis, Mo., enjoyed her most productive season as MSU's libero in 2005, leading the team and ranking seventh in the SEC with 395 digs. Like setter Eva Kriegel, Lukasek's prime back-up is a freshman, Jennifer Hauskey, a walk-on from Springdale, Ark.

Tina (Burcham) Seals, who during her collegiate career became one of Mississippi State University's first standout volleyball performers, is in her third season as head coach of the Volleyball Bulldogs.

Seals joined the Mississippi State University Athletic Department family in March 2004, becoming the ninth head coach in the program's 32-year history.

Over the span of two short seasons, the Florence, Ala., native has engineered an impressive resurgence in the Mississippi State volleyball program.

In her first season at the MSU helm Seals guided the Bulldogs to one of the program's biggest turnarounds. Inheriting a team that posted a 3-23 showing in 2003, Seals directed her initial Mississippi State team to a 14-16 overall worksheet in 2004, an 11-win improvement. That team, picked by league coaches for a last place finish in the rugged Southeastern Conference, tied a school record with five league wins and finished tied for eighth in the overall league standings, just missing a berth in the eight-team field of the SEC tournament.

MSU was ranked No. 267 nationally by RichKern.com prior to the start of the '04 campaign and finished at No. 156.

Seals' 2005 edition climbed further up the ladder, posting a 15-12 worksheet, the program's seventh winning campaign in 31 seasons and only its second in 13 seasons. Along the way the Bulldogs established a school record with six SEC wins and earned the school's first berth in the SEC Tournament since qualification standards were put in place following the 1998 season.

During the '05 season RichKern.com ranked the Bulldogs as high as No. 66 --- the highest in-season national ranking ever for a Mississippi State volleyball. After spending much of the year ranked in the top 100, State finished the year at No. 111, also a school-best. The '06 Bulldogs begin the year with a Pablo system ranking of No. 77.

Prior to coming to MSU Seals enjoyed a highly-successful 12-year run as head volleyball coach at Northwest-Shoals Community College in Muscle Shoals, Ala.

A native of Florence, Ala., she launched her coaching career at Northwest-Shoals Community College in 1992, the inaugural year for the sport at NW-SCC. She quickly built the program into a perennial power in the Alabama junior college ranks, compiling a remarkable 444-137 record (.764) in 12 seasons.



Seals' first team posted a 28-12 record and finished runner-up in Alabama. Her teams won 30 or more matches over the next 11 seasons, first eclipsing the 40-win mark with a 47-7 mark in 1999 and later re-setting the school win record with a 51-5 worksheet in 2001.

Her final Northwest-Shoals team compiled a 40-15 record, captured the Alabama state championship and advanced to the 2003 NJCAA tournament.

Seals teams dominated the junior college scene in Alabama. In 12 seasons the Patriots claimed seven state titles and registered four second place finishes. Her last five teams concluded play with top 20 rankings, including the 2000 edition that posted a 47-9 record and a school-highest No. 2 national ranking.

Seals guided the Patriots to the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division I or



Division II national volleyball tournament seven times during her term there. And she directed NW-SCC to top 10 national rankings in three of her last five seasons at Northwest-Shoals.

Eight players coached by Seals have been accorded All-America team honors 10 times during Seals' term at Northwest-Shoals, including Anisha Hill, a two-time first-team All-American selection in 2002 and 2003. Ten of her players also earned Academic All-America team honors.

Seals' accomplishments have not gone unnoticed. She has been honored as the Tachikara/AVCA Regional Coach of the Year in 1999, 2000 and 2002 and seven times has received the Alabama Junior College Coach of the Year award. During her term at NW-SCC Seals tutored nearly 50 players that advanced their volleyball careers with athletic scholarships at four-year colleges and universities.

Seals signed a volleyball scholarship with Mississippi State University in 1981 following a stellar prep career at Bradshaw High School, where she was a three-sport athlete. She earned all-state honors in volleyball and also competed in basketball and on the BHS track team.

She was recruited

to Mississippi State by coach Gina Jacobellis and played her first two seasons at MSU for coach Lynn Keiser (1981 and 1982). Seals concluded her playing career competing her final two seasons for coach Vivian Langley, becoming one of MSU's initial four-year letterwinners in volleyball. She served as team captain in 1982, 1983 and 1984.

Following her sophomore season she was selected to play for the touring Athletes in Action volleyball team that competed in China and Japan in the summer of 1983. The successful AIA Asian tour helped advance her career and set the stage for a career-best senior season at Mississippi State in 1984, a season in which she paced the Bulldogs with 387 kills and a .316 hitting percentage, still the fourth-best single season hitting mark in 29 seasons of Mississippi State volleyball. For her exploits Seals was accorded first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors as a senior, becoming the first Mississippi State player to earn such distinction.

The MSU standout was also a member of the MSU softball team during her college career, earning a varsity letter as an outfielder in 1983.

Seals got her first taste of coaching as an undergraduate assistant on Langley's MSU volleyball staff in 1985 team before earning a bachelor's degree in civil engineering in 1987.

Following

graduation she worked four years as an engineer with the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). Her involvement with volleyball continued during that span when she formed and directed a club volleyball program in Muscle Shoals. She later earned her master's degree in math education at the University of North Alabama in 1994.

During her MSU career she met and married Tony Seals, a native of Winfield, Ala., and a 1986 graduate of Mississippi State University. They are the parents of a daughter, Tracey Marie, a sophomore at Starkville High School.

Jozsef Forman is in his third season on the Mississippi State volleyball coaching staff, having joined the Volleyball Bulldogs' coaching team in July 2004.

A native of Bonyhad, Hungary, Forman is a veteran of 15 seasons of coaching volleyball. Regarded as one of the sports' top tacticians, Forman came to Starkville from Waco, Texas, where he served in 2003 as an assistant coach at Baylor University.

