CREDENTIALS

Media credentials for Mississippi State home baseball games are required for media covering games at Dudy Noble Field and are issued through the MSU Athletic Media Relations Office for working press only. Written requests by accredited media members on company letterhead should be submitted to Andrew Piper at least 48 hours prior to the requested game(s). If needed, credentials can be left at will call, located at the stadium ticket office under the main grandstand. Will call opens two hours prior to SEC and weekend games and 90 minutes prior to all other games.

PRESS BOX MEDIA SERVICES

The MSU Media Relations Office provides pregame notes and statistics, lineup sheets and scorecards in the press box prior to each game at Dudy Noble Field. A complete box score along with play-by-play is available approximately 15 minutes after each game. Wired and wireless internet connections are available for media use in the press box along with information for accessing live in-game stats through the StatBroadcast® System. The press box sits above the grandstand behind home plate. The press box phone number is (662) 325-3776.

COACH CANNIZARO MEDIA AVAILABILITY

The day before each home weekend series begins, head coach Andy Cannizaro will preview the upcoming series immediately following afternoon practice in the Hall of Champions at Dudy Noble Field. For road weekends, Cannizaro will preview the series in the same location the day before departure or the day of.

FACILITIES/PARKING

Limited media parking at Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium is available in a designated media parking area on the east side of the Humphrey Coliseum. A media parking pass issued in advance by MSU Athletic Media Relations is required.

MSU PLAYER/ASSISTANT COACH AVAILABILITY

Players and assistant coaches will be made available to the media each week to discuss the upcoming weekend series. On gameday, players are **ONLY** available **POSTGAME**.

For post-practice interviews, media members should contact Andrew Piper no later than 9 a.m. the day of the requested interview. In most cases, players will be available for a brief time before and for a lengthier time after practice.

Telephone interviews can also be scheduled with players on a call-back basis during the week with arrangements made through Andrew Piper.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Requested MSU players along with head coach Andy Cannizaro will be available for interviews approximately 10 minutes after all games near the third base camera well adjacent to the MSU dugout. To facilitate the process, a member of the MSU Athletic Media Relations staff will solicit interview requests from media members in the final two innings of the game and will be available to assist with those interviews on the field.

Due to time constraints, players and coaches will not be available for interviews between MSU doubleheader games.

The Mississippi State locker room and stadium dugouts at Dudy Noble Field are off limits to the media. Any media member found in such areas will immediately have their credentials revoked.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Credentials are also required for photographers and videographers at MSU home games, and on-field photographers must operate from and stow equipment in the photo boxes located on the outfield end of each dugout. Photographers are restricted from entering the field of play and team dugouts. For safety reasons, flash photography is not permitted at Dudy Noble Field. Other than marketing events (first pitch, national anthem, recognitions), no photography is permitted at field level pregame.

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Mississippi State University is home to one of the nation's largest and oldest collegiate baseball radio networks, affording fans throughout the Magnolia State and beyond an opportunity to regularly follow the exploits of the Diamond Dawgs throughout the season.

Network programming for the MSU baseball broadcasts is distributed and coordinated through the facilities of Learfield Sports, Inc., headquartered in Jefferson City, Missouri.

The 2018 Mississippi State University Baseball Radio Network, a team of more than a dozen radio outlets, carries the broadcasts of a 40-game network schedule (all 30 SEC weekend contests and 10 selected non-conference games) plus all postseason competition. In addition to the 40-game network schedule, the broadcasts of most non-network games are carried in the Golden Triangle area by WKBB-FM (100.9) in West Point, Mississippi.

Mississippi State baseball network radio broadcasts (some limited exceptions) are also available via the internet through HailState.com.

The broadcasts feature pregame and postgame interviews, hosted by the "voice" of the Diamond Dawgs, Jim Ellis. For a select number of broadcasts in 2018, former Diamond Dawg and 11-year MLB veteran Jay Powell will join Ellis in the booth.

Radio broadcasts of Bulldog Baseball originated in the 1960s on Starkville radio station WSSO thanks to the work of the late Joe Phillips, a pioneer in radio broadcasting in the state of Mississippi. The press box at Dudy Noble Field is named in honor of Phillips.

But credit for turning the single-station broadcast into an impressive collection of radio outlets blanketing the Magnolia State goes to Ellis, who in 2018 enters his 40th season of describing the exploits of the Diamond Dawgs. A native of West Point, Mississippi, and a 1969 MSU grad, Ellis coordinates the operation of State's baseball radio network. Ellis also handles the play-by-play for MSU football and basketball after having teamed on those broadcasts for more than three decades with MSU radio legend Jack Cristil.

DAWG TALK

The MSU baseball broadcast lineup also includes the popular weekly Andy Cannizaro call-in radio show "DawgTalk". The show is expected to begin an eight-week run March 26 and airs each Monday from 7-8 p.m. live from The Veranda Restaurant in Starkville. Fans can attend in person for free at 208 Lincoln Green, listen on affiliated radio stations in Mississippi.

SEC NETWORK+

Bulldog fans around the world can watch 39 of State's 56 regular-season games in 2018 live on the SEC Network + digital app, including all 23 of MSU's home games, which in 2015 replaced the 2014 online video platform HailStateTV as MSU's HD digital live stream provider.

Bart Gregory, a native of Nanih Waiya, Mississippi, and a 1999 MSU graduate, is the SECN+ play-by-play commentator for the majority of MSU's broadcasts. Gregory joined Ellis in the radio booth in 2012 before switching over to television broadcasts in 2015. He began his career in sports broadcasting at the University of West Alabama in 2000 and returned to Starkville the following year. While at MSU, he initially served as on-air talent for women's basketball games and select baseball games, while hosting MSU football pregame and postgame shows.

Gregory's affiliation with the MSU athletics family began in 2000 with his appointment as an account representative for the Bulldogs Sports Network. Since 2008, he has served in the Bulldog Club as assistant athletics director for annual giving.

Andy Cannizaro, a former Major Leaguer and one of the rising coaching stars in college baseball, was named Mississippi State's 17th head baseball coach by Director of Athletics John Cohen on November 5, 2016.

Cannizaro has excelled in identifying talent at every stop of his career, including six years as a scout for the New York Yankees and two years as a Southeastern Conference assistant coach. Seven of the players he drafted for the Yankees from 2010-14 reached the Major Leagues, including Bulldog greats Jacob Lindgren and Jonathan Holder.

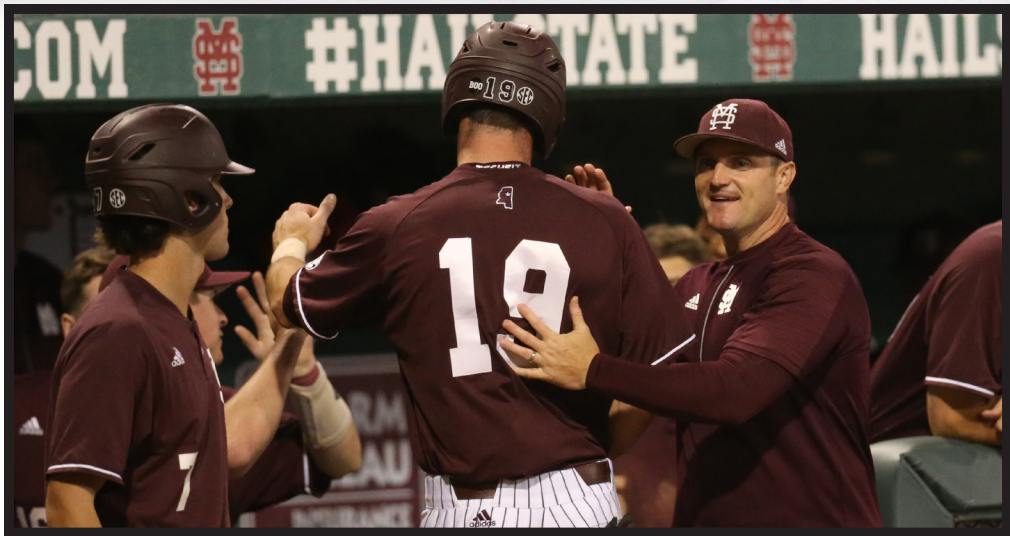
In just his first year at the helm of the Diamond Dawgs in 2017, Cannizaro became just the second first-year head coach in program history to notch a 40-win season and reach the NCAA Super Regional round. It was a historic first year in multiple ways as Cannizaro's club became the 22nd team in the current 64-team NCAA Tournament format to win a regional after losing the opening game as MSU won four games in two days to claim the Hattiesburg Regional.

That 40-win team consisted of three draft picks, highlighted by 2017 National Player of the Year Brent Rooker becoming the 14th Diamond Dawg to be selected in the first round just one year after being drafted in the 38th round. Also taken in the 2017 draft was First Team All-SEC shortstop Ryan Gridley and 2017 Second Team All-SEC outfielder Jake Mangum.

With assistance from Cannizaro, Rooker accomplished much more with an improved offensive and defensive approach during his redshirt junior season, highlighted by becoming just the second player in SEC history to claim the SEC Triple Crown (joined only by former Diamond Dawg Rafael Palmeiro), along with being named the SEC Male Athlete of the Year, SEC Player of the Year and an All-American by six publications.

Cannizaro arrived in Starkville after serving as hitting coach and recruiting coordinator at LSU under head coach Paul Mainieri since July 2014. Cannizaro made a tremendous impact in two seasons with a dynamic ability to develop hitters and an aggressive base running prowess. He coached six Tiger batters to All-America recognition and 11 hitters were drafted. Five were selected in the first five rounds.

