BIG GAME HUNTER

- Senior infielder Hunter Hines was named Pre-season First Team All-SEC First Basemen. The senior enters his fourth year with the Diamond Dawgs and is a three time All-American.
- Entering the year, Hines has hit 16 or more home runs in each of his first three seasons. He has 57 career home runs over his career in the Maroon and White.
- The 57 home runs are the second-most by an active player in the SEC and in the NCAA. Wyatt Henseler has 58 career homers between Penn and Texas A&M.
- The 57 home runs are the fourth-most in a career at Mississippi State. He is 10 homers away from tying Rafael Palmeiro (1983-85) for the top spot in school history.
- Following a homer in last Friday's game against Queens, Hines now is only one homer away from tying Bruce Castoria (1979-82) for third all-time at MSU.
- Hines is also two RBIs away from cracking the school's top 10 list in that category. He has driven in 180 career runs and would tie Tracy Echols (1986-87, 89-90) and Tanner Allen (2018-21) for ninth all-time the next time he drives in two.
- During the 2023 season, Hines hit 22 home runs, the sixth-most in a single season history at State. He was the first 20+ homer player at MSU since Brent Rooker hit 23 in 2017.
- Besides hitting for power, Hines has driven in 174 runs and is eight RBIs away from joining the career RBI mark at MSU.

- D1 Baseball ranked the top 50 first basemen this season and Hines was ranked as the 12th best firstbasemen coming into the 2025 season.
- Besides hitting for power, Hines has collected 196 hits in his career, the fifth-most by an active player in the SEC.
- Hines was also ranked as the 12th-best first basemen in the nation according to D1 Baseball.

STOPPER OF THE YEAR WATCH LIST

- Prior to the start of the season, Chase Hungate, was named to the NCBWA Stopper of the Year Watch List. This award is given to the top relief pitcher in NCAA Division I Baseball.

- Hungate transferred to State from the University of Virginia where he appeared in 30 games and posted a 7-2 record last season as a junior.
- Over his career, he has posted 17 wins and has appeared in 73 games. He has pitched 147 2/3 innings, with a career-high 63 innings coming his freshman season at VCU. He has tallied 109 strikeouts and has only issued 31 walks.
- This season, he leads the team with six appearances, all out of the bullpen.
- He has two of the Bulldogs' three saves this season.
- Hungate has only allowed three hits and has been limiting opponents to a .227 batting average.
- He has not walked a batter and has five strikeouts on the season.
- Hungate's 73 career appearances ranks third among active players in the SEC.

TWO-HITTER VS. MISSOURI STATE

- For the first time since March 13, 2021, the Diamond Dawgs pitching staff pitched a two-hitter.
- To close out the Missouri State series on Feb. 23, the Dawgs limited the Bears to only two hits. The pitching of Stone Simmons, Charlie Foster, Robert Fortenberry, Luke Dotson and Chase Hungate combined for the two-hitter.
- Prior to that game, the last time the Dawgs had a two-hitter was on March 13, 2021 against Eastern Michigan. Eric Cerantola, Preston Johnson, Cam Tuller and Carlisle Koestler were the pitching staff that limited Eastern Michigan to two hits in a 4-1 victory.

DIAMOND DAWGS PITCHING STAFF

- The Diamond Dawgs pitching staff has been dealing this season.
- Over his first four starts of the season, Pico Kohn has shined as he is averaging 14.1 strikeouts per nine innings. He has tallied 37 Ks and only issued four walks in 23 2/3 innings this season.
- The Dawgs are averaging 12.7 strikeouts per nine innings, the fifthz-best mark in the nation.
- The Diamond Dawgs have a team ERA of 2.81, which ranks fourth in the SEC.
- MSU holds a WHIP (Walks and Hits per inning pitched) of 1.02 which ranks third nationally.
- The Bulldogs are limiting opponents to 5.54 hits per nine innings, the second-best mark in the country. On the season, MSU's pitching staff has held hitters to a .174 batting average against them.
- In the second series of the season, the Dawgs limited the Bears of Missouri State to a .136 batting average. State tallied 34 strikeouts in the three-game series. Eveyrone who pitched tallied a strikeout for State.
- Of the 19 pitchers that have taken the mound for the Bulldogs this season, 13 have made their MSU debuts.