At Mississippi State, Forman works primarily with Bulldog setters. He also assists with the coordination and evaluation of team practices, directs opponent scouting and tape exchange, team travel, and oversees MSU's international recruiting efforts.

Prior to his coaching stint at Baylor, Forman established himself as one of Europe's top volleyball coaches during a successful coaching run at the international level.

During 1990, 1991, 1994 and 1999 his club teams finished among the top eight in the European Championships and won the Central European Championship in 2000.

He returned to his native Hungary this summer to serve as head coach of the Hungarian Men's National Team, which defeated Serbia-Montenegro, runners-up in 2005 World League Championships.

Forman, 40, also enjoyed a successful two-year term as head coach for the Hungarian Junior National Team in 1992 and 1993 before taking the helm of the Hungarian Women's National Team for four years. His 1993 Junior National Team finished 10th in the 1992 European Championship and went on to place fifth in the World Championship held in Brazil.

Four years later he guided the Hungarian Senior National Team to wins over host Canada, Germany, and the United States en route to a first-place finish in the 1997 Canada Cup.

After graduating from Semmelweis University in Hungary in 1989, Forman began his coaching career as the head coach of the Vasas Sports Club. He guided that team to the 1990 Hungarian Cup title and a fifth-place finish in the European Championships. A year later, while serving on the staff with famed Chinese coach Sun De Lee, Forman's Vasas team again captured the Hungarian Cup and posted another fifth-place finish in the European Championships.

He then returned to his alma mater, Semmelweis University, where he served from 1991 until 1999 as an assistant professor in physical education and sports sciences. During his first two years there he coached the Budapest school's volleyball team, posting top eight finishes in the Hungarian Championships in both 1992 and 1993.

Forman returned to club volleyball coaching the next season, guiding Tungsram Sport Club to a runner-up finish in the Hungarian Championships and a fifth-place finish in the European Championships. He later coached three seasons with Budapest's BSE Club (1996 to 1999) and then established the NrK-Nyregyhaza Club, developing a team that became middle Europe's top women's volleyball club. Forman's teams claimed both the Hungarian Championship and the Hungarian Cup three years running (2000, 2001 and 2002).

Prior to beginning his coaching career Forman played volleyball 10 years with the U. Dozsa Sport Club (1978 to 1983) and the Hungarian University of Physical Education team (1984 to 1988).

He is married to the former Agnes Hargitai of Budapest, Hungary, and they have two sons — Peter, 12, and Adam, 9.



In his second season on the Mississippi State volleyball coaching staff is Alabama native Chris Cothran.

Cothran, 35, with more than 15 years experience in coaching and athletic administration, is in his second coaching association with MSU head coach Tina Seals.

At Mississippi State Cothran oversees individual skill development. He also serves as MSU's national recruiting coordinator, is the primary staff liaison with the office of athletic academics and assists with the operations of the MSU volleyball camps.

He previously served for four years (2000 to 2003) as an assistant coach on Seals' staff at Northwest-Shoals (Ala.) Community College. At NW-Shoals he helped guide the Patriots to four consecutive NJCAA Region XXII volleyball championships while posting a 162-34 combined regular season record over the four-year span.

He served from 2001 until 2003 as volleyball commissioner at the Alabama Sports Festival in Mobile, Ala. Over the past seven years Cothran has been active on the volleyball camp circuit, serving as a camp coach or clinician at more than 80 volleyball camps and clinics in Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Illinois, Virginia and Texas.

Prior to joining Tina Seals' coaching staff at Northwest-Shoals, Cothran launched his coaching career at his high school alma mater in Centre, Ala., Cherokee County High School. There he served as assistant volleyball coach from 1997 to 1999, helping CCHS to three straight Elite Eight and state top five finishes, and as an assistant basketball coach in 1999 and 2000.

He served as president of the Shorter College club volleyball team in Rome, Ga., (1990 to 1993) and coached teams in both Jacksonville, Ala. (1998) and Muscle Shoals, Ala. (2003). He worked in a variety of capacities with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Rome, Ga. (1991 to 1996, 1998) and in Gainesville, Ga. (1996-97). In recognition of his work with the Boys and Girls Clubs, he was selected as an Olympic Torchbearer prior to the 1996 Olympic games in Atlanta. He served as the executive director of the summer youth program in Centre, Ala., in 1999.

Cothran earned a bachelor of science degree in general studies at Shorter College in 2001.

Since leaving Northwest-Shoals, Cothran worked as an individual trainer for volleyball players in the Muscle Shoals area, developed and conducted team and individual volleyball camps and launched two new club volleyball teams in Northern Alabama.

He is married to the former Melissa Lehman of Wadesville, Ind., and they are the parents of a daughter, Elena "Ellie" Camille, born April 1, 2006.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

Mississippi State University is a charter member of the Southeastern Conference, a pioneer in the integration of higher education and athletic competition and a national leader as intercollegiate athletics marches on into the 21st century.

The SEC, with its storied 74-year history of athletic achievements and academic excellence, has built perhaps the greatest tradition of any intercollegiate athletic league in the nation since the conference's inception in 1933.

Centrally headquartered in Birmingham, Ala., the Southeastern Conference is comprised of 12 universities that span a nine-state area, conducting championships in 11 women's and nine men's sports. The member schools are split into two divisions. Mississippi State is joined in the SEC West by in-state rival Mississippi, Louisiana State, Alabama, Auburn and Arkansas. The SEC's Eastern Division features Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt. All but Arkansas and South Carolina were among 13 charter members of the SEC, with those schools joining the league for competition in 1991-92.

Since the Southeastern Conference conducted its first volleyball championship tournament in 1979, the sport has enjoyed steady growth in both popularity and strength. During the decade of the 1990s SEC volleyball blossomed into a formidable force on the national scene, and in 2005 a league record-six SEC teams — Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, Louisiana State and Tennessee — advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

The conference has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Tournament in every season the last 16 years, with an SEC team reaching NCAA volleyball's Final Four nine times of the last 15 seasons and came within a win of Final Four placement four times over that span.

