

Mississippi State University Booster Guidelines

Who is considered a MSU booster?

A booster is anyone who has:

- participated in or been a member of an organization promoting MSU's athletics program
- made a financial donation to MSU's athletics department
- · assisted in the recruitment of student-athletes
- assisted in providing benefits to student-athletes or their families
- been involved in promoting MSU's athletics program

Who is considered an MSU recruit?

A student becomes a prospective student-athlete (recruit) once he or she has started classes for the ninth grade.

- They remain a prospect until they begin practice/class at MSU.

Are there any limitations to interactions with prospects?

Leave the recruiting to the coaches.

Do not reach out to prospects in-person, through phone calls or texts, or through social media.

- You may like/share a prospect's posts.
- If unavoidable, incidental contact is made with a prospect, be sure to end your conversation without any mention of MSU.

Is there anything I can provide to prospects?

It is <u>not</u> permissible under NCAA rules to provide travel, expenses, meals, tickets, or any other type of extra benefit to a prospective student-athlete. Doing so could cost them their eligibility.

Can I provide anything to current student-athletes?

No, NCAA rules prohibit boosters from providing any type of extra benefits (money, gifts, tickets, etc.) to student-athletes.

What if I am a life-long friend of a prospect?

If you have a pre-established relationship with a prospective student-athlete (i.e. family friend) you may still have contact with them as long as there is no discussion of MSU. Contact compliance if you have additional questions.