20 K GAME

- The 20 punchouts against Troy on Feb. 25 was the most by the Dawgs this season. Every pitcher who pitched in the game for State recorded a strikeout.
- The 20 strikeouts by the Bulldogs was the most since fanning 20 against Texas in the College World Series on June 21, 2021.
- The 20 strikeouts by the Bulldogs pitching staff was the third-most in a single game at that point in the season. Indiana and Western Kentucky posted 21 each on opening weekend.
- Making his first start of the season, Jacob Pruitt paced the team as he tallied nine punchouts in four innings of work. The nine Ks for Pruitt was the most since March 1, 2024, when he tallied 11 strikeouts against Southern Miss when he was at Indiana State.
- The Diamond Dawgs nearly reached that tally

again four days later when they struck out 18 against Arizona on March 1 in Houston as part of the Astros Foundation College Classic.

SULLIVAN NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN

- One of the top-ranked two-way players, Noah Sullivan, has been named a preseason All-American by the NCBWA.
- Sullivan was named as a utility player after posting outstanding numbers at USC Upstate. Sullivan was 8-1 on the mound in 75 and 2/3 innings pitched. He didn't slow down at the plate as he hit .324 with 17 home runs and 56 RBIs.
- Last season, Sullivan was named as a First Team All-Big South as a utility player and second team All-Big South as a starting pitcher. He earned Big South Player of the Week and Starting Pitcher of the week honors during the season.
- According to D1 Baseball, Noah Sullivan was ranked as the No. 20 first basemen in the nation. He is joined by teammate Hunter Hines (No. 12) for this honor.
- This past week, Sullivan hit .667 (8-for-12) with a double, two homers and six RBIs across four games.
- Against Troy on Feb. 25, Sullivan hit his first home run of the season for the Dawgs. His homer was a grand slam that got the scoring started for MSU. The grand slam was the first for the Dawgs since Amani Larry's against Alabama on May 3, 2024.
- Sullivan has started every game at DH and leads the team with a .426 batting average and is second with 18 runs batted in.
- Not only is he collecting hits, but he is getting on base by walks and hit by pitches. He has 11 walks and five hit by pitches on the season and has a .571 on-base percentage.

BEST FANS IN THE LAND

- Mississippi State has the **BEST** fans in collegiate baseball, which showed during the 2024 season. The Dawgs averaged the most fans in the nation drawing 10,903 per game.
- Over seven home games at Dudy Noble, MSU is averaging 9,977 fans per game, the second-best mark in the nation.
- The SEC holds the top eight spots for average attendance.
- Mississippi State had 24 games during the 2024 season with 10,000+ fans in attendance, which was a single season school record. How many games in 2025, will the Diamond Dawgs end with over 10,000 fans?

- Over 2023 Super Bulldog Weekend, the Dawgs set the NCAA On-Campus Attendance Record as The Dude saw 16,423 fans into the stadium when the Diamond Dawgs took on Ole Miss on April 15, 2023.
- The Dawgs hold the top 15 marks in NCAA history for NCAA on-campus facilities. Dudy Noble Field holds 24 of the 25 largest crowds in NCAA history.

BIG LEAGUE TALENT

- Mississippi State is great at turning out major league talent, with 70 Diamond Dawgs reaching the highest level of the sport, but it is also great at keeping student-athletes on campus.
- During the 2024 MLB season, the Diamond Dawgs saw two players, Justin Foscoe and JT Ginn, get called up to the majors for the first time.
- Jake Mangum led the International League

(AAA) in batting average as he hit .317 over the 2024 MiLB season.