One of his top protégés, Alex Bregman, became the highest drafted batter in LSU history, going No. 2 overall to the Houston Astros in the 2015 MLB Draft. It took Bregman, a two-time All-American and Golden Spikes Award finalist, just one year to reach



the Big Leagues.

In 2015, Cannizaro made an immediate impact as the Tigers finished among the NCAA's top seven in five different offensive categories. LSU led the nation in base hits (762), while finishing third in stolen bases (130), third in doubles (146), fourth in batting average (.314) and seventh in runs scored (451). The total stolen bases were the most by the program in 28 years since the 1987 club tallied a school-record 156. He helped guide LSU to an SEC championship and the 2015 College World Series. Seven of Cannizaro's hitters were drafted that year, including Bregman.

Cannizaro's leadership during the 2016 campaign might have been his finest work. Despite losing eight starters from their prolific lineup of 2015, the Tigers still managed to boast one of the SEC's top offenses. LSU finished the year ranked first in the SEC in stolen bases (95), second in runs (426), second in triples (21), third in scoring (6.5), third in on-base percentage (0.385) and third in slugging percentage (0.422). The Tigers reached an NCAA Super Regional and four players were selected in the 2016 MLB Draft.

A record-breaking base stealer as a player, Cannizaro's aggressiveness on the base paths has carried over into his coaching career. Since 2015, no SEC team has stolen more bases than the Tigers (225). That two-year total is 31 better than the SEC's next closest, Vanderbilt (194).

Before his time at LSU, Cannizaro worked as a Yankees scout from 2009 through 2014, evaluating and recruiting amateur players in preparation for the annual MLB Draft. He was the Yankees' official representative at the 2013 and 2014 MLB Drafts. He also worked as the advanced scout for the team as it prepared for the 2011 and 2012 playoffs.

Cannizaro was the Yankees' seventh-round selection in the 2001 MLB Draft, and he played in the organization for seven seasons, reaching the Major League level in September 2006. He joined the Tampa Bay Rays in 2008 and was on the club's big-league roster for the first two months of the season. He later played for the AAA affiliates of the Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox before retiring from the game in September 2009.

During his Major League career, Cannizaro played and learned under Hall of Famer Joe Torre and World Series champion Joe Maddon.

Cannizaro, a four-year starter at shortstop for Tulane (1998-2001), led the 2001 Green Wave squad to the first College World Series appearance in school history, batting a remarkable .395 with 118 hits, 34 doubles, 70 RBI and 52 stolen bases.

A two-time all-America and three-time all-Conference USA performer, Cannizaro is Tulane's all-time leader in games played (248), at-bats (1,030), hits (350), doubles (85) and stolen bases (128). He was inducted in 2007 into the Tulane Athletics Hall of Fame. Cannizaro remains the C-USA all-time leader in career hits and career stolen bases.

A native of Mandeville, La., Cannizaro graduated from Tulane in December 2001 with a bachelor of arts in sociology/business minor.

He and his wife, Allison, are the parents of two children, Gabrielle and Pierce.

CANNIZARO THE PLAYER

A key member of Tulane's inaugural trip to the College World Series team in 2001, Cannizaro rejoins the Big Leagues after spending a portion of the 2006 season with the Yankees, when he hit .250 (2-for-8) with a home run and an RBI in 13 games.

Cannizaro spent Spring Training with the Rays and was one of the last players to be released. He was sent to Tampa Bay's Triple-A affiliate, the Durham Bulls, where he hit .289 with five doubles and five RBI in 13 games.

Cannizaro began his professional career in 2001 in short-season Staten Island, and began the 2002 season in Advanced-A Tampa. He was bumped to Double-A Trenton in 2003 and began the 2004 season there as well before being promoted to Triple-A after hitting .314 with 18 doubles, three homers and 44 RBI in 54 games with the Thunder.

He completed the 2004 season in Columbus, and in 2005 hit .276 with 32 doubles, a triple, three home runs and 32 RBI

before receiving the call. His batting average was a team high for players with more than 150 at-bats, and his doubles total paced the club.

In 2006, Cannizaro led Columbus with a .361 batting average off left-handed pitchers and paced the club with 32 doubles, which ranked fifth in the International League. He went to Spring Training 2007 with the Yankees, but missed nearly four months with a back injury. He opened the year rehabbing in Trenton before moving on to Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on June 30 and played in a combined 36 games at second, 14 at shortstop and eight at third and hit .283 with 13 doubles and two home runs while driving in 22 runs.

A two-time, first-team All-Conference USA selection, Cannizaro was named second-team All-American by Baseball Weekly and Collegiate Baseball in 2001 when he hit .395 (118-for-299) with 34 doubles, three triples, three home runs, 70 RBI and 52 stolen bases.

In June 2016, one of the top pitching masterminds made his way to Starkville, as coaching veteran Gary Henderson was named Mississippi State's pitching coach.

The 2012 Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year, Henderson is a seasoned veteran and one of the top pitching minds in the entire country. He has 29 years of coaching experience, including spending eight seasons at the helm of the Kentucky Wildcats, where his teams had unprecedented success and set numerous program records.

During his first season at State in 2017, Henderson led what may have been one of the most impressive coaching jobs in recent memory as he maneuvered around injuries to eight pitchers, which heavily depleted his staff. Henderson was able to maximize the pitchers he did have as three position players (Brant Blaylock, Cole Gordon and Jake Mangum) recorded victories on the mound during the year as the trio combined for five wins. Henderson also helped lead Konnor Pilkington to a spot on the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team, the summer following the 2017 season.

Well known for his ability to produce Major League talent on the mound, seven of Henderson's pitching protégés have reached the Majors since 2012, which is tops in the SEC. That total is two better than Florida and Vanderbilt's five during that five-year span.

Kentucky completed the most successful five-year span in program history under the leadership of Henderson, as the Wildcats won at least 30 games in five-straight seasons for the first time in school history. The team set the program record for wins on three separate occasions and rose to No. 1 in the nation for three weeks in 2012 for the first time in school history. He was voted SEC Coach of the Year by his peers after the school's record 2012 season. In 2006, the program won its first and only SEC Championship in baseball under the guidance of Henderson and Cohen.

Henderson is the fastest coach in Kentucky history to reach 200 wins. In his tenure with the Wildcats, 72 players were picked in the MLB Draft or signed as a free agent.

Henderson served as the pitching coach on the USA Collegiate National Team during the 2015 summer. While managing a dynamic pitching staff, Henderson oversaw a Team USA no-hitter over the Cuban Senior National Team, the first time Cuba had been no-hit in international play. Team USA won its series meetings with Cuba and Taiwan.

Prior to Kentucky, Henderson spent five seasons as pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at Oregon State. The Beavers notched the school's first ever College World Series titles in 2006 and 2007, riding the arms of several players recruited by Henderson.



son. The most notable was CWS MVP Kevin Gunderson, who pitched a brilliant postseason in leading the Beavers to the title.

At Oregon State, Henderson coached eight Beaver pitchers who were drafted by major league teams, five of whom were selected in the top eight rounds. With the help of Henderson's recruiting efforts, the Beavers improved from 19 wins in 1999 to 31 in both the 2001 and 2002 seasons, finishing 31-24 and 31-23, respectively. In his time with the Beavers, two of Henderson's recruiting classes were ranked among the top 30 nationally. Meanwhile, his pitching staff led the Pac-10 Conference in complete games in both the 2000 and 2001 seasons.

Before Oregon State, Henderson served as pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the high-octane Florida Gators from 1995-98. In that time, he helped the Gators to the SEC Championship and the College World Series in both 1996 and 1998. Collegiate Baseball awarded national rankings to all four of Henderson's recruiting classes at Florida, including a No. 4 spot in 1996. The 1996 season also saw Collegiate Baseball tab Henderson as the National Assistant Coach of the Year.

In his playing days, Henderson pitched one year at Linfield College before transferring to San Diego State. He compiled a 19-5 career record at the two schools, earning his first career win in a road matchup at Southern California.

Henderson, a former standout prep quarterback, earned a bachelor's degree in english from San Diego State and a master's degree in sports psychology from SDSU.

Henderson and his wife, Vicki, have two sons, Alex and Ty.

Andy Cannizaro added Jake Gautreau to his coaching staff in June 2017 as an assistant coach. Gautreau will serve as the Diamond Dawgs' recruiting coordinator, along with assisting Cannizaro in instructing MSU's hitters.

"I am extremely excited to add Jake to our coaching staff and welcome his family to Starkville," Cannizaro said. "His most recent position at the Boras Corporation allows him to contribute skills as an evaluator of talent and a great influence for the present and future student-athletes that come to Mississippi State. Having known Jake for nearly 20 years, I know that he will have an immediate impact on our program, not only in recruiting, but also in helping to continue to develop the young men that are currently wearing the M-over-S logo. Our goal is still to win the first National Championship in program history and I feel that this is another step on the path that leads to that goal."

In August 2013, Gautreau was named an 'Assistant Ready to Lead' by Perfect Game for his work with the Green Wave in his first four years on the staff. Midway through his fifth season in 2014, Tulane head coach Rick Jones stepped down, making way for Gautreau to serve as interim head coach for the remainder of the year.

During his tenure at Tulane from 2010-14, Gautreau served as the program's recruiting coordinator, hitting instructor and infielders coach. He tutored some of the finest hitters to come through Tulane. Four of his student-athletes – Rob Segedin, Jeremy Schaffer, Garrett Cannizaro and Brennan Middleton – were selected in the MLB First-Year Player Draft.