In 2005, perennial power Florida captured its 12th Southeastern Conference Tournament Championship, claimed its 15th overall league title and made its 16th appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

But the Gators did not carry the league banner alone into NCAA postseason play. Tennessee, which shared the '04 league title with Florida, represented also represented the SEC East as did Kentucky, making its first postseason trip since 1993. SEC West co-champs Arkansas and Louisiana State along with Alabama also made the 2005 NCAA tourney field.

Since the inaugu-

ral SEC volleyball championship in 1979-80, many changes have occurred in the conference with volleyball. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league in 1991 brought the divisional format to the sport with five teams competing in the Eastern Division and six teams in the Western Division. The most significant change in recent years came in 1999 with the league adopting an eight-team format for its three-day conference tournament. In 2002 the SEC began a 16-match league scheduling format. The league scheduling evolves further this fall when the SEC expands its conference schedule to 20 matches and discontinues the season-ending league tournament.

Volleyball has enjoyed a steady increase in popularity and interest in the Southeastern Conference, mirroring the sport's growth nationwide. Exposure for SEC volleyball got a major boost in 1995 when Southeastern Conference volleyball made its debut on SEC-TV (FOX Sports Net South, FOX Sports Net Southwest and Sun Network) on a tape-delay basis.

That coverage has grown in recent years to include live telecasts of regular season matches along with the broadcast of the SEC Tournament championship match. SEC-TV telecasts are beamed to more than 22 million cable subscribers in the SEC's nine-state region.

SEC coaches and administrators voted to discontinue the league's postseason tournament for 2006, ending a 27-year for the event. This year's regular season league champ will earn the Southeastern Conference's automatic qualifying berth for the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

More about SEC Volleyball...

- The 2005 season marked the 16th consecutive season in which the SEC has placed at least two teams in the NCAA Tournament. a record-breaking six SEC volleyball teams advanced to NCAA postseason play in 2005, bettering the previous league-high of four teams.
- Nine of 11 SEC teams posted double-digit win totals in 2005, with five reaching 20 wins or better. Florida led the way with 33 victories.
- Florida made its 16th NCAA tournament appearance and its 15th straight in 2005.
- Eight SEC players earned AVCA All-America team honors in 2005 while nine earned all-district plaudits.
- In the past 15 years, 837 student-athletes have earned selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

2006 SEC VOLLEYBALL ON SEC-TV

Five regular season matchups involving eight of the SEC's 11 teams are included in this fall's SEC volleyball television lineup on SEC-TV.

Mississippi State is featured on this fall's TV slate, for SEC volleyball its sixth SEC-TV appearance in the last nine seasons. The Bulldogs travel to Columbia, S.C., October 15 for an interdivisional meeting with the South Carolina Gamecocks.

SEC-TV is broadcast on FOX Sports Net South, FOX Sports Net Southwest and the Florida-based Sun Network, reaching more than 22 million households throughout the region.

2005 SEASON IN REVIEW

Mississippi State University's volleyball program made significant gains and reached numerous noteworthy milestones during the 2005 campaign, State's second under the leadership of Tina Seals.

The Volleyball Bulldogs posted a 15-12 mark, their first winning season since 2000 and their second in the last 13 seasons.

A strong stretch run finish by the Bulldogs helped Mississippi State set a school record for wins in Southeastern Conference play. State claimed four of its last six league battles to finish the year with a 6-10 Southeastern Conference record, bettering the school record-tying five-win showing in league play from 2004. During that '05 stretch MSU notched back-to-back-to-back conference wins for the first time in school history. Of perhaps greater significance, State claimed its highest league finish in school history --- seventh place --- and advanced to the SEC Tournament for the first time since 1998, the last season before the tournament became an eight-team event.

For the first time in school history Mississippi State played all 12 of its home matches at the Newell-Grissom Building, including the 2005 MSU/Microtel Classic. The Bulldogs notched wins in seven of their 12 home contests, a record for wins in nine seasons at the Newell-Grissom Building and two wins shy of tying the overall school record for MSU home-court victories.

With a roster that featured five returning starters and a host of talented new players, Mississippi State opened the year with a nine-match win streak, capturing the championships of tournaments hosted by Virginia Tech and Dayton and taking runner-up honors in the MSU/Microtel Classic. Cooper and Orshi Kriegel represented MSU on the all-tournament team with Kriegel earning MVP honors at the Hokie Fall Invitational in Blacksburg, Va. A week later in Dayton, Ohio, Orshi Kriegel, her sister Eva, and Rachel Cooper made the all-tournament team at the Marriott Flyer Invitational, with Cooper claiming her first career tourney MVP award. Jamie Joyner and Cooper earned all-tourney honors at the MSU/Microtel Classic. The Bulldogs, who opened the year with a No. 155 national computer ranking (RickKern.com), zipped to a school-best No. 66 ranking and remained in the top 100 for much of the first half of the season thanks to a 9-1 start in non-conference play.

The Bulldogs opened SEC competition on the homecourt against perennial league power Florida, claiming the opening

game in a 3-1 loss to the sixth-ranked Gators. State's win in the opening game snapped a string of 18 consecutive straight-set UF wins in the series. The Bulldogs blanked Auburn for their first league win Oct. 7, registered a pair of shutouts against instate rival Mississippi for their second straight series sweep of the Rebels, and sandwiched a pair of wins over Georgia around a home schedule-ending win over SEC West co-champ LSU. It marked the first time MSU had topped Georgia twice in one season since 1979, with the 3-2 win in Athens on the final weekend nailing down a No. 7 league finish and an SEC Tournament berth for Mississippi State.