- The 2024 MLB Draft saw 11 Diamond Dawgs get drafted. That was the most drafted by any school in the 2024 draft.
- Mississippi State has had 20 players drafted in the first round of the MLB Draft. The last player was Jurrangelo Cijntje when he was drafted 15th overall by the Seattle Mariners. MSU has had a first round pick five of the last six years.
- Following the 2024 season, Mangum (Rays) and Eric Cerantola (Royals) were added to the 40-man rosters of their respective teams.
- Since the 2020 MLB Draft, State has had 29 players drafted. During that span, KC Hunt (2022) did not sign and returned to Starkville.
- Since 2016, the Diamond Dawgs have had three or more players drafted in each draft. During this span, MSU had seven first round selections, including the highest drafted right-handed pitcher from State, Will Bednar, at No. 14 overall.

2024 MLB DRAFT

- Mississippi State had the best MLB Draft of any college during 2024. MSU had 11 players selected, the most by any college in the nation.
- The 11 players picked tied a school record for players selected in a single draft.
- Out of the 11 players drafted, eight were pitchers, which set a new program record.
- Jurrangelo Cijntje became the 20th Bulldog selected in the first round, when he went 15th overall to the Seattle Mariners.
- Of the players drafted in the 2024 MLB Draft, five players were ranked in the Baseball American Top 30 prospect.

MLB SPRING BREAKOUT

- A total of 10 former players will represent the Diamond Dawgs in the MLB Spring Breakout from March 13-16 in the Grapefruit and Cactus Leagues.
- Colton Ledbetter (Rays), RJ Yeager (Cardinals), Khal Stephen (Blue Jays), Dakota Jordan (Giants), Will Bednar (Giants), David Mershon (Angels), Cade Smith (Yankees), Jurrangelo Cijntje (Mariners) and Tyson Hardin (Brewers) have all been selected to participate in the 16-game event that pits some of the top prospects in each farm system against one another.

THE JUSTIN PARKER EFFECT

- Pitching Coach Justin Parker Effect was in full force during his first season at Mississippi State.
- In his first season at MSU, Parker decreased the Diamond Dawgs ERA by 2.84, lowered the walk total by 104 and increased the strikeouts by 101.
- Mississippi State had the fourth best ERA in the SEC and the 13th best in the nation as they posted a 4.17 team ERA.
- MSU finished the season with 639 strikeouts, the ninth most in the nation.

- The duo of Jurrangelo Cijntje and Khal Stephen became the first duo to post 80+ innings, eight or more wins and 100+ strikeouts in a single season since 2019 when JT Ginn and Ethan Small accomplished that feat.

D1 BASEBALL TOP 100 PROGRAMS

- In the fall of 2015, D1 Baseball presented their inaugural Top 100 Program rankings, which was described as an attempt to assess the overall health of each program in the current era. The list has been updated in 2017, 2019, 2021 and 2022.
- The 2024 Top 100 programs have come out for 2024 and the Diamond Dawgs came in at No. 8.
- This is the third-straight year the Dawgs have been in the top 10 of the D1 Baseball Top 100 programs. They have been ranked in the Top 25 every year.
- Below are Mississippi States all-time rankings in the D1 Baseball Top 100 Programs:
 - 2015: No. 21
 - 2017: No. 16
 - 2019: No. 8
 - 2022: No. 3
 - 2024: No. 8

FIREFIGHTER TO THE DIAMOND

- During 2023, Joe Powell was in EMT school training to be a firefighter but a call from Mississippi State's staff turned things around and got him back on the diamond.
- After stepping away from the diamond for the 2023 season, Powell returned in 2024 and hit .269 with five home runs and 18 RBIs.
- He has appeared in 34 games, making 28 starts for the Dawgs in 2024.
- Against North Alabama, Powell racked up 13 total bases and was the first Dawg to have ten or more total bases in a game since Hunter Hines accomplished this against Vanderbilt earlier this season. In that game, he hit three home runs and had six RBIs.
- The Cincinnati transfer had a productive three-year career for the Bearcats, capped off by a standout junior season in 2022 with a team-leading .326 batting average and .996 on-base-plus-slugging percentage to go along with five home runs. That season would be his last in Queen City however, trading in his spikes for a fire hose after dealing with some injuries.
- With his baseball career seemingly over, Powell began training to become a firefighter and it was during his time away from the game that he found himself as a man and grew closer in his faith.