In 2010, Segedin boasted a .434 batting average, becoming just the fifth player in school history to top the .400 mark for an entire season.

Most recently, Gautreau served as Certified Player Agent for the Boras Corporation, where he identified and evaluated talent and recruited premier amateur baseball players from across the country, along with helping them prepare for the MLB Amateur Draft.



Cannizaro and Gautreau were teammates at Tulane as the duo helped lead the Green Wave to the first College World Series appearance in program history in 2001. Gautreau played third base from 1999-2001 and was named Conference USA Player of the Decade in 2005 in recognition of his career accomplishments at Tulane.

The three-year letterwinner boasted a .344 career batting average with 58 home runs, 103 walks, 200 runs scored, 233 RBI's and 275 hits. Gautreau ranks among the Conference USA leaders in RBI's, home runs, runs scored and total bases.

Gautreau also played for the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team in 2000. He hit .348 (32-for-92) with seven doubles and four home runs to go with 20 RBI and a .576 slugging percentage.

After being drafted by the San Diego Padres with the 14th overall pick in the first round of the 2001 MLB Draft, Gautreau played professional baseball for eight years before accepting an assistant coach position at his alma mater in 2009.

Gautreau is married to Erin Dobyanski Gautreau, a former Tulane volleyball player, and the couple have two sons, William and Weston. The McAllen, Texas, native earned his Bachelor of Arts in media arts from Tulane in 2011.

MSU baseball head coach John Cohen announced Mike Brown as the Diamond Dawgs' new camps coordinator and volunteer assistant in July 2016.

In his first year as a member of the Diamond Dawgs staff, Brown began the year as State's first-base coach, before moving across the diamond to become the third-base coach as part of his responsibilities. Brown was also tasked with coaching MSU's outfielders on a daily basis, a corps that included Southeastern Conference All-Defensive and All-SEC second team selection Jake Mangum. In addition to working with Mangum, Brown has played a major role in the development of returners Elijah MacNamee, Tanner Poole and Hunter Vansau.

Brown arrived in Starkville via New Mexico State, where he spent the 2015-16 seasons as the Aggies' assistant coach. Brown helped oversee New Mexico State's hitters, hitting system and coached third base, while also overseeing the NMSU outfield. Brown was an instrumental part in NMSU making the biggest turnaround in college baseball last season, as the Aggies won 23 more games than the 2015 season, finishing 34-23.

Under Brown's leadership, the Aggies' offense made impressive strides from 2015 and dominated the Western Athletic Conference, leading the way in a multitude of categories. In total, NMSU led the WAC in batting (.297), slugging percentage (.445), runs (371), RBIs (344), doubles (112), home runs (49), HBPs (65) and total bases (887).

Brown's leadership also helped provide one of the best individual seasons in New Mexico State history, as junior outfielder Daniel Johnson became the first Aggie since 2009 to earn All-American honors. Along with being named to the ABCA/Rawlings All-American Third Team, Johnson also garnered WAC Player of the Year honors, All-WAC Team laurels and was listed to the ABCA/Rawlings First Team All-Region.

Along with Johnson, the 2016 season saw the Aggies have the first All-American pitcher in school history, as Kyle Bradish was named a Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American. In total, Brown and NMSU had two All-Americans, one conference player of the year and five total All-WAC honorees.

Prior to joining the Aggies, Brown spent two years working at the University of Kentucky under current MSU pitching coach Gary Henderson. In his two seasons at UK, Brown helped direct the Wildcats to the semifinals of the SEC Tournament and an NCAA Regional Finals appearance. Brown had a number of responsibilities with the Wildcats, including serving as first-base coach for six Southeastern Conference games. Brown assisted in practice management, planning and coordination, while also working directly with the Wildcat hitters.

Once again, Brown's offensive prowess was on display, as the Wildcats led the SEC in batting (.254), slugging percentage (.324), on-base percentage (.348), hits (323) and walks (145).

In his two seasons as UK's graduate assistant coach, Brown helped develop one of the top players in collegiate baseball

history in A.J. Reed. Reed was a dominant double threat, sweeping the national awards while leading the NCAA in home runs, slugging percentage and OPS and pacing the rigorous SEC in wins on the mound. Reed's success led him to be named National Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball and ABCA, along with being named the Baseball America College Player of the Year and was the highest-drafted player under Brown (2nd round, Houston Astros, 2014).

Brown also served on the UK coaching staff in 2008 under both Cohen and Henderson, his first season after starring on the diamond for the Wildcats in 2007.

The Woodland, Calif, native was also the manager for the Fulton Railroaders Summer Baseball Club in the Ohio Valley League during the summer of 2014. Brown managed the team to a 22-18 record, finishing second place in the league. The Railroaders capped the year on a high note, winning 12 of their last 14 games, losing their final two in the playoffs. The Railroaders led the Ohio Valley League in batting average, slugging percentage, on-base percentage, total hits and walks under Brown's management.

The summer prior, Brown spent time with the Amsterdam Mohawks in the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League (PGCBL). As an assistant coach, he helped coordinate the offense while also helping on the defensive side. The Amsterdam Mohawks Baseball Club won the PGCBL Championship with a record of 25-18, while winning 20 of its last 22 games.

Brown arrived to Kentucky after spending the past three years as the director of baseball of KOA Sports. There he coached the 16-and-under and the 18-and-under showcase teams. While expanding the KOA Sports name, Brown held after-school clinics and served as a mentor to kids both on and off the field.

Brown graduated from UK in 2008, earning a degree in agricultural economics. Immediately following graduation, Brown served as a student assistant to the Wildcats baseball program, with UK winning a school-record 44 games and advancing to the championship game of the 2008 NCAA Ann Arbor Regional. Brown also helped develop two All-American position players in Sawyer Carroll (OF) and Collin Cowgill (OF).

As a former baseball player at UK from 2006-2007, Brown led the Wildcats to a historic pair of seasons and finished with his name all over the Wildcats' record book. After helping UK to the 2006 SEC Championship and hosting an NCAA Regional in his first season as a reserve utility man, Brown emerged as a star for SEC Coach of the Year John Cohen's 2007 squad. Brown led the club with a .369 average (8th in the SEC) and 68 runs. Brown's 1.28 average runs scored per game earned him a ninth-place finish in the NCAA that season as well. He finished 2007 ranked seventh in single-season history in runs, ninth in on-base percentage (.486), fourth in sac bunts (12) and ninth in hit by pitches (18).

He also played for Cuesta College before transferring to UK, where he was the only player in school history with a career average over .400 after earning a scorching .409 clip. In 2005, Brown was awarded the Western State Conference Player of the Year and was also named a California Junior College Baseball All-American. Brown was also recognized for being the Cuesta Athlete of the Year in 2005.

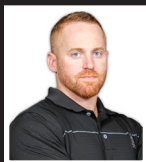
In his nine years in the coaching field, Brown helped produce top collegiate talent that has advanced to the professional level. Brown has had 23 players drafted, including six in the top five rounds. Four of those players have reached the highest level in baseball, playing in the Majors.

Brown was born in Woodland, Calif., and grew up in Davis, Calif. Brown is the son of Scott and Sandra Brown, with an older brother, Rich. Along with his wife Sarah, Brown has two daughters, Riki and Anna. Brown earned his masters of education in sports management and leadership in June 2014 from Kentucky.

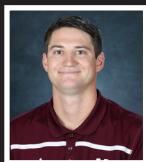
He trained baseball athletes at Sam Houston State, assisted with football strength training and directed the strength training of SHSU's track, golf, women's soccer and women's basketball athletes.

A three-time Southeastern Conference All-Defensive Team selection, Austin Cousino came to Starkville in July 2017 to fill the role of Graduate Assistant Video Coordinator. In addition to leading all the video efforts for MSU, Cousino assists the Diamond Dawg coaching staff in daily operations such as aiding with practice scheduling, camp coordination and managerial duties.

A three-year centerfielder at the University of Kentucky, Cousino knows what it takes to be successful in the SEC as the 2012 SEC Freshman of the Year was also a three-time Rawling Gold Glove recipient, three-time USA Baseball participant on the field. Second Season**



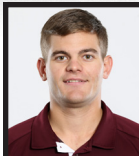

Since 1965, **145** different Diamond Dawgs have been selected a total of **190** times in the Major League Baseball Draft, including a school-record **11 in the 2016 draft**.

In 2017, National Player of the Year Brent Rooker became the **14th MSU player drafted in the first round**. With the Minnesota Twins selection, Rooker joined Dakota Hudson (2016), Hunter Renfroe (2013) and Chris Stratton (2012) as the fourth Diamond Dawg in the last five seasons to be selected in the first round.



HISTORY OF BULLDOG BASEBALL

1885

May 2 Mississippi A&M, behind team captain W.J. (Bill) Jennings, defeats Durant 7-2 in the first baseball game in MSU history. Jennings, who holds the distinction of being credited as the first man in Southern college baseball who could throw a curveball, baffles batters from all over the South in claiming A&M's first 12 wins. His composite four-year record, during which time he pitched every game for the Maroons, was a sparkling 12-1.

1893

October 12 A&M defeats the Ole Miss 6-3 in its first intercollegiate baseball game. The schools have met nearly 500 times, easily the longest baseball rivalry for both schools.