State's stay in the 2005 SEC Tournament in Tuscaloosa, Ala., was a brief one. The Bulldogs dropped a straight-sets decision to one of the league's top clubs, defending SEC champ and No. 2 tournament seed Tennessee.

There were many who contributed to the Bulldogs' success on the volleyball court in 2005, but none played a more prominent role than did senior outside hitter Rachel Cooper.

The Roscoe, Ill., native sparked the MSU offense with a team-leading 387 kills, eighth-most in the Southeastern Conference and ranked second on the MSU defense with 254 digs. A solid candidate for all-conference honors, Cooper concluded her MSU career ranked third in both kills (1,405) and attack attempts (4,131) and claimed career top 10 status in both digs and service aces.

Leading the way among Mississippi State's talented newcomers was sophomore Eva Kriegel, younger sister of State's talented outside hitter Orshi Kriegel. The younger of the Hungarian-born Kriegel sisters earned a place in the MSU record book after becoming the first player in State's 31-year volleyball history to register multiple triple-doubles in a season. Eva Kriegel, who took over as MSU's starting setter, hit the double digit mark in kills, assists and digs in a match four times. Older sister Orshi recorded a triple-double in 2005 as well, giving MSU's first sister tandem five of the program's seven triple-double performances.

A handful of Bulldogs joined team kills leader Rachel Cooper in team-leading statistical totals in 2005. Middle blocker Erin Seago fashioned a superb team-best .319 hitting percentage, ninth-highest in the SEC. Orshi Kriegel paced the club with 598 assists and helped MSU rank first in the league at the service stripe for the second straight year when she piled up 47 aces, third-most by an SEC player in '05. Libero Megan Lukasek led the MSU defense with 395 digs, seventh-most in the SEC, while Nicole Palazzo led MSU charge at the net with 14 solo blocks, 78

assists and 92 total blocks.

Mississippi State volleyball's tradition of excellence in academics crew in 2005 with five players — Rachel Cooper, Jamie Joyner, Orshi Kriegel, Andrea Mead and Erin Seago earning SEC Volleyball Academic Honor Roll honors. Underclassmen Nicole Palazzo and Lialah Putman claimed positions on the SEC Freshman Academic Honor Roll while Cooper, Joyner, Kriegel and Seago qualified for ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American team consideration.

MSU'S SAMYE JOHNSON IN THE MISSISSIPPI SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Mississippi State University volleyball has representation in the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame.

Samye Johnson, who served as Mississippi State University head volleyball coach for three seasons (1994-96) and as MSU's senior women's athletics administrator until her retirement in July 2006, joined the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame in 2002. She was among eight Mississippi sports standouts in the 40th Anniversary MSHoF Class inducted during ceremonies April 12, 2002 in Jackson, Miss.

Johnson, a 1971 graduate of Mississippi University for Women where she was a four-sport athlete, served as head volleyball coach at MUW for 15 years prior to joining the MSU staff as volleyball coach and assistant AD for women's sports in 1994.

She retired from coaching in 1997, concluding her stellar 20-year coaching career with 506 wins. Johnson served as MSU's senior administrator for women's sports until her retirement in July 2006.

Born in Jackson, Miss., and reared in Mendenhall, Miss., Johnson launched her coaching career at Festus (Mo.) High School and later served as volleyball and tennis coach at East Texas State University.

Johnson was the lone Mississippi State representative among the eight inductees in 2002 and is the only collegiate volleyball coach enshrined in the tradition-bound 44-year old Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame.

MISSISSIPPI STATE UNIVERSITY

Mississippi State is a comprehensive land-grant institution and the largest university in Mississippi, with a statewide enrollment of more than 16,000 students. The university is located in the eastern part of north-central Mississippi near Starkville, recently ranked 36th nationally among cities with populations of less than 50,000 for its quality of life by internet site bijournals.com. MSU has about 1,000 faculty members and approximately 4,000 full-time employees. The campus and adjacent agricultural research lands comprise about 4,000.

Established in 1878 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Mississippi, the university has traditional strengths in engineering and scientific agriculture but has evolved into a comprehensive institution with a diverse array of programs in teaching, research, and service.

Research

The university currently ranks 55th among the nation's public universities in total research and development expenditures, according to the National Science Foundation. Federal funding for research at MSU grew by 18.4 percent in fiscal year 2002 (the most recent reported) over the previous fiscal year, compared with a 13.6 percent growth rate among all universities. MSU accounted for 56 percent of research and development expenditures among Mississippi's public and private universities and colleges in FY2002, according to NSF figures.

During the last year, the university has announced collaborations with significant defense-related industries that are bringing new technologies and new job opportunities to the state. Among them are Aurora Flight Sciences, working closely with MSU's Raspet Flight Research Laboratory to build unmanned aerial vehicles; II-VI Incorporated, working closely with SemiSouth Laboratories — a spin-off from MSU research-to design and manufacture semiconductors used in high-voltage, high-temperature, and high frequency electronics applications; and AEA Technologies, a producer of portable power in support of space, defense, and homeland security technologies.

In a key area of economic interest to the state, MSU's Center for Advanced Vehicular Systems, established in 2001, continues research and development supporting a goal of attracting automotive industries to the state. Through its facility on the MSU campus, as well as a separate

engineering extension facility near the Nissan plant in Canton, the university's research team is building on a longstanding expertise in computational technologies to expand Mississippi's leadership potential in automotive and related industries.

With 1.6 million volumes and about 15,600 current journal subscriptions, Mitchell Memorial Library is a member of the Association of Southeastern Research Libraries and the Southeastern Library Network (SOLINET). Specialized research centers and institutes, in addition to those named above, include the Institute for Clean Energy Technology, the Social Science Research Center, the Forest and Wildlife Research Center, the Institute for Neurocognitive Science and Technology, the Life Sciences and Biotechnology Institute, and the Institute of Furniture Manufacturing and Management, among others.