D1 BASEBALL TOP 25 IMPACT FRESHMAN CLASS

- D1 Baseball announced their Top 25 Impact Freshman Class and the Diamond Dawgs came in at No. 22
- These rankings were assembled in collaboration with Prep Baseball's vice president for scouting, Shooter Hunt. After examining Prep Baseball's rankings from last spring, we incorporated our own observations from fall ball and our conversations with coaches to determine which freshmen are poised to make the biggest impacts in 2025.

2025 RON POLK RING OF HONOR

- The seventh group of inductees into the Ron Polk Ring of Honor is set to see their names unveiled this spring.
- The trio of Mitch Moreland, Ted Milton and Mike Proffitt will be enshrined on April 5 against South Carolina.
- The Ring of Honor is named after legendary head coach Ron Polk, who led the Bulldogs from 1976-97 and again from 2002-08. Affectionately referred to as the Godfather of Southeastern Conference baseball, Polk served 31 years as head coach in the league, including a stint at the University of Georgia (2000-01).
- The first SEC coach in any sport to reach 1,000 victories, Polk guided Mississippi State to six College World Series appearances and owned

a 1,139-590 record with the Maroon and White. He totaled 1,373 career coaching victories, making eight total trips to Omaha.

THE DUDE EFFECT

- It's been written about. It's been Tweeted about. It's been talked about. It's what has become known as The Dude Effect. If anyone had forgotten or doubted that the best home-field advantage in all of college baseball is inside the confines of Mississippi State's Dudy Noble Field. Opponents don't simply have to defeat the Diamond Dawgs. Visitors have to conquer the cowbell-crazed home crowd as well.
- Winning at home has been challenging for opponents when coming to The Dude. Since 1967, the Diamond Dawgs have won over 72-percent of their home games.
- Fans come and fill the stadium as 126 games have had crowds of 10,000 fans.
- In 2023, over Super Bulldog Weekend, the Dawgs set the NCAA On-Campus Attendance Record as The Dude saw 16,423 fans into the stadium when the Diamond Dawgs took on Ole Miss on April 15, 2023.
- The Diamond Dawgs have won 1,282 games at The Dude.
- Under Head Coach Chris Lemonis, the Dawgs are 142-53 (72.8%) at Dudy Noble Field.
- Coach Lemonis has guided the Dawgs to two seasons of 30 or more wins. The Diamond Dawgs won 37 games in 2019, the most at The Dude under Lemonis.

OMADAWGS

- Did you know that the Diamond Dawgs are one of four programs in NCAA History to play in the NCAA Men's College World Series in six-straight decades?
- The Dawgs join Arizona State, Texas and Florida State as the only teams that have been to an MCWS for six decades.
- Mississippi State has advanced to Omaha 12 times in program history, with three appearances coming since 2018.
- The Omadawgs have one national championship (2021), a runner-up finish, and two third-place finishes in program history.
- The Dawgs have advanced to the MCWS in the 1970s, 1980s, 1990s, 2000s, 2010s, and 2020s. MSU went to the MCWS in 1971, 1979, 1981, 1985, 1990, 1997, 1998, 2007, 2013, 2018, 2019, and 2021.

2025 SEC BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

- With the 2025 season brings in a new format for the SEC Baseball Tournament.
- With the additions of Oklahoma and Texas into the SEC, the league office have announced that all 16 teams will participate in the leagues annual post-season tournament.
- The single-elimination format will be played from May 20-25 at the Hoover Met Stadium.
- The six-day format will feature four games each on Tuesday and Wednesday of the tournament and two games each on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, followed by a championship game on Sunday.

HEAD COACH CHRIS LEMONIS



Since arriving in Starkville, Chris Lemonis has guided the Bulldogs to unparalleled success, including capturing Mississippi State's first national championship in 2021. He is the first Division I head coach to reach the College World Series in his first two full seasons as head coach of a program in the Super Regional era (since 1999).