1909

April 11 Willie Mitchell hurls the first perfect game in Mississippi A&M history by striking out 26 LSU batters and helping the Maroons slip past the Tigers 1-0 in the second game of a twinbill in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Mitchell finishes with a 6-1 worksheet and dazzles his opponents by striking out 97 batters in 56 1/3 innings. Of his six victories, Mitchell throws one no-hitter, two one-hitters, two two-hitters and one six-hitter.

1918

April 5-6 Maroon hurlers R.H. Pepper and J.T. Peatross shut down Mississippi College by tossing back-to-back no-hitters. Pepper opens the two-game series by allowing the Choctaws only four walks in a 5-0 A&M win. But his shining accomplishment is overshadowed the following day as Peatross pitches only the second perfect game in MSU history, downing Mississippi College 1-0.

1920

April 5 Legendary Dudy Noble Field namesake Clarke Randolph "Dudy" Noble coaches his first game at his alma mater, a 5-3 loss to the University of Illinois. Noble will go on to coach at MSU for 26 years, during which time he compiles a 267-201-9 record and wins three Southern Conference Championships.

1924

May 13 Two baseball rarities occur in the same game during a campus contest against Ole Miss. Not only does A&M retire the Rebels on three straight pitches in one inning, but shortstop C.S. "Buddy" Myer gives the Maroons a much-needed boost by cranking out a grand slam to lead his team to a 6-4 victory. Myer's shot is believed to be the first grand slam in the history of MSU. Myer would go on to play 17 years in Major League Baseball with Washington and Boston, hitting for a career average of .303.

1947

April 18 LSU outfielder Joe Bill Adcock launches a shot an estimated 500 feet into the MSU swimming pool at the "old" Dudy Noble Field. Adcock would play only one season at LSU before playing 16 years in the major leagues, but his tremendous blow is still talked about by long-time Bulldog baseball fans.

1948

May 31 R.P. "Doc" Patty guides the Bulldogs to their first Southeastern Conference Championship in his initial season as head coach. MSU defeats Auburn in the championship playoff, three games to none, thanks to the efforts of All-SEC outfielder Johnny Grace, who led the Bulldogs with a .375 batting average.

1949

June Mississippi State College wins its second-consecutive SEC Championship by downing Kentucky three games to one in the title series. All-conference infielder Alex Grammas and brother Pete Grammas were crowd favorites in helping lead the Bulldogs to a 19-6 record. Alex Grammas would go on to play 10 seasons in Major League Baseball with the St. Louis Cardinals, Cincinnati Reds and Chicago Cubs, before coaching for the Detroit Tigers.

1965

May 9 Outfielder Del Unser belts three round-trippers and picks up a double to set a then single-game team record for total bases with 14. Unser spreads his blasts around, sending a shot to all three fields as the Bulldogs fall to Ole Miss, 10-7. The power outburst gives Unser seven homers, all coming in the last six regular-season games.

May 22 Behind conference hits-leader Mike Burns, the Bulldogs top Auburn in the SEC Championship Series, winning two games out of three. After falling to the Tigers in the series opener, MSU battles back with the strong pitching of Ken Tatum, who leads the Bulldogs to 10-1 and 10-2 victories to claim the conference crown. The title marked the first of four won under the guidance of coaching-great Paul Gregory.

1966

April 2 Pitcher James Carroll hurls 14 innings of four-hit baseball as he out-duels Alabama's Kenny Stabler, 2-1. All-American outfielder Del Unser scores the winning run with two out in the bottom of the 14th.

May 14 Right-hander Ken Tatum starts on only two days rest and shuts down the Tennessee Volunteers 9-3, giving the Bulldogs their second-consecutive SEC Championship. The game marked MSU's final appearance at Redbird Park in Columbus, which for two seasons served as the home for of MSU Baseball while their "new" Dudy Noble Field was being built.



1970

May 5 Sophomore left-hander Gene Henderson stymies Arkansas in the nightcap with a no-hit performance that gives the Bulldogs, ranked fifth nationally, a doubleheader sweep versus the Razorbacks, 6-0 and 1-0. Henderson, along with conference ERA-leader Dennis Hall (0.63) and wins-leader Brantley Jones (9-0), carries MSU to its fifth SEC title. State drops the first game of the best-of-three championship series against Tennessee but rebounds to claim the final two contests 4-3 and 1-0 at Dudy Noble Field.

1971

May 14 All-America third baseman Phil Still and All-SEC pitcher Mike Proffitt help lead the Bulldogs to 5-1 and 3-1 victories against Vanderbilt for their second-consecutive SEC Championship on the way to a 32-12 record and the school's first-ever appearance in the NCAA College World Series. After defeating the Commodores in two straight games for the league title, MSU then downs Georgia Tech 5-2 in the NCAA District III championship game in Gastonia, North Carolina, to become the fifth team from the SEC to advance to CWS competition.

1972

April 14 Dudy Noble Field hosts its first night game thanks to a new lighting system. MSU alumnus E.B. "Dutch" McCool, a former teammate of coach Paul Gregory, donates the lights to his alma mater, allowing the Bulldogs to play games at night when it is more convenient for fans to attend. McCool was one of the original founders of Holiday Inn.

1976

March 8 New Mississippi State head coach Ron Polk wins his first game as the Bulldog skipper, 4-0 versus Louisiana Tech. MSU finishes the season 28-17, which begins a streak of 32-consecutive winning seasons for Mississippi State.

1977

March 19 Junior outfielder Nat Showalter begins the season with a modest six-game hitting streak in which he hits .700 (14-for-20) on his way to posting the MSU single-season record for batting average. Showalter, the current manager of the Baltimore Orioles and former skipper of the New York Yankees, Arizona Diamondbacks and Texas Rangers, hits an SEC-leading .459 as he garners numerous all-America honors.

1979

May 14 Down 11-9 with one out in the bottom of the eighth, designated hitter Rick Dixon launches a slider nearly 400 feet over the left-center field fence for a three-run homer in the SEC Championship final. The win gives fourth-year head coach Ron Polk his first conference title in the first SEC Tournament held at Dudy Noble Field.

May 27 After falling to nationally-ranked New Orleans in the opening game, the Bulldogs successfully sweep through the loser's bracket to claim the NCAA South Regional Championship. An 8-6 win versus Murray State in the championship game of the first NCAA regional at Dudy Noble Field lifted MSU to its second appearance all-time in the prestigious NCAA College World Series.

1981

March 15 Junior first baseman Bruce Castoria sets a then school record and ties the conference mark by driving in 10 runs against UNLV in Las Vegas. Castoria, who would set another school record by cranking four grand slams on the year, hits his second of the season against the Runnin' Rebels, along with a three-run shot, an RBI single and two walks with the bases loaded to account for his 10 RBIs.

May 24 State jumps out to an early six-run lead and holds off a late rally by East Tennessee State to win the NCAA Atlantic Regional Championship at Clemson, South Carolina, 6-5. The Bulldogs would go on to finish fifth nationally at the NCAA College World Series.

1983

February 25 Freshman Rafael Palmeiro slaps the first pitch he sees as a collegian over the right field fence for a three-run homer on Opening Day against Mississippi College. Palmeiro, who would later pile up 3,020 hits and 569 home runs in a remarkable 20-year pro career, proceeds to hit safely in his first 20 games en route to a team-high and SEC-best .406 batting average.

April 2 Future major league slugger Will Clark hits his first collegiate home run, an eighth-inning grand slam to straight-away center field, to help lead MSU to a 27-10 pounding versus rival Ole Miss. The following day, Clark comes in late as a pinch runner and scores the winning run in a 7-6 come-from-behind victory against the Rebels.

1985

May 12 Behind strong pitching and excellent defense, the Bulldogs overpower the field in three games to win the SEC Tournament at LSU's Alex Box Stadium, clinching the title with an 8-3 win versus Georgia.

May 27 MSU tops Michigan 19-8 in the championship game of the NCAA South I Regional to earn its third trip to the NCAA College World Series under Ron Polk. Right fielder/relief pitcher Bobby Thigpen, who a year before hit a grand slam in his first career at-bat at Dudy Noble Field, shines in his home finale by cranking another bases-loaded blast. MVP Jeff Brantley is among seven Bulldogs named to the 11-player all-tournament team.

1985 (CONTINUED)

October 23 The United States Baseball Federation names Mississippi State All-American Will Clark the recipient of the Golden Spikes Award, amateur baseball's most prestigious honor. Clark had been the second player taken overall during baseball's June draft by the San Francisco Giants. Clark still ranks as MSU's all-time career leader in batting average (.391).

1987

March 1 The "new" Dudy Noble Field re-opens its gates to 4,040 fans who brave the chilly weather and experience what is considered by many to be the nicest baseball stadium in all of college baseball. The \$3.5 million showcase consists of 3,700 chairback seats, two 1,500-seat bleachers down each line and the spacious Joe Phillips Press Box. MSU doesn't disappoint the home crowd, downing Birmingham-Southern 4-1.

May 14 Freshman center fielder Jody Hurst blasts two homers and Mississippi State scores four runs in the bottom of the ninth to lead the sixth-seeded Bulldogs against top-seeded Georgia, 6-5, in the opening-round of the SEC Tournament in Athens, Georgia. MSU swept three games from Alabama in the final regular season series to qualify for the tournament and won four straight SEC Tournament games to claim the championship and earn a spot in an NCAA Regional.

1988

April 16 Mississippi State shatters its own NCAA on-campus attendance record (10,619) as 14,378 Bulldog faithful jam Dudy Noble Field for MSU's doubleheader split with LSU. The following evening, State plays its fifth regular season game ever on ESPN, besting the Tigers 1-0 on the strength of current MS Athletic Director John Cohen's fifth-inning solo shot to center field.