Students and Teaching

Fall 2005 enrollment at Mississippi State was nearly 16,000, including over 900 students at the Meridian campus, online and at other locations. About 70 percent of MSU students are Mississippi residents, 77 percent are undergraduates, 51 percent are male, and 20 percent are African-American. MSU ranks 24th in engineering expenditures, according to the National Science Foundation, and in fall 2005 enrolled 32 National Merit Scholars. MSU awarded more than 3,717 degrees at the bachelor's through doctoral levels in 2005-06.

Outreach and service

As a land-grant university, Mississippi State has a responsibility

to provide informal training and education and research-based information to people throughout the state. An industrial outreach service is making the university's extensive resources and expertise accessible to small-sized and medium-sized manufacturers around Mississippi. The MSU Extension Service maintains offices in almost every county of the state, and the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station operates 10 branch stations throughout Mississippi. Four strategically located research and extension centers coordinate the delivery of services statewide.

President

Robert H. Foglesong is the 18th president of Mississippi State University, a land-grant university committed to excellence in learning, research and service. His vision is for MSU to become the most respected land-grant school in the Southeast. As president, he is responsible for planning, budgeting and execution for the largest university in the state of Mississippi.

He is also the president and executive director of the Appalachian Leadership and Education Foundation, a nonprofit body operating to identify the next generation of leaders in Appalachia and mentor/financially support their journey towards academic, leadership and character excellence. He's a director of Massey Energy, one of the largest producers of coal the nation, and a director of the Michael Baker Corp., an international energy and engineering firm. He also has been designated by President George W. Bush to co-chair the United States-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIAs.

Previously, he was nominated by the President, confirmed by the U.S. Senate, and served as a four-star general in the United States Air Force. He had responsibility for policy recommendations and implementation of policy relative to personnel, operations, infrastructure and intra/inter governmental affairs for an organizations of 358,000 uniformed members and 158,000 civilian employees. He was responsible for planning/programming for future strategies involving an annual budge of \$90 billion (equivalent to the position of chief operating officer for a company ranked No. 9 on the Fortune 500 list). His jobs required almost daily interface with members of Congress, the White House and many governmental agencies.

Foglesong spent a significant amount of the past decade as a national security advisor at Cabinet and Presidential levels. In this capacity, he had opportunities to travel extensively with the most senior members of the government and directly engage with the most senior civilian and military levels of foreign governments around the globe.

Foglesong has spent 33 years in public service with a clear understanding of the role leadership plays in establishing a sense of integrity/ethics, encouraging service above self and fostering an attitude of excellence. He has received numerous awards for his demonstrated leadership. In addition, he has continued his education by attending professional military education schools as well as advanced civilian forums. He is a member of several professional aviation organizations and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. His 57 publications cover a range of subjects including technical and leadership topics. A graduate of West Virginia University (bachelor's, master's and doctorate), he was a member and president of Tau Beta Pi, the national engineering honorary, as well as numerous other academic honoraries.

He has accumulated 30 military awards for leadership and technical skills. He holds an honorary Doctorate of Strategic Intelligence. He is married to Mary Thrasher Foglesong. They have two sons --- David, married to Laura, and father of two sons (Robert and David), and Mark. David is in the United States Air Force, as is Laura. Mark is in the television business. Foglesong's hobbies include running marathons, collecting slide rules, collecting potato mashers, and public speaking.



Larry Templeton

Director of Athletics

Director of Athletics Larry Templeton this fall begins his 20th season as the head of the intercollegiate athletics program at Mississippi State University. Under his guidance MSU's 16 varsity sports teams compete for championships in the highly-competitive Southeastern Conference and each year establish new stan-

dards for achievement in the classroom.

With nearly 19 seasons under his belt, Templeton ranks as the third-longest tenured AD in MSU history and rates as the dean of ADs in the SEC. Under his direction the Mississippi State University Athletics Department has seen a rapid and dramatic progression in the improvement of its sports facilities, all the while adhering to fiscally sound budgeting principles that have enabled MSU athletics to rank among an elite corps of programs nationally that have operated consistently in the black.

Virtually every sport at Mississippi State established best-ever finishes on the fields and courts of competition during the decade of the '90s, and that trail of success has continued on into the new millennium. During the past seven years MSU sports teams qualified for post-season competition 51 times, including a school-record 12 in 2004-05.

But State's students are not just successful on the playing field. MSU's men's and women's athletes recorded the highest combined grade point average during the 2005-06 academic year, a record that covers 16 years in which such student-athlete grades have been tracked. MSU student -athletes compiled an aggregate 2.95 grade point average for the fall 2005 term, the best semester of academics on record for Bulldog and Lady Bulldog athletes. And in the spring of 2006 better than half — 145 of 270 scholarship student-athletes, earned GPAs of 3.00 or better, with 78 earning Dean's List (3.50 GPA) or President's Scholar List (3.80 GPA) honors.

MSU has produced the SEC's Male and Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year three times each since 1990. In 1993 Bulldog volleyball stand-out Aimee York became the first MSU student-athlete to earn the SEC Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award. And over the past eight years State ranks second among league schools in the number of academic all-conference selections in the sports in which MSU competes.

Templeton oversaw Mississippi State's move to come into compliance with the SEC's Gender Equity plan, adding women's soccer in 1995 and softball in 1997 to the school's varsity sports menu. Since then soccer has won the SEC Western Division title (2001) while softball has advanced to NCAA postseason play in five of the last seven seasons. MSU's other seven women's sports have also enjoyed success that has advanced each to postseason competition.

Templeton's work also stretches far from the Starkville campus. He has served as chairman of the SEC's athletics directors and is serving a second term on the NCAA Baseball Committee, currently serving as that committee's chairman. He is a former member of the NCAA Championship Committee, the NCAA Management Council and the NCAA Bowl Certification Committee.