In six seasons at MSU, Lemonis has compiled a 207-116 record (.641 winning percentage) and taken his program to two College World Series appearances. In his first two

complete seasons at the helm of the Bulldogs, Lemonis has won 50-plus games, posting a 52-15 record in 2019 and a 50-18 mark in 2021. Lemonis notched his 100th win at MSU in his first 130 games. He is the fastest head coach in program history to reach the 100-win mark.

Lemonis led Mississippi State to its first-ever national championship in 2021 and was named the National Coach of the Year by Baseball America following a 50-18 campaign and an impressive 10-3 showing in the NCAA Tournament. He became the fourth person picked as Baseball America's National Coach of the Year as both an assistant and head coach.

The 18th head coach in the program's storied history, a journey of nearly 40 years came full circle when he was introduced on June 25, 2018, on Adkerson Plaza inside Dudy Noble Field. The son of a 1973 State graduate, Lemonis resided in Starkville as a child and now leads one of the perennial powerhouses in college baseball.

For the 40th time in program history the Mississippi State Bulldogs went to an NCAA Regional in 2024. Lemonis saw junior Khal Stephen take home three Third Team All-American honors (NCBWA, ABCA, D1 Baseball), while sophomores Dakota Jordan and Jurrangelo Cjintje took home two All-American honors. Cjintje was second team by Perfect Game and NCBWA, while Jordan was second team by NCBWA and third team by Baseball America. MSU had four players earn ABCA All-Regional honors, Jordan (first team), Cjintje (first team), Stephen (first team) and David Mershon (second team). Mershon became the first shortstop at MSU to earn First Team All-SEC honors at shortstop since 2017. The Bulldogs also had success in the 2024 MLB Draft as they had the 20th first round selection in school history and saw 11 players get selected, the most by any school. Eight of the 11 players selected were pitchers, which set a school record. Mississippi State finished ranked in four of the five baseball polls and were as high as 17 by Baseball America. The MSU pitching staff saw dramatic improvements on the mound in 2024 as they decreased the team ERA by 2.84 from 2023. MSU also saw the starting pitching duo of Stephen and Cjintje posted over 80 innings pitched, eight or more wins, and 100 or more strikeouts. This was the first time since 2019 that MSU has accomplished that feat.

In 2023, Lemonis saw freshman outfielder Dakota Jordan earn Freshman All-American honors by Perfect Game. Awards continued to roll in as Hunter Hines and Colton Ledbetter earned ABCA All-Region honors. Hines also picked up First Team All-SEC honors, and Jordan was named to the All-SEC Freshman team. During the season, the Dawgs hit the fourth most homers in program history with 91, and freshman Ross Highfill became the first player since 2017 to hit three homers in a single game.

Following the 2022 season, Lemonis and the Bulldogs had six players drafted in the MLB Draft, increasing his total to 25 during his time in Starkville. He has extended his streak of having a first-round pick drafted as Landon Sims went early in the 2022 MLB Draft. Not only did the Bulldogs have success in the MLB Draft, but RJ Yeager was named Third Team All-American by the ABCA, NCBWA and Collegiate Baseball Newspapers. Hunter Hines earned Freshman All-American honors by Collegiate Baseball, NCBWA and D1 Baseball.

In 2021, the Bulldogs had five players drafted from their national championship squad, while a total of 19 players have been drafted by Major League Baseball during Lemonis' time in Starkville, including at least one first rounder in each year of his tenure. For the second straight full season, the Mississippi State baseball program saw a pair of student-athletes honored as All-Americans by the American Baseball Coaches Association in Tanner Allen and Landon Sims.

In his first season at the helm of the Diamond Dawgs, Lemonis became the winningest first-year head coach in SEC history and in the process led the 2019 edition to the second-most victories in program history at 52 (54; 1989). The 40 victories over MSU's first 50 games marked the third-most in the first 50 games of a season in program history and set the tone for State's second-straight trip to the College World Series.

Lemonis became one of just three SEC head coaches to advance to the College World Series in their inaugural season in the conference, joining Jake Gibbs (Ole Miss, 1972) and fellow Diamond Dawg skipper Pat McMahon (Mississippi State, 1998).