1989

April 22 Mississippi State once again sets the NCAA on-campus attendance record when a crowd of 14,991 witness the Bulldogs' doubleheader sweep of Florida. Junior second baseman Burke Masters caps the evening off in fine fashion by drilling a solo shot into the famous Left Field Lounge™ during the Bulldogs' final at-bat to lift MSU versus the Gators, 5-4.

April 30 Coach Ron Polk's Bulldogs claim their third SEC Championship in five years and the 10th in school history by winning a 28-16 slugfest at Kentucky, setting the single-game team record for most hits (30) and tying the record for most home runs (6). Junior outfielder Tracy Echols ties an SEC record by recording six hits in the contest.

May 25-28 Dudy Noble Field hosts its fifth NCAA regional in six years. The 1989 South Regional draws an NCAA-record 56,906 fans during the 11-game event, an average of 5,173 per game.

1990

May 28 Jon Shave drives in Tommy Raffo with two out in the top of the eighth to cap a three-run MSU rally and give State a 4-3 win versus Florida State in the championship game of the NCAA South II Regional in Starkville. With the win, MSU earns its fifth trip to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. Five Bulldogs were named to the all-tournament team, including MVP Burke Masters, whose dramatic ninth-inning grand slam against Florida State had earlier provided MSU with an 11-8 victory.

1992

May 21 Left-hander B.J. Wallace strikes out 19 Nicholls State batters in 10 innings of work at the NCAA Mideast Regional in Starkville, setting a new MSU single-season record with 145 strikeouts. His mark breaks the old record of 136 set by Jeff Brantley in 1985. A month later, Montreal made Wallace the No. 3 pick in the Major League Baseball Draft.

1993

May 8 State plays its 1,000th Southeastern Conference game, defeating in-state rival Ole Miss 10-2 in the first game of a doubleheader at Oxford.

1994

October Mississippi State's 10-man recruiting class is ranked the nation's best by Collegiate Baseball magazine, the highest national ranking for a class of MSU baseball newcomers.

1995

January 7 Mississippi State head coach Ron Polk is inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Polk joins 160 other all-time amateur baseball coaching greats enshrined in the ABCA Hall of Fame, coach C.R. "Dudy" Noble, inducted in 1967, and Paul Gregory, who joined the group in 1977.

1996

May 23-25 State returns to the NCAA postseason playoffs after a two-year absence, traveling to Palo Alto, California, to compete in the NCAA West Regional. Sophomore ace lefty Eric DuBose, who fanned 174 batters in 1996 to establish an MSU single-season strikeout record, went the distance in MSU's 6-2 win against UC Santa Barbara.

1997

February 27 With MSU's 11-4 win versus Delta State at Dudy Noble Field, coach Ron Polk becomes the 16th college coach to reach 1,000 career wins.

- April 19 In ceremonies prior to the Mississippi State-Alabama game, MSU's baseball facility is renamed Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium in honor of coach Ron Polk and a longtime MSU baseball fan from Indianola, Mississippi, the late Gordon DeMent. In the game, MSU downs the eventual NCAA runners-up in an 11-10 thriller.
- June 5 After hosting and winning the NCAA Mideast Regional and finishing tied for fifth at the College World Series in Omaha, Neb., MSU announces the retirement of head baseball coach Ron Polk and introduces Pat McMahon as the school's 14th head baseball coach. Polk, remaining on staff with the MSU administration in fund raising, announced August 18 the beginning of a drive to expand seating by more than 1,000 at MSU's home stadium, including the addition of 18 Diamond Suites.

1998

- February 17 Mississippi State launches the coaching era of Pat McMahon at Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium with the Diamond Dawgs' season opener against South Alabama. The Jaguars, who eventually advanced to the finals of the 1998 NCAA East Regionals, emerge with a closely-contested 14-13 win in a 12-inning marathon that lasted four hours and 30 minutes. It is the earliest home opener in the first 108 seasons of MSU Baseball.
- May 24 The Bulldogs complete a remarkable late-season surge, downing host Texas A&M 11-5 in the title game of the NCAA Central Regional at College Station, Texas, to earn the school's first repeat appearance in the NCAA College World Series. State claims one-run wins versus Washington, Rice and Texas A&M to reach the regional finals. Earlier, State won eight of its last 11 SEC games, qualifying for the SEC Tournament on the final weekend of the season and earning an at-large berth in the NCAA Regionals. In the summer, construction gets underway on the Diamond Suites/stadium expansion project at Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium.

2000

- May 28 Ty Martin launches a dramatic solo home run in the bottom of the ninth to give MSU a 10-9 win against Notre Dame in the championship game of NCAA Starkville Regional. The tournament attendance (47,365) sets an NCAA four-team regional record while the seven-game average (6,766) was the largest for an NCAA regional. Earlier MSU set a school record by selling 4,555 season tickets at expanded Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium.

2001

- March 13 MSU stages a two-run rally with two outs in the ninth to post a 6-5 win at New Orleans and become the 18th NCAA baseball program to reach the 2,000-win milestone. For the second-consecutive year MSU fans break the school season ticket sales record by purchasing 4,585 season tickets.
- May 20 Freshman Paul Maholm and sophomore Chris Young limit defending NCAA champ LSU to one run as the Bulldogs top the Tigers 4-1 in the championship game of the 2001 SEC Baseball Tournament in Hoover, Alabama. It is the second tourney win in relief for Young, who earns tournament MVP honors.
- June 19 Ron Polk, the winningest coach in SEC history, is named head baseball coach at Mississippi State, replacing four-year MSU skipper Pat McMahon, who resigned to become head baseball coach at Florida. In 2001 Polk capped a two-schools to the year term at Georgia and became the second coach in NCAA history to guide teams at three different schools to the College World Series when he directed UGA to an SEC title and a trip to Omaha.

2005

- May 29 Mississippi State defeats instate rival Ole Miss 4-1 to complete a four-game tourney sweep and capture the 2005 SEC Baseball Tournament at the Hoover Met. It is MSU's sixth SEC Tournament championship and vaults State on to its ninth NCAA regional tournament in the past 10 seasons.

2007

- June 8-9 After winning the NCAA Tallahassee Regional in three games, Mississippi State hosted its first NCAA Super Regional June 8-9, knocking off Clemson 8-6 and 8-5 to earn the school's eighth berth in the NCAA College World Series. An NCAA Super Regional-record 26,335 jammed Dudy Noble Field for the two 11:30 a.m. games televised nationally on ESPN. With a single in MSU's regional-clinching 9-4 win at Florida State, senior second baseman/outfielder Jeffrey Rea breaks the MSU record for career hits, and with four hits at the College World Series, Rea concludes his career with 335 hits.
- June 27 In Wichita, Kansas, junior catcher Edward Easley is named the recipient of the Johnny Bench Award as college baseball's best catcher. A supplemental first-round draft pick of the Arizona Diamondbacks, Easley earlier claimed college baseball's top honor in Mississippi, the Ferriss Trophy.

2008

- March 27 Head coach Ron Polk announces that the 2008 season, his 29th at Mississippi State and his 35th in collegiate baseball, would be his final season as head coach of the Diamond Dawgs. The Bulldogs ended the year with a 23-33 mark, the only sub-.500 season of his coaching career, and Polk concluded his career with 1,373 wins, seventh most in NCAA baseball history.

June 7 Former State standout John Cohen is introduced by then-MSU Director of Athletics Greg Byrne as MSU's 16th head baseball coach. Cohen, with previous coaching stints at Missouri, Northwestern State, Florida and Kentucky, was an All-SEC outfielder at State, helping the Bulldogs set the school-record for wins (54) en route to the 1989 SEC championship.

2009

July 3 Former MSU coach Ron Polk and MSU and MLB great Rafael Palmeiro are among 10 inductees in the fourth class of the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock, Texas. They join a third player with MSU ties enshrined in the hall of fame, former State great Will Clark, a member of the inaugural hall of fame induction class in 2006.

2010

June 18 Former MSU and MLB great Will Clark leads the national fan balloting for the College World Series Legends Team, honoring the sport's all-time greats that competed in the 60 College World Series held at Rosenblatt Stadium.

2011

June 12 Nick Vickerson swats a dramatic two-run walk-off home run against No. 1 national seed Florida to send the Bulldogs to the title game of the NCAA Gainesville Super Regional. State, which earlier won the NCAA Atlanta Regional with a 3-0 mark, builds a 6-4 seventh-inning lead in the title game before bowing to the eventual national finalists. MSU's advancement to NCAA postseason play marks the 31st time in program history and the first since 2007.

2012

May 27 SEC Pitcher of the Year Chris Stratton picks up his first career save to close out a 3-0 shutout of Vanderbilt as State claims its seventh SEC Tourney crown and the school's 32nd NCAA postseason advancement. Shortstop Adam Frazier goes 12 for 23 (.522) in the six-game stretch to earn MVP honors and joins Jonathan Holder and Demarcus Henderson on the all-tournament team. Stratton, the winner of the Ferriss Trophy, later becomes the 11th MSU player taken in the first round of the MLB draft.

2013

Feb. 16 Demarcus Henderson delivers a clutch RBI single in the sixth inning and All-American closer Jonathan Holder tosses 1 2/3 innings of shutout relief as Mississippi State defeats Portland, 2-1, for MSU's 1,000th win at the current site of Dudy Noble Field, MSU's on-campus baseball home since 1967.