Templeton, 59, served in a variety of capacities within the Mississippi State University Athletic Department prior to his appointment as MSU's 14th director of athletics in October 1987. He is married to the former Linda Jo Nichols. They have a son, Brian, who received his second degree (landscape architecture) at Mississippi State. A second son, Stephen, received his doctorate from MSU in August 2002, and a daughter, Nici, is an attorney in Columbia, S.C. Granddaughters Ella Grace Comer and Addison McSwain Comer reside in Columbia, S.C.



MISSISSIPPI State

MSU has the largest enrollment in the state of Mississippi. Founded as a land-grant institution, its grass, flowers and trees are as prevalent as buildings, sidewalks and parking lots. Large enough to sport diversity in all areas, the university still maintains a warm, friendly atmosphere.

Ruby Hall, a residence hall with the largest single room size in university history, opened this past August. A co-residential, 160,000-square foot, three-story freshman hall, Ruby is located at the north end of campus, in convenient proximity to the Colvard Union, the Perry Cafeteria, Mitchell Memorial Library, the Sanderson Center and all athletic facilities. Ruby Hall offers students the latest in technology, including Ethernet access, full wireless internet coverage, a refrigerator and microwave, and free cable with HBO in each room. MSU freshman football players are housed in Ruby Hall.



The Colvard Union is a popular meeting place for MSU students. Whether working on a group project, enjoying the food court, or simply relaxing, the student union is one of the campus' main meeting places.

The Chapel of Memories and Carillon Tower were built with bricks from Old Main Dormitory, the largest residence hall in the country when constructed, later destroyed by fire in 1959. The Chapel of Memories, which hosts numerous weddings each year, is one of the most-recognized landmarks on campus.

The Drill Field, located squarely in the center of campus, shows the expanse of greenery for which the campus is famous.



The People's University

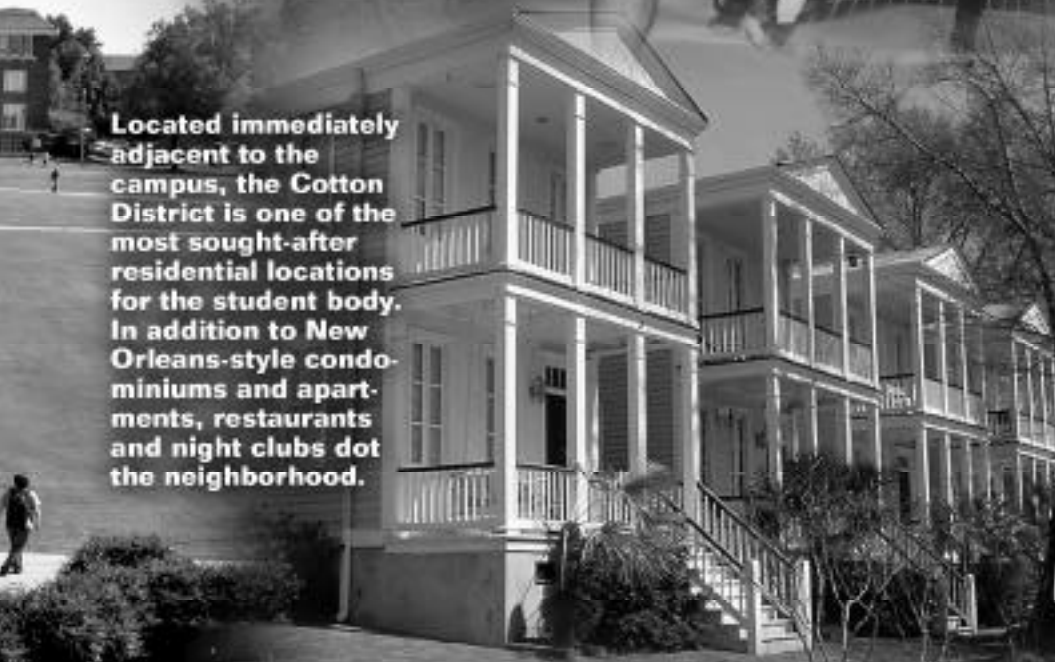


When built in the 1920s, Perry Cafeteria was the largest dining hall in the country. The 300-foot long, Gothic style interior is one of the most beautiful buildings on the campus. It has accommodations for 600 students, faculty and staff and serves as the dining hall for MSU athletes.

The \$19 million, 150,000-square foot Sanderson Center recreation complex opened to students in 1996. The state-of-the-art facility offers recreational opportunities in aquatics, fitness and aerobics, strength and conditioning, and intramural sports.



Located immediately adjacent to the campus, the Cotton District is one of the most sought-after residential locations for the student body. In addition to New Orleans-style condominiums and apartments, restaurants and night clubs dot the neighborhood.



ATHLETIC Excellence

State's coaches care for their student-athletes and the school's sports programs. Each has a passion for their specialty, experience as a player and coach, and expertise to instruct at the highest levels. Their goal is to coach champions on the field and mold productive college graduates from the university's classroom.

SYLVESTER CROOM was named head coach at MSU in December 2003, an announcement that brought immediate national attention to the Bulldog football program. In just his first season, State beat a ranked opponent for the first time since 2000.