Four Diamond Dawgs earned All-American honors during Lemonis' first season, while left-handed pitcher Ethan Small was tabbed National Pitcher of the Year (College Baseball Foundation; American Baseball Coaches Association) and right-handed pitcher JT Ginn earned the National Freshman of the Year honor (Collegiate Baseball, Perfect Game). Ginn and Small each earned specialty awards from the SEC, as well, grabbing the conference's Freshman and Pitcher of the Year, respectively.

A school-record-tying 11 Diamond Dawgs heard their names called in the 2019 Major League Baseball First Year Player Draft, including three taken in the first 10 rounds. Small became the 15th Diamond Dawg taken in the first round of the MLB Draft, while SEC career hits leader Jake Mangum (4th; New York Mets) and

Colby White (6th; Tampa Bay) each went in the first 10 rounds. The 11 selections were No. 3 nationally in 2019.

Owning a head coaching record of 308-184-2, Lemonis was also a part of nearly 800 wins as an assistant coach and three trips to the College World Series. During his time at Indiana, Lemonis' teams averaged 35.3 wins per season, including a 40-win campaign during his final season in Bloomington. He averaged 39.2 victories per year during his career in an assistant role (784 wins), bolstered by a 44.9 wins-per-season average at Louisville. The Cardinals were college baseball's winningest program during that eight-year span and made the program's first three trips to Omaha.

Lemonis not only understands what it takes to get to Omaha as a coach but also as a player. A 1992 graduate of The Citadel, Lemonis added a 1990 appearance in the College World Series as a student-athlete. The appearance makes the Bulldogs one of just three schools in Southern Conference history and only current member of the conference to advance to Omaha.

One of the top recruiters and player development coaches in the country, Lemonis has seen success at every coaching stop. After helping his alma mater, The Citadel, to five NCAA Regional appearances in 12 seasons as an assistant coach, Lemonis joined college teammate Dan McDonald's staff at Louisville and quickly turned the Cardinals into an Omaha contender.

After helping Louisville to seven postseason berths in eight years, the 2013 American Baseball Coaches Association/Baseball America Assistant Coach of the Year headed to Indiana to take his first head coaching job with the Hoosier program in 2015.

In each of his head coaching stops, Lemonis has led his team to the NCAA postseason in his first season at the helm. He helped the Hoosiers into the NCAA Tournament field during his initial season in Bloomington, before he guided Mississippi State to the College World Series in 2019 – his first season in Starkville.

Overall, Lemonis enters his 29th season as a collegiate coach in 2023, making two College World Series appearances as a head coach, taking three trips to Omaha as an assistant, earning 17 NCAA tournament berths and aiding in five 50-win seasons. His pupils have earned 35 All-America honors, 18 Freshman All-America laurels and 94 have signed professional baseball contracts, with 18 getting the call up to Major League Baseball.

Widely regarded as one of the elite recruiters and developers of talent in all of college baseball, a total of 100 student-athletes have been selected in the Major League Baseball Draft under Lemonis' watch, with 18 of those reaching the highest level of professional baseball.

Since arriving at Louisville for the 2006-07 academic year, Lemonis has been a part of 14 nationally ranked recruiting classes, including his first three classes at Mississippi State. His initial Diamond Dawgs recruiting class was tabbed as the No. 12 class nationally by Baseball America and Perfect Game, while it earned the No. 9 ranking from Collegiate Baseball Newspaper. In 2019, he and his staff brought in another top-10 ranked class, finishing as high as No. 6 by Baseball America.

Over his first four seasons in Starkville, Lemonis has tutored 20 picks in the MLB First Year Player Draft, including four first rounders and two second rounders. Sixteen of Lemonis' Indiana players were taken in the MLB Draft in his final four years in Bloomington and 14 signed professional contracts. He also recruited and coached nine of the Hoosier's school-record 10 MLB Draft choices in 2019.

Along with the second-most single-season victories (52) during the 2019 season, his team also posted the second-best 20-, 30- and 40-game starts (18-2, 25-5, 32-8) in program history. He joined Pat McMahon as the only two Diamond Dawg dugout bosses to lead the program to the College World Series in their initial campaign and his 52 wins were the most by a first-year SEC head coach in the conference's history.