May 16 A total of 9,341 fans attend MSU's game vs. No. 2 LSU at Dudy Noble, pushing the "Carnegie Hall of College Baseball" past the five million attendance mark.

June 9 The Bulldogs hold on for a dramatic 6-5 win in game two of the NCAA Charlottesville Super Regional, clinching its ninth trip to Omaha. With the win, MSU becomes the fifth program in NCAA history and the only SEC team ever to make it to the NCAA College World Series in five-straight decades. On the same weekend, MSU All-American Hunter Renfroe (San Diego) becomes the 12th player in school history to be taken in the first round of the MLB Draft

June 25 The Maroon and White play in the NCAA College World Series Championship Series for the first time ever as Omaha turns into "Dudy Noble North." John Cohen's ballclub battles UCLA in front of the largest single-game crowd in the history of TD Ameritrade Park (27,127) and the seventh-highest attended game in CWS history. The Bulldogs fall short against the Bruins in two games, but finish 2013 51-20 for the best finish in school history (NCAA Finalist).

2014

April 12 Mississippi State broke their own NCAA on-campus attendance record as 15,586 Bulldog fans attended a 6-5 victory against in-state rival Ole Miss. Trailing 5-2 in the bottom of the 10th, All-SEC freshman catcher Gavin Collins ripped an RBI walkoff single to cap a monster four-run 10th inning. A total of 39,181 fans attended the three-game series April 11-13, marking a new NCAA on-campus attendance record for a three-game series.

2016

May 21 Mississippi State clinched its 11th SEC Championship in program history and the first regular season conference title since 1989 by defeating Arkansas 9-4 in front of 8,421 fans at Dudy Noble Field.

May 23 Jake Mangum became the first freshman to win the C Spire Ferriss Trophy, awarded annually to the top college baseball player in Mississippi. He also became the first Bulldog to take SEC Freshman of the Year honors. To add to that, Mangum was named to the All-SEC first team, making him the first freshman to receive that honor since Rafael Palmeiro did so in 1983.

May 30 MSU was awarded a national seed in the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever, being awarded the No. 6 national seed and hosting its 13th NCAA Regional.

June 29 Jake Mangum was officially named the SEC batting champion, becoming the first freshman in school history to do so. He was the first to capture the title since Brett Pirtle in 2014, giving the Diamond Dawgs two out of the last three leaders in that category.

Nov. 5 Andy Cannizaro is introduced by MSU Director of Athletics John Cohen as MSU's 17th head baseball coach. Cannizaro, with previous experience as a scout for the New York Yankees and LSU assistant, was a two-time All-American at Tulane before a nine-year pro career.



2017

- May 22 After posting one of the most impressive regular seasons in the history of Southeastern Conference baseball, Brent Rooker became the first-ever Diamond Dawg to be named SEC Player of the Year. Through the 55-game regular season, Rooker hit .415 with 85 hits, in addition to being named First Team All-SEC.
- June 5 Having dropped the opening game of the NCAA Hattiesburg Regional, State rallied to win four-straight games (all in just a two-day span) to become the 22nd team in the history of the current 64-team NCAA Tournament format (since 1999) to win a regional after dropping its opening game.
- June 6 Once it was determined that MSU would not host the NCAA Regional or Super Regional rounds, the demolition of Dudy Noble Field began to begin the process that would lead to the construction for the \$55 million new Dudy Noble Field.
- June 28 The first Southeastern Conference player to ever surpass 20 home runs, 30 doubles and 75 RBIs in a single season, Brent Rooker claimed the SEC triple crown by leading the league in batting average (.387), home runs (23) and RBIs (82). Rooker became just the second player ever to accomplish the feat, joining fellow Diamond Dawg Rafael Palmeiro (1984). Rooker also finished with a school-record 30 doubles and was the first Division I player to record 20 home runs, 30 doubles and 75 RBIs in a single season since Clemson's Khali Green in 2002.

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE



The Southeastern Conference, with its storied 84-year history of athletic achievements and academic excellence, has built perhaps the greatest tradition of intercollegiate competition in baseball of any league in the country since its inception in 1933.

An SEC squad has now appeared in the College World Series 32 of the last 33 years, including appearances by 18 teams in the last seven years. Eight SEC teams were selected for NCAA Regional play with six advancing to NCAA Super Regionals.

The SEC has now sent 58 teams to the College World Series since 1990. That has been accomplished despite no SEC teams making the field in 1992. LSU has been to Omaha 15 times in that stretch, Florida 11 times, South Carolina six times, Georgia and Mississippi State five times, Arkansas four times, while Alabama, Tennessee and Vanderbilt have been three times each, and Auburn twice. Texas A&M made its first appearance as a member of the Southeastern Conference.

Following the 2017 CWS Championship Series, SEC teams have won 11 of the last 28 national championships, with LSU winning six (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000, 2009), South Carolina winning two (2010, 2011), Vanderbilt taking home the title in 2014, Georgia claiming the 1990 title and Florida in 2017.

The SEC has finished runner up 10 times in that span: 1997, 2002, 2005, 2008, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2017. The SEC has played 61 games in the "Final Four" of the College World Series since 1990. Only six times, 1992, 1994, 2003, 2006, 2007 and 2016 has the SEC failed to get a team to the "Final Four" of the CWS.

Total home attendance for all 14 SEC teams passed the two million mark for the seventh consecutive season. The top five national attendance leaders were all from the SEC (LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Arkansas and South Carolina).

Total attendance for the 2017 SEC Tournament was 127,479. The event has become the Birmingham metro's highest attended sporting event annually, second in the state only to NASCAR races at Talladega. Birmingham Magazine named it the top sporting event annually in the Birmingham area. The entire SEC Baseball Tournament was broadcast live on national television for the third consecutive year.

ABOUT THE SEC

Mississippi State University is a charter member of the Southeastern Conference, a pioneer in the integration of higher education and athletic competition and a national leader as intercollegiate athletics marches on into the 21st century.

With the addition of former Big 12 Conference members Missouri and Texas A&M in 2012-13, the Southeastern Conference, headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama, is comprised of 14 universities that span an 11-state region. It conducts championships in 11 women's and nine men's sports. The member schools are split into two divisions. Mississippi State is joined in the SEC West by Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, LSU, Ole Miss and Texas A&M. The SEC East features Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Missouri, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt. All but Arkansas and South Carolina, who joined the league in 1991-92, and conference newcomers Missouri and Texas A&M, were among 13 charter members of the SEC.



SEC BASEBALL ON TV

The Southeastern Conference and ESPN signed a 20-year agreement through 2034 to create and operate a multiplatform network which launched August 14, 2014. The network and its accompanying digital platform carry SEC content 24/7 including more than 1,000 events a year.

Programming also includes in-depth commentary and analysis in studio shows, daily news and information, original content such as SEC Storied, spring football games, and more.

The SEC Network will swing into its third baseball season with 76 games slated to air on the network dedicated to Southeastern Conference sports, as part of the more than 161 planned across ESPN television networks (ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU or SEC Network). The network will quadruple SEC baseball's coverage over 2014's nationally televised schedule.

In addition to those games, more than 450 matchups will be digitally exclusive SEC Network + events available on SECNetwork.com and WatchESPN. In total, more than 800 SEC baseball games will be available to fans this season.

The schedule is highlighted with at least nine television appearances by MSU, and a special night of Bases Loaded Coverage on Friday, March 16, whipping around between games on the opening night of SEC play.

The SEC Network and ESPN2 will conclude the regular season with comprehensive coverage of the SEC Baseball Tournament, marking the second straight season the entire tournament has aired on national television.



SEC TOURNAMENT

The SEC conducts a postseason tournament at the end of its 10-weekend, 30-game league schedule. The winner receives the league's automatic qualifying bid for the NCAA baseball tournament.

The SEC tournament field expanded from eight to 10 teams in 2012 and to 12 teams in 2013. The teams with the 12 highest conference winning percentages qualify for the double-elimination SEC tournament, with the top four teams receiving opening round tournament byes in the double-bracket event. The winners of each bracket meet May 29 in a nationally-televised championship game.

The 2018 SEC Tournament (May 22-27) will be the league's 42nd dating back to 1977. And for the 23rd time overall and the 21st consecutive year, the event will be staged in Hoover, Alabama, at the Hoover Metropolitan Stadium, once the 10,800-seat home of the Class AA Southern League's Birmingham Barons (Chicago White Sox). The facility can accommodate crowds of up to 10,800.

Mississippi State claimed its seventh SEC Baseball Tournament title (second-most in the SEC) in May 2012. With the Bulldogs playing in six games, the tournament drew a then-record 129,112 fans in 2012, averaging crowds of 7,595. State's six games in Hoover averaged 8,357 fans, including an MSU-dominated 12,526 in the championship game against Vanderbilt.



DR. MARK KEENUM

Mississippi State University President
January 2009-Present



Dr. Mark Everett Keenum became Mississippi State's 19th president Jan. 5, 2009, following a distinguished public service career.

In his eighth year of tenure, Dr. Keenum has guided Mississippi State to unprecedented heights. The university has experienced record enrollment growth to more than 21,000 students and a freshman class for fall 2016 of over 3,600. Mississippi State has awarded more than 4,000 degrees at all levels for five straight years.

The campus has expanded and improved on Keenum's watch. Chief among those projects has been The Mill at MSU – a modern conference center housed in the former Cooley Building. Construction of a new classroom building with built-in parking and two new residence halls including Nusz Hall (which will house the G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery Center for America's Veterans), and a fourth-floor expansion to Mitchell Memorial Library to house the Ulysses S. Grant Presidential Library. New projects launching over the next two years includes a new Department of Music building and the completion of an Animal and Dairy Science/Poultry Science complex for the Division of Agriculture, Forestry and Veterinary Medicine.