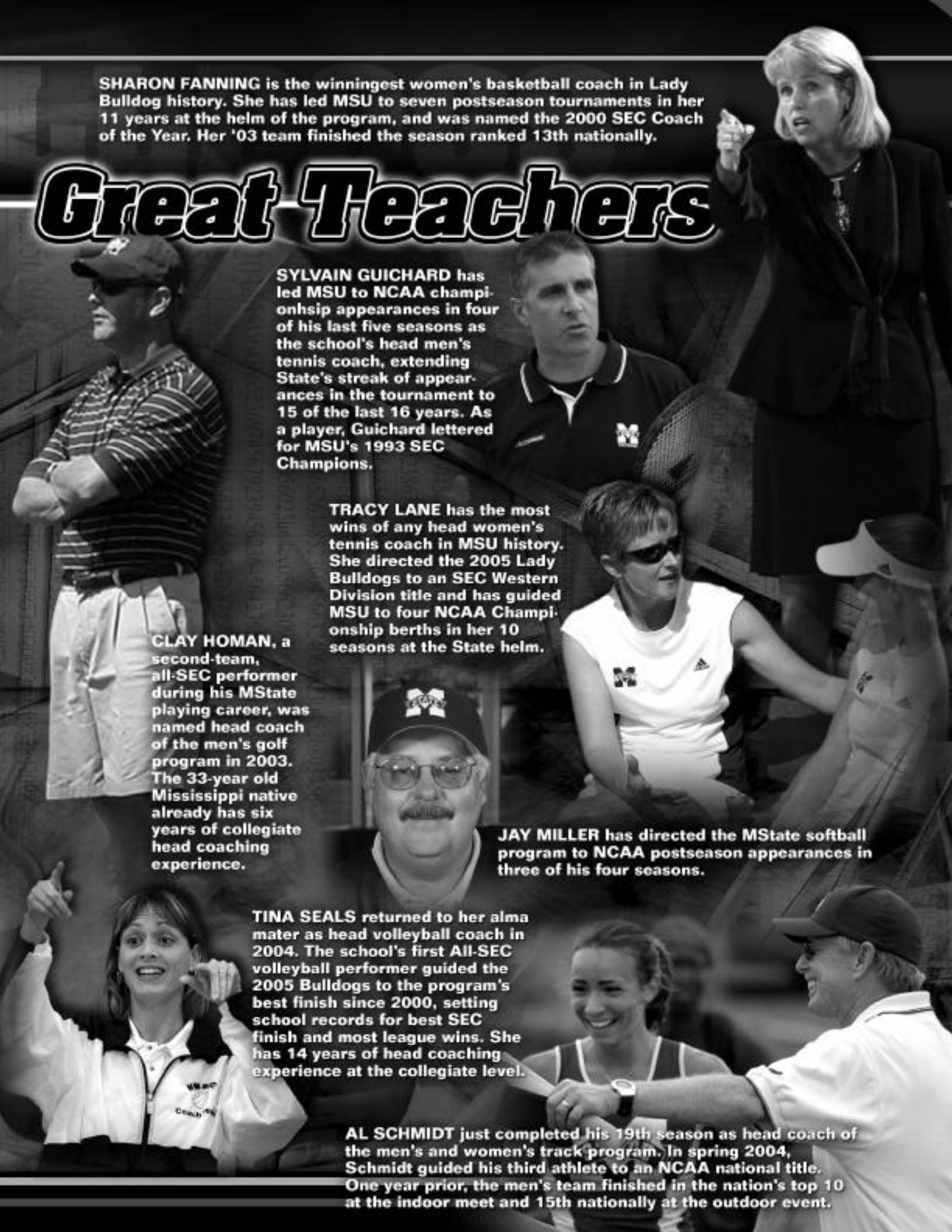
CHRISTI SANDERS (back left) has the longest, consecutive coaching reign of any head coach at State, with 19 seasons at the helm of the women's golf program. She has twice been named SEC Coach of the Year (1990, 2000).

RON POLK is the legendary head coach of the MSU baseball program. He is the winningest coach in SEC history and with more than 1,300 career coaching wins ranks sixth among college baseball's all-time winningest coaches. He has guided five MSU teams to the College World Series and 19 to regional competition.

RICK STANSBURY's men's basketball teams have averaged better than 20 wins per year under his guidance and have participated in postseason play six times in his eight years. MSU has played in four NCAA Tournaments in five seasons and won the SEC championship in 2004 and tournament title in '02.

NEIL MACDONALD is the only head coach to guide the MState soccer program to an SEC Tournament appearance in his first season (2004). The 34-year old already has six years head coaching experience on the college level.





SHARON FANNING is the winningest women's basketball coach in Lady Bulldog history. She has led MSU to seven postseason tournaments in her 11 years at the helm of the program, and was named the 2000 SEC Coach of the Year. Her '03 team finished the season ranked 13th nationally.

Great Teachers

SYLVAIN GUICHARD has led MSU to NCAA championship appearances in four of his last five seasons as the school's head men's tennis coach, extending State's streak of appearances in the tournament to 15 of the last 16 years. As a player, Guichard lettered for MSU's 1993 SEC Champions.

TRACY LANE has the most wins of any head women's tennis coach in MSU history. She directed the 2005 Lady Bulldogs to an SEC Western Division title and has guided MSU to four NCAA Championship berths in her 10 seasons at the State helm.

CLAY HOMAN, a second-team, all-SEC performer during his MState playing career, was named head coach of the men's golf program in 2003. The 33-year old Mississippi native already has six years of collegiate head coaching experience.

JAY MILLER has directed the MState softball program to NCAA postseason appearances in three of his four seasons.

TINA SEALS returned to her alma mater as head volleyball coach in 2004. The school's first All-SEC volleyball performer guided the 2005 Bulldogs to the program's best finish since 2000, setting school records for best SEC finish and most league wins. She has 14 years of head coaching experience at the collegiate level.

AL SCHMIDT just completed his 19th season as head coach of the men's and women's track program. In spring 2004, Schmidt guided his third athlete to an NCAA national title. One year prior, the men's team finished in the nation's top 10 at the indoor meet and 15th nationally at the outdoor event.

ATHLETIC Excellence

Mississippi State athletes play in some of the nation's finest facilities. Every Bulldog competition site has either been constructed or renovated during the last decade or so. During that time alone, more than \$60 million in facility enhancements have been made... a real building boom in Bulldog Country.