Lemonis and his wife, the former Jill MacEldowney, have two daughters, Marissa and Mackenzie. The Myrtle Beach, South Carolina native earned his Bachelor of Science in physical education from The Citadel in 1992 and received his Master of Arts in sport management in 1994.

He is also no stranger to Starkville, as he resided on campus as a newborn during his father's time as a student at State. His father, Thomas, was a 1973 Mississippi State graduate with a degree in electrical engineering.

DUDY NOBLE FIELD

BIOGRAPHY

The largest on-campus facility in college baseball, Dudy Noble Field will see the 59th season of Mississippi State baseball at its current site in 2025. With over 1,700 games played at the venue, the Diamond Dawgs have a .725 winning percentage at the facility, which received a \$68-million upgrade prior to the 2019 season.

The field is named in honor of longtime MSU baseball coach, athletics director and ABCA Hall of Famer Clarke Randolph "Dudy" Noble. On April 27, 1998 the facility was renamed Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium, honoring another ABCA Hall of Famer, former Bulldog skipper Ron Polk, and the late Gordon DeMent, a successful businessman and longtime fan of the Diamond Dawgs from Indianola, Mississippi.

The Origin

From 1929 until 1964, Mississippi State hosted its baseball games at the original on-campus venue, Hardy Field, which was located several hundred yards to the south of the Bulldogs' home football venue, Davis Wade Stadium at Scott Field. The baseball field was closed following the 1964 season to make way for the construction of Dorman Hall and for the next two seasons the Diamond Dawgs played their home games at Redbird Park in Columbus, Mississippi, capturing SEC titles both seasons at their temporary home.

The tin-roofed grandstand and 2,000-seat bleachers from the original Dudy Noble Field were transported to the stadium's present site, which became playable for the 1967 season. Since that time, facility enhancements have followed at a steady pace to make the "Carnegie Hall of College Baseball" one of the finest all-around facilities on the road to Omaha. Among with numerous upgrades, the current site has seen two complete demolitions and reconstructions, the latest occurring during a three-year span from 2017-2019 and opening prior to the start of the 2019 campaign.

Leading the Attendance Boom

With a laundry list of legendary names on its all-time roster, it comes as no surprise that Mississippi State ranks among the nation's attendance leader's year in and year out. The Dudy Noble Field faithful have sold out the reserved seating allotment every season since 1987.

Along with routinely hosting some of the largest crowds in the SEC, the last 11 three-day Super Bulldog Weekend series have drawn more than 25,000 fans. The most fans for a Super Bulldog Weekend game during the 2023 season with 43,986 fans came to The Dude.

MSU eclipsed the 200,000 mark in paid attendance at Dudy Noble Field for six-straight seasons between 2012-17, marking the first such occurrence in the program's history. Over the past three seasons, MSU has eclipsed the 300,000 mark in paid attendance, which had never been done before in back-to-back-to-back seasons. In 2013, the Diamond Dawgs' five-millionth fan walked through the turnstiles at Dudy Noble Field. Since home attendance figures were charted starting in 1976, the "Carnegie Hall of College Baseball" has seen 7,616,815 fans rush through the gates.

In 24 of the last 25 seasons, Mississippi State has averaged 6,000 fans per game, including a record average of 11,094 during the 2023 campaign, the second-best mark in the nation. Overall, State has eclipsed the 200,000-fan mark 16 times since 2002, with a school-record 373,784 viewing the 2019 home schedule.

Of the top 25 all-time college baseball on-campus attendances, Dudy Noble Field finds itself on the list 24 times, most notably owning the all-time on-campus attendance record of 16,423 on April 15, 2023. The Bulldogs own all of the top 15 marks and 19 of the top 20 marks, in NCAA on-campus history and are the only NCAA baseball program to boast on-campus attendances of 14,000 or more. The five largest NCAA Super Regional crowds have all assembled in Starkville, Mississippi, as well.

From April 14-16, 2023, the Bulldog faithful flooded the gates at Dudy Noble Field to the tune of 43,986 fans for a three-game series versus Ole Miss. The nearly 44,000 fans on the weekend set an NCAA on-campus attendance record for a three-game series.