Fundraising has reached all-time record levels. MSU's current Infinite Impact capital campaign reached its \$600 million goal this year, three years ahead of schedule. Due to that unprecedented success, the university announced a new private endowment goal—\$1 billion by 2020—the largest campaign goal ever for an educational institution in Mississippi. During his tenure, Dr. Keenum has been instrumental in expanding the MSU Promise Program, which provides need-based scholarship assistance to Mississippi students whose families have limited financial means.

Mississippi State is ranked by the National Science Foundation as a "Top 100" research institution. The most recent research success has been MSU's designation as the Federal Aviation Administration's National Center of Excellence for Unmanned Aircraft Systems and Boeing's decision to locate a composite research center at MSU's Raspet Flight Research Laboratory.

Dr. Keenum travels frequently to Washington, D.C., meeting with Congressional leaders and federal agency heads to pursue research opportunities and broaden the university's influence on the national level. He has also worked closely with state leaders in support of higher education in Mississippi.

Keenum serves as chairman of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges' Executive Council. SACS-COC is the recognized regional accrediting body in the 11 U.S. Southern states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia) and in Latin America for those institutions of higher education that award associate, baccalaureate, master's or doctoral degrees.

In 2016, Keenum was elected president of the Southeastern Conference where he is a member of the SEC Executive Committee and continues to serve on the SEC's Content Committee that oversees the SEC Network. He also represents the SEC as a member of the College Football Playoff's (CFP) Board of Managers.

A graduate of Mississippi State with degrees in agricultural economics, Keenum's interest in international food security has strengthened the university's contributions to global economic sustainability. In 2014, he was appointed vice chairman of the Foundation for Food and Agricultural Research by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Thomas J. Vilsack. That same year along with other university presidents, he signed the Presidents' Commitment to Food and Nutrition Security at the United Nations in New York City. This marks the first time universities around the world began to share a collective focus on ending food insecurity.

Dr. Keenum began his career at MSU as a faculty member

with the Extension Service and the Department of Agricultural Economics. He went on to serve as chief of staff to U.S. Senator Thad Cochran in Washington, D.C., and was Under Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture prior to returning home to Mississippi State.

He graduated from Corinth (MS) High School and earned an associate of arts degree from Northeast Mississippi Community College in Booneville and was a member of the Northeast Tigers football team.

Dr. Keenum is married to the former Rhonda Newman of Booneville, also an MSU graduate. They have four children: Rett, Mary Phillips, Katie and Torie.

MSU DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



JOHN COHEN

Mississippi State University Director of Athletics
November 2016-Present



When John Cohen was named Mississippi State University's 17th director of athletics on November 4, 2016, he wasted little time putting his stamp on the department.

The former MSU head baseball coach and two-time Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year has overseen the hiring of three coaches, while nine teams have advanced to postseason since he took over the helm, seven earning Top 25 rankings with baseball, women's cross country and women's basketball finishing in the Top 16.

In all, four sports – women's cross country, women's basketball, women's track and field (indoor and outdoor) – posted or tied their highest NCAA Championships/postseason finish in school history.

"I love Mississippi State University," Cohen said. "As a student-athlete, as a coach, and now with this once in a lifetime opportunity, I feel deeply honored to lead MSU's athletics program. I am profoundly grateful for the chance to lead the totality of MSU athletics as I have tried to lead MSU's baseball program – in daily and dogged pursuit of championships at the highest level."

Cohen, who spent more than two decades coaching college baseball, was named MSU's head baseball coach in July of 2008. Nine years later, Cohen's official role in administration began when he assumed the role of associate athletic director in addition to head baseball coach. The following November, he took charge of an athletic department that has since achieved new heights in athletic, academic, facility and fundraising achievements.

One day after becoming athletics director, Cohen named Andy Cannizaro as MSU's next head baseball coach. Cannizaro, a former Major Leaguer and one of the nation's rising coaching stars in college baseball, led the Bulldogs to a Top 10 ranking and trip to the Super Regionals.

During Cohen's short tenure as director of athletics, the athletic department has enjoyed notable success. In April, the women's basketball team advanced to the national championship game after its historic upset of No. 1 ranked UConn to snap an NCAA-record 111-game winning streak, a feat that garnered Vic Schaefer's team an ESPY award in July.

This achievement came after the Bulldogs played in the SEC Tournament finals, a month before the men's tennis team also played for the conference title.

As an athletic department, MSU placed 49th in the Learfield Director's Cup with 490 points to mark the first time in school history to post back-to-back Top 50 finishes.

As athletic director, Cohen is charged with providing leadership, management, and administration for the university's athletic programs. Cohen is currently overseeing the multi-million dollar renovation of famed Dudy Noble Field to make it the premier facility in all of college baseball.

A Tuscaloosa, Ala., native and MSU alumnus, Cohen was a head coach in the SEC for 12 years. His teams have been successful both on the field and in the classroom. At MSU, he led the Bulldogs to a College World Series finals appearance, an SEC regular season championship and an SEC Tournament championship. Since 2009, MSU baseball has had 133 players selected to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, including three straight SEC Scholar Athlete of the Year winners from 2013-15.

While winning 284 games as a head coach at MSU, Cohen demonstrated a keen ability to develop players and coaches. During his tenure, 138 MSU baseball players were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, including All-American Brent Rooker this June. His influence can be seen throughout the SEC as four of his former assistants are now or have been head coaches — Brad Bohannon (Alabama), Gary Henderson (Kentucky), Nick Mingione (Kentucky) and Butch Thompson (Auburn).

Cohen is the only coach in SEC history to win an SEC championship, SEC tournament championship, and advance to the College World Series both as a player and head coach. Cohen's 2013 Bulldog Club advanced to the CWS championship series for the first time in MSU history. Currently 31 of Cohen's former players are playing professional baseball. Cohen's 2012 club produced an SEC record-tying eight major leaguers. Eight of the university's top ten all-time marks in baseball season ticket sales have come during Cohen's tenure, including a school record of 5,874 in 2014.

Cohen and his wife, Nelle, are active members of the Starkville community. The couple has two daughters, Jordan Baker and Avery Lawson.

The 2018 season marks the 52nd season of baseball at the current site of Mississippi State baseball's on-campus home field, Dudy Noble Field. The Diamond Dawgs have played 1,547 games at the venue, prevailing in more than 72 percent of its battles.

On April 12, 2014, Mississippi State broke their own NCAA on-campus attendance record as 15,586 Bulldog fans attended a 6-5 victory against in-state rival Ole Miss. Trailing 5-2 in the bottom of the 10th, catcher Gavin Collins ripped an RBI walkoff single to cap a monster four-run 10th inning. A total of 39,181 fans attended the three-game series, April 11-13, marking a new NCAA on-campus attendance record for a three-game series. MSU came close to that record on April 16, 2016, hosting a crowd of 15,078 that saw the Diamond Dawgs take on Texas A&M.

Over the past five decades, the facility has evolved into the nation's largest campus facility for college baseball and what many have regarded at one time as the sport's finest all-around baseball complex.

MSU has eclipsed the 200,000 mark in paid attendance at Dudy Noble Field in six straight years for the first time in its 127-year history, including a school-record 302,558 in 2016 and a school-best average of 8,127 in 2014. In 2013, the Diamond Dawgs' five-millionth fan walked through the turnstiles at Dudy Noble Field. Since home attendance figures were charted starting in 1976, the "Carnegie Hall of College Baseball" has seen 5,838,507 fans rush through the gates.

The field is named in honor of longtime MSU baseball coach, athletics director and ABCA Hall of Famer Clarke Randolph "Dudy" Noble. On April 27, 1998 the facility was renamed Dudy Noble Field, Polk-DeMent Stadium, honoring another ABCA Hall of Famer, former Bulldog skipper Ron Polk and the late Gordon DeMent, a successful businessman and longtime fan of the Diamond Dawgs from Indianola, Mississippi.

Dudy Noble Field, the home to seven Southeastern Conference championship teams, has five times hosted crowds in excess of 14,000. State has hosted crowds of 10,000 or better 48 times, including 2007 NCAA Super Regional-record draws of 13,715 and 12,620 for nationally-televised late morning games against Clemson. MSU has hosted three NCAA District III Tournaments (1973-1975), five SEC tournaments (1979, 1981, 1983, 1988 and 1995), 13 NCAA Regional tournaments (1979, 1984, 1985, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1992, 1997, 2000, 2003, 2013 and 2016) and a pair of NCAA Super Regionals (2007 and 2016).

From 1929 until 1964, Mississippi State hosted its baseball games at the original on-campus site for Dudy Noble Field several hundred yards to the south of Davis Wade Stadium at

Scott Field, State's football stadium. The baseball field was closed following the 1964 season to make way for the construction of Dorman Hall. And for the next two seasons, while the "new" Dudy Noble Field was being built, the Diamond Dawgs played their home games in Columbus, Mississippi, at Red-bird Park, capturing SEC titles both seasons at their temporary home. Meanwhile, the tin-roofed grandstand and 2,000-seat bleachers at the old field were moved to the stadium's present site, which became playable for the 1967 season.

Facility enhancements have followed a steady pace over the years ever since.