DAVIS WADE STADIUM AT SCOTT FIELD: Near-sellout crowds have become the norm at Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field, where the Bulldogs have played before masses reaching 85 percent of stadium capacity. Since the 2000 season when expansion and renovation projects gave the nation's second-oldest stadium a gleaming new look, crowds have grown by nearly 30 percent.



PITTS TENNIS CENTRE: Considered among the finest tennis facilities in the collegiate ranks, the modern, six-court, 1,000-seat A.J. Pitts Tennis Centre recently completed its 23rd year serving the men's and women's programs. Recent enhancements at the facility include new locker areas and concession stands (1998) and a permanent press box (2004).

**W.O. SPENCER STADIUM/
CARL MADDOX TRACK:** Co-named in honor of a two-time Mississippi State Olympian and a former MSU athletic director, the W.O. Spencer Stadium/Carl Maddox Track has served as host to the Southeastern Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships three times since 1985, joining Tennessee as the most frequent host for that event during that time.



DUDY NOBLE FIELD, POLK-DEMENT STADIUM: One of the nation's leaders in baseball season ticket sales and attendance, Dudy Noble Field, Polk-Dement Stadium still holds the nation's on-campus single-game attendance mark — 14,991. With a seating capacity of more than 7,000 and more space in the world-famous outfield, *Sports Illustrated* magazine named the park, the "Best Place To Watch College Baseball" in a 1997 issue.

NEWELL GRISSOM BUILDING:

The 12,000-square foot, hardwood-floored Newell-Grissom Building serves as the home for Mississippi State's volleyball program and serves as a practice facility for both of the school's basketball programs. A state-of-the-art heating and air conditioning system was installed in 2004.

Great Places

MSU GOLF COURSE:

Nominated by *Golfweek* and *Golf Digest* magazines as one of the premier public golf courses in the United States, Mississippi State's championship University Golf Course is the home to the men's and women's programs. The 18-hole course was recently furnished with a 5,000-square-foot clubhouse, complete with locker areas, snack bar, golf shop and classroom.



MSU SOCCER FIELD: Built in 1995, the lighted Mississippi State Soccer Field gives the Bulldog women one of the finest playing surfaces in the Southeast, a 114-yard long, 72-yard wide regulation NCAA Championship field. The lush turf is Mississippi Pride grass, developed by researchers on the MSU campus.



MSU SOFTBALL FIELD: Constructed in 1997, the Mississippi State Softball Field has undergone almost constant improvement at the northern-most point of campus. Lights were added to the facility in 1998, brick work was added to the dugouts two years later and, in 2001, additional batting cages were built. In 2005, softball moved into a new locker, training and meeting facility adjacent to the park.



BRYAN BUILDING: The state-of-the-art John H. Bryan Athletic Administration Building is the crown jewel of MSU's expansion projects of the last decade. Opened in 1996, this showcase facility is named for longtime Bulldog friend and supporter John H. Bryan Sr. and houses athletic administration, football, ticket, athletic development and media relations offices.



HUMPHREY COLISEUM: Season ticket sales records and all-time attendance marks have also been set over the past decade by Bulldog and Lady Bulldog basketball teams in the Humphrey Coliseum, the state's largest on-campus basketball arena. The latest addition to the facility was a \$1.8 million, center-hung, four-sided video scoreboard and jumbotron screen installed in 2004.



NEWELL-GRISSOM BUILDING



The Volleyball Bulldogs play their home matches in the Newell-Grissom Building, a spacious facility featuring 12,000 square feet of hardwood flooring and arena seating for more than 2,000. MSU's volleyball home has seen two major improvements in the facility over the past 18 months. An air conditioning system was added following the 2004 season and nearly 600 maroon chairback seats were installed in the east stands prior to the start of the 2006 campaign.

The facility has served as the home court for Mississippi State volleyball since Oct. 3, 1997 when State met Georgia in the first match at the Newell-Grissom Building. Another first for the facility unfolded a year later when the 1998 season-ending MSU-Mississippi volleyball match was televised regionally by FOX Sports Net South.

Located approximately two blocks southwest of Scott Field, the Newell-Grissom Building served as an auxiliary practice site for volleyball and both the men's and women's basketball teams at Mississippi State in 1996 while Humphrey Coliseum served as their primary on-campus competition site.

Newell-Grissom is MSU's third on-campus volleyball home in 31 seasons. MSU's first volleyball teams competed in McCarthy Gymnasium prior to moving to Humphrey Coliseum.

The Newell-Grissom Building has a varied and colorful history that spans five decades and covers a broad spectrum of campus events.

Construction of the building began in January, 1951. The \$500,000 Animal Husbandry Service Building was completed in the spring of 1953, with dedicatory ceremonies held on April 28, 1953. The original structure included two classrooms, two offices, an area to house two graduate students, two exhibit areas, a multi-bunk dormitory area for visiting teams, and a dirt floor to accommodate its primary mission as host for livestock-related events.

But the "cow barn", as it became affectionately known on campus, was used for much more than livestock shows, rodeos and equestrian competition. It developed into the campus and regional center for concerts and other entertainment events. The building's size and central location on campus also made it a natural for graduation ceremonies and class registration operations.

In 1978, the arena was formally named in honor of two long-time leaders in Mississippi State University's animal science department, Paul F. Newell (1910) and E.E. Grissom (1932). The structure went largely unused in the 1980s and early 1990s and gradually fell into disrepair. But in early 1995, the university, faced with an expensive "tear it down or fix it up" proposition, partnered with the MSU Athletic Department to share the costs of a million dollar renovation project.

In addition to the installation of a hardwood floor, the project included reroofing, the installation of a new lighting system, the construction and refurbishing of locker rooms and team meeting areas, and the addition of public rest room facilities.