During the 2024 season, the Diamond Dawg faithful showed up in groves as 370,711 fans appeared at The Dude with Mississippi State receiving the largest average attendance numbers in the nation, averaging 10,903 fans per game. The

Diamond Dawgs had 10,000+ fans at 23 games last season at Dudy Noble Field. Dudy Noble Field has ushered in crowds of 10,000 or better 128 times, including 2007 NCAA Super Regional-record draws of 13,715 and 12,620 for nationally-televised, late-morning games against Clemson. In 2019, the first season of the "New Dude," the Diamond Dawgs garnered crowds of 10,000-plus 10 times. Over the last three seasons the number of 10,000-plus crowds have grown and MSU set a school record with 21 during the 2024 season.

Mississippi State has hosted 26 postseason events at the facility, including three NCAA District III Tournaments (1973-75), five SEC tournaments (1979, 81, 83, 88 & 95), 16 NCAA Regionals (1979, 84-85, 87-89, 90, 92, 97, 2000, 03, 13, 16, 19 & 21) and four NCAA Super Regionals (2007, 16, 19 & 21).

The Left Field Lounge™

The aura of Mississippi State baseball at Dudy Noble Field is certainly not confined to the loyal legions in the impressive grandstand, pro-style luxury sky suites or luxurious Left Field Lofts.

In fact, some of the more highly-prized seats at Bulldog baseball games are found beyond the outfield fence in the Left Field Lounge™. Waiting lists greet those seeking to purchase one of the 96 outfield lounges in the iconic two-level outfield tailgate.

Once a colorful assortment of pickup trucks, motor homes, and trailers — most equipped with barbecue grills — lined the outfield fence, completing a circle of humanity at Dudy Noble Field. Now, the permanent lounge spaces are connected to the concourse, allowing everyone to stroll through and experience the iconic lounge culture.

What began in the late 1960s as a popular gathering spot for baseball-loving MSU supporters now forms college baseball's largest tailgate party.

The "New Dude"

The second demolition at the current site occurred following the 2017 season and the \$68 million facility opened its gates for the 2019 campaign. Architect Wier Boerner Allin, along with consultants Populous and famed stadium architect/State alum Janet Marie Smith designed the project, while construction manager ICM and general contractor JESCO Construction, Inc. oversaw the construction.

Covering 12 acres of land on the Mississippi State University campus, the 230,000 square foot facility carries on Dudy Noble Field's legacy as the "Carnegie Hall of College Baseball." Installation of the second largest scoreboard in college baseball, measuring 43 feet wide by 60 feet high, started the project in 2017. The board, which was the largest in college baseball upon installation, is larger than boards owned by three Major League Baseball teams. The addition of 96 permanent Left Field Lounge rigs encircling the outfield followed during the fall of 2018.

The concourse and lower-level grandstands were in place for the 2018 season, with the Diamond Suites, upper-deck reserved seating area and three unique club areas — Farm Bureau Triple Crown Club, Charlie and Dana Stephenson Omaha Club and The Rooftop Club — were completed prior to the 2019 campaign. The newest version of Dudy Noble Field also features increased restroom facilities and concession points of sale.

The player spaces also received an upgrade, expanding to cover 18,000 square feet underneath the facility. The fully-equipped Bruce and Julie Martin Locker Room includes an embedded equipment room, houses 40 wooden lockers and features an oversized, dimensional halo-lit '85 Script Mississippi State sign suspended overhead in the middle of the room.

The more spacious locker room includes an attached training room with whirlpool and fully-functional fueling station. The Mitch Moreland Hitting Tunnel, which is equipped with HitTrax, and Turner & Gloria Wingo Team Lounge are easily accessed from the home dugout, with the eye-popping player entrance and Hassell H. Franklin Omaha Room greeting players as they enter the facility. The Pat McMahon Pitching Lab is also housed under the stadium, featuring arm care and conditioning equipment, one oversized turfed mound with three pitching rubbers and state of the art video equipment.