In 1971, thanks to the generosity of the late E.B. "Dutch" McCool, a former MSU baseball player and one of the founding fathers of Holiday Inn, Inc., MSU took the lead in the Southeastern Conference with the installation of a lighting system. The advent of night baseball in Starkville helped build a solid fan base. Drainage and irrigation systems and an expanded scoreboard with an animation-equipped message center, new batting ranges and an infield tarp became the stadium's next improvements.

Mississippi State hosted its first SEC Baseball Tournament and NCAA Regional in 1979, winning both and setting attendance marks while opening eyes along the way.

The crowds mushroomed further in the 1980s as future Major League stars Jeff Brantley, Will Clark, Rafael Palmeiro and Bobby Thigpen helped the 1985 Bulldogs win the SEC championship, host and win another regional championship and earn MSU's highest national finish, a tie for third place at the NCAA College World Series.

It became apparent that support for baseball at State had easily out-grown its cozy Dudy Noble Field facility. Two years after that magical '85 season Mississippi State unveiled a dramatic advancement for its baseball facilities — an impressive \$3.5 million project that would give MSU the biggest baseball stadium in the league.

The facility at Dudy Noble Field, built in less than nine months, featured an impressive concrete grandstand structure with 3,700 maroon theater-style seats, a spacious elevated press box, restrooms, ticket, souvenir and concession-vending facilities. The team clubhouse featured a spacious 40-locker dressing room and team area. A pair of 1,500-seat bleachers that once overlooked the end zones at Scott Field, the home of MSU's football Bulldogs, were refurbished and installed along the foul lines, raising seating capacity at Dudy Noble Field to 6,700. The facility was later chosen by Sports Illustrated as the best place to watch college baseball, and it helped ignite a drive to update baseball facilities throughout the SEC and beyond.

The expanded capacity at the stadium also triggered an increase in MSU's annual baseball season ticket base to more than 5,600, virtually assuring Mississippi State's place among national leaders in college baseball attendance every year.

A second permanent concession stand was added in 1989, and a year later, the cinder warning track at the outfield fence was extended to completely encircle the playing field. That project, along with the installation of a six-foot high padded outfield fence, was made possible by a donation by former MSU All-American and Major League standout Will Clark.

Best-selling author, MSU alumnus and avid MSU baseball fan John Grisham donated funding in 1993 for an indoor batting range under the first base grandstand, and in August 1998 construction got under way on an ambitious project that added 18 sky suites and more than 600 additional chairback seats in the grandstand. When it was completed during the 2000 season, permanent seating capacity at Dudy Noble Field had eclipsed the 7,000 mark.

The aura of Mississippi State baseball at Dudy Noble Field is certainly not confined to the loyal legions in the impressive grandstand, pro-style luxury sky suites and bleachers.

In fact, some of the more highly-prized seats at Bulldog Baseball games are found beyond the outfield fence in the "Left Field Lounge™". Waiting lists greet those seeking to purchase one of nearly 75 renewable season parking passes for an assigned position in one of three rows beyond the outfield fence. There, a colorful assortment of pickup trucks, motor homes, and trailers — most equipped with barbecue grills — line the outfield fence, completing a circle of humanity at Dudy Noble Field.

What began in the late 1960s as a popular gathering spot for baseball-loving MSU students now forms college baseball's largest tailgate party. A 10-foot wide boardwalk has since been added to the area between the outfield fence and the first row of outfield terrace parking.

Not surprisingly MSU ranks each year among the nation's leaders in attendance. Single-game paid attendance totals have reached the five-digit mark 36 times, and each year Dudy Noble Field routinely hosts games with the Southeastern Conference's largest actual attendance. SEC weekend games typically draw the largest crowds, giving rise to huge weekend gatherings in the spring. Nine of the last 11 three-game Super Bulldog Weekend series have drawn more than 25,000.

Still, the improvements continue at Dudy Noble Field. Prior to the start of the 2003 season 46-foot "major league" foul poles were added, and a year later a new state-of-the-art scoreboard/message center, courtesy of the Henry Mize Foundation, was installed along with new fencing and gates surrounding the main grandstand.

The landscape surrounding Dudy Noble Field took on an even more impressive look in 2005 with the completion of the Palmeiro Center, a massive 68,000-square foot climate-controlled turfed indoor practice facility located adjacent to Dudy Noble Field. The spacious facility, made possible by a generous lead gift from former MSU great Rafael Palmeiro and his wife Lynne, features a regulation infield practice area, additional training area and three retractable batting cages.

Nestled between the Palmeiro Center and Dudy Noble Field is the baseball coaches office complex, also completed in 2005. The complex, which also houses a baseball heritage room, was made possible by contributions from former Bulldog players Jeff Brantley, Will Clark, Eric DuBose, Paul Maholm, Jay Powell and Bobby Thigpen and former MSU manager James "Bo" McKinnis.

Mississippi State's baseball complex received a boost with the addition of the Bryce Griffis Boardroom, a \$1.5 million, meeting/banquet hall extension on the south end of the Palmeiro Center. The facility features banquet seating for approximately 350.

Facility upgrades totaling more than \$2 million in the past four years include an expanded state-of-the-art high definition video board, the addition of a new drainage and irrigation system along with a new carpet of natural sod and infield dirt, and expanded dugouts. Even the grandstand got a little more grand with a resurfacing and repainting project topped by all-new cupholder-equipped maroon chairback seats and the installation of a new sound system. Prior to the start of the 2012 campaign work was completed on the installation of a new sound system, a 36,000-watt amplification system evenly distributing sound on a 78-speaker system throughout the stadium.

The 2017 season was the first with a new state-of-the-art video board that spans over 43 feet high and 60 feet wide, making it the largest such board in college baseball and larger than than boards owned by three Major League Baseball teams.

These latest facility enhancements continue an on-going Mississippi State campaign to maintain the outstanding reputation of Dudy Noble Field. With construction in progress on the project that will lead to the new Dudy Noble Field, more information about the project can be found on Page 152.

Playing before an NCAA on-campus attendance record crowd of 15,586, Mississippi State scored four runs in the bottom of the 10th inning to knock off arch-rival Ole Miss, 6-5. The Super Bulldog Weekend series drew 39,181 fans to Dudy Noble Field, marking the largest on-campus three-game series attendance in college baseball history.

Mississippi State Athletics unveiled the Dudy Noble Field Master Plan on Aug. 12, 2014, an ambitious \$55 million facility project that aims to remake the Bulldogs' home ballpark into the finest in college baseball.

The Jackson, Mississippi, design team of Wier Boerner Allin Architecture and national baseball stadium experts Populous, in consultation with MSU alum Janet Marie Smith, has produced the proposed Dudy Noble Field Master Plan concept. Populous has designed 20 of Major League Baseball's current 30 ballparks, in addition to TD Ameritrade Park Omaha, home of the NCAA Men's College World Series.

The Dudy Noble Field Master Plan calls for a new double-tiered grandstand with chairback seating, an elevated concourse that encircles the playing field and allows a constant view of the game action, welcoming entry plazas, spacious restrooms, concessions, a kids' play area, berm seating, upgraded field lighting, HD video board, team areas (clubhouse, training room, equipment room, etc.) and dramatically improved aesthetics.

"This is a monumental day for our baseball program, and something every Bulldog player and fan deserves," said MSU Athletic Director John Cohen. "As a former player, I know the greatest fans in college baseball will take action to ensure our players and coaching staff have the necessary amenities and resources to recruit and compete at the highest level."

The timetable for the project is based on the Bulldog Club reaching its \$20 million private fundraising goal. Fundraising efforts are currently underway and fans can contribute now to the stadium project at MSUBulldogClub.com or by calling 662-325-3074.

Several premium seating opportunities are available. The new stadium will feature Diamond Suites (sold out), Omaha Club Level and Loge seating (sold out), a field level club titled, "The Backstop" (sold out), and apartment-style Left Field Lofts (more info coming soon) will be available as well.

The Dudy Noble Field Master Plan will still showcase the unique and timeless features of the previous ballpark, including the Left Field Lounge™. The outfield 'spots' will be built permanently into place. Each spot will be customized to retain the traditional look of the Left Field Lounge™ but with access to added amenities such as electricity, storage and a common concourse connecting the entire outfield facility to the rest of the stadium.

New restroom areas will also be located in the renovated outfield area. Capacity is planned to allow MSU to continue to host the largest crowds in college baseball. The new grandstand will hold more fans than the current grandstand, berm seating down each line will allow for greater general admission seating and the outfield should accommodate the same number of fans, if not more. Additionally, there will be excellent standing room views of the field surrounding the concourse that the current facility does not provide.

With construction on the project not to be fully completed until February 2019, the stadium capacity will be 9,000 for the 2018 season.

Mississippi State currently owns the top 10 on-campus crowds in NCAA baseball history. On April 12, 2014, Bulldog fans shattered the single-game NCAA on-campus attendance record as 15,586 fans witnessed a 6-5 MSU victory against in-state rival Ole Miss. In the spring of 2015, an average of 7,448 fans attended games. In all, more than five million fans have seen a game at the stadium affectionately nicknamed "The Dude."

ABOUT THE MSU BULLDOG CLUB

The Mississippi State University Bulldog Club is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that was established in 1974 as a funding resource for student-athlete scholarships and a means to build and upgrade athletic facilities. Donations to the Bulldog Club are used to provide MSU student-athletes with tuition, room and board, academic support and career development, athletic facilities maintenance and coaches and administrative support. The Bulldog Club has recently funded the expansion and renovation of Davis Wade Stadium. Since 2010, Bulldog fans have been incredibly generous, providing nearly \$80 million in capital gifts.
